

Oregon PTA Slates Meetings At Monmouth

Mrs. Jennelle Moorhead, professor of physical education at University of Oregon and a vice-president of the Oregon congress, will address the groups Friday, July 22. Her topic will be "Relationship of Teachers and Parents Through PTA."

The classes in school organization are under the direction of Dr. Victor Phelps, general extension division and Henrietta Woller, principal of the campus elementary school.

New School Bus Standards Are Now in Effect

Final adoption and issuance of new school bus standards and regulations in compliance with a law of the last legislature was announced Saturday by Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry. The law will become operative today.

Two booklets have been mailed to school officials, bus operators, manufacturers and dealers. The first sets forth "minimum standards for school busses" and the other explains "laws and regulations governing public school transportation." Interested persons who have not received copies may obtain them on request from the state department.

The new regulations apply to all vehicles of more than seven passenger capacity which transport school children.
