# new dams FOR POWER FROM THE SNAKE

Four new dams with an ultimate combined output of 1,225,000 kilowatts (Bonneville output is 518,400 kw.) are planned for the Snake River to bring more new power into the Northwest. Ice Harbor, Lower Monumental, Little Goose and Lower Granite Dams are authorized by Congress and will be constructed as soon as funds are made available. Their initial combined output will be 735,000 kilowatts with three generating units installed at

each dam, additional units being installed later.

Even these and other major power sources proposed for development in the Pacific Northwest (a total of 10 million kilowatts) do not mean an immediate end to our need for more electricity. But each week that passes brings us closer to the time when electric power will meet the increased demand and become plentiful once again.
