

New Petitions Required for School Ballot

Hayesville residents who are seeking consolidation with the Salem school district must draw up new petitions for presentation to the county school office, Superintendent Agnes Booth said Monday.

The new petitions will stipulate that the Hayesville district's \$4,000 reserve fund will be used only for Hayesville improvements in the event of consolidation and that debts of both districts will be assumed by the consolidated district, according to Connell Ward, clerk of the Salem school district.

Petitions presented last week were invalidated Saturday when a law passed by the last state legislature became effective. The law states that any assumption of debts or special stipulations regarding reserve funds of either district in a proposed consolidation must be mentioned on the petitions.

John Versteeg of the Hayesville school board said Monday he believes gathering of new petitions already has started.

An election on the consolidation was approved a week ago by the Salem school board after the proposal was advanced by Hayesville school directors.

Stocks Creep To Continue Month's Rally

NEW YORK, July 18—(AP)—A creeping advance carried the stock market to a new seven-week high today.

The rise was far from impressive. Gains were mostly in minor fractions and exceeded small declines by a none too large margin.

Business was slow. Quotations were marked up more because of an absence of aggressive selling rather than active buying.

Small as the advance was, it kept the market's current rally under way. Prices have been on the move ahead since mid-June after dropping to a 4½-year low on June 13.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced 2 of one point to 62.2. This is the highest point hit by the average since May 27, when the same level was touched as the market was in a steep decline.

The industrial group showed the greatest improvement and utilities were up only slightly. Rails were unchanged.

Of 933 individual stocks traded 398 advanced and 283 declined.

Farmers Get Extra Tax-Filing Period

WASHINGTON, July 18—(AP)—The house passed without a dissenting voice today a bill giving farmers a couple of weeks extra to file their annual income tax estimates.

Because their income is uncertain and subject to great fluctuation, farmers are not required to file a declaration of estimated tax until January 15 following the year in which the tax liability was incurred.

The new bill, which now goes to the senate, gives farmers until January 31 to file their estimates.

Oats Strong; Market Mixed

CHICAGO, July 18—(AP)—Oats showed the most strength in an irregularly higher grain market today. Wheat and rye scored small gains while corn and soybeans ended mixed. Lard made fair-sized advances.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1½¢ higher, corn was ¾¢ lower to 1½¢ higher, oats were ¾¢-1½¢ higher, rye was ¾¢ to 1 cent higher, soybeans were ¼¢ lower to 1 cent higher, and lard was 15 to 23 cents a hundred pounds higher.

Some buying in wheat was based on hopes bakers would come back into the flour market. However, there was little indication of any such activity. Cash prices sank at most major terminals.

Cash wheat continued to sell at a discount here. No. 2 red wheat, which is deliverable on futures contracts, brought \$1.93 to \$1.95, or 3 to 5 cents less than the July future. The price also was more than 25 cents under the government loan level here.

Mrs. Woolery Dies at Home

Funeral services for Mrs. Nellie Woolery, 1570 S. Commercial st., will be Wednesday at 3 p. m. from Clough-Barrick chapel with interment in Belle Passi cemetery in Woodburn.

She died unexpectedly at her home Sunday night following a heart attack. Born near Woodburn, Sept. 1, 1883, Mrs. Woolery had lived in Salem for 30 years. She married Roy Woolery at Woodburn on Aug. 30, 1911. She was a member of the Christian Missionary and Alliance church.

Surviving are two daughters, Neva Woolery of Salem and Mrs. Zella Hamm of Camas Valley, Ore., a sister, Mrs. Dora Atwell of Salem; and two grandchildren.

Guards Patrol Florida Area To Bar Trouble

GROVELAND, Fla., July 18—(AP)—National guardsmen were called out again tonight to patrol this farm community after three negroes admitted raping a 17-year-old white woman and beating and robbing her husband.

Lake County Sheriff W. V. McCall said he had asked Gov. Fuller Warren for the troops and that the governor had agreed to send them. The sheriff said he expected around 20 guardsmen.

"I wanted the national guard for the effect uniformed men would have while patrolling the streets," the sheriff said.

There was no disturbance here, however, and the sheriff said he expected no more violence.

Guardsmen were mobilized yesterday after a heavily armed mob went to the county jail at Tavares for two of the negroes. The prisoners had been moved to other jails for safekeeping and the crowd left without trouble.

Florida highway Patrol Sergeant Bill Norris said most of Groveland's 400 negroes had left town again after returning today. They did the same thing Saturday and Sunday.

Russ Strides In Air Power Called Rapid

MOSCOW, July 18—(AP)—Western air observers here agreed today Russia has made rapid strides in the past year toward becoming a great air power.

Experts stationed at embassies here said that was their "all around" conclusion, after watching the Soviet air force's annual display before Premier Stalin and government leaders yesterday at Moscow's Tushino airfield.

The display featured four new "superspeed" jet fighters streaking at low altitudes across the field, as well as bombers similar to American B-29s, parachutists and a spectacular tail-less glider.

A western air observer who preferred to remain anonymous said "the important thing for the people at home to realize is that the U. S. S. R. — as shown yesterday — is making a tremendous effort to become the predominant power in the air."

The western experts who watched the show admitted they could not see very much of the new jets — "they simply went too fast," one said. They also pointed out the Russians probably have more advanced types not yet on public display.

But based alone on what they saw, the observers said they were convinced the Russians are steadily achieving new set goals in aircraft production.

Sheet Metal Men Strike at Eugene

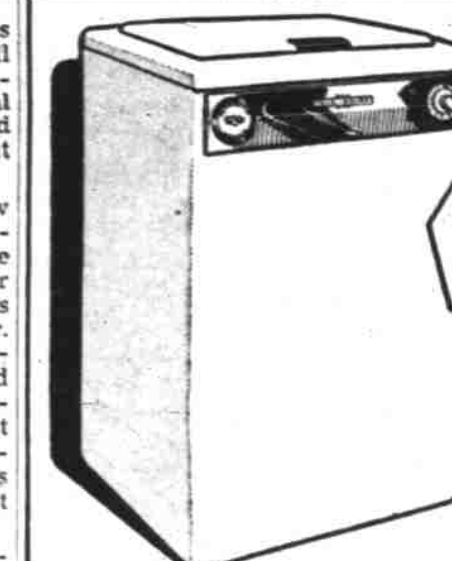
