

Debate Lively On Compulsory Health Plans

The panel discussion on compulsory health insurance sponsored by Salem League of Women Voters at Waller hall Tuesday night drew spirited discussion, particularly from the floor.

Principals presenting opposing views were Prof. John Rademaker of Willamette university, supporting the Truman health insurance program, and Dr. Morris K. Crothers, Salem physician, who opposed it. Spicing the argument from the floor were Dr. Veich, who voiced strong disapproval of socialization of medicine based on his experience as a doctor in Yugoslavia and a navy veteran who resented charges of malingering in veterans' hospitals.

Professor Rademaker devoted most of his time to explaining proposed legislation, particularly SB 1679, the administration's health bill, which would provide federal funds for research, subsidies to professional schools and students, and what is most controversial, set up a government system of medical care financed by levies on payrolls and from the public treasury. He asserted that because of heavy costs of modern medical care the new system was needed.

In opposition, Dr. Crothers asserted that health of Americans was the best of any nation, that it was neither necessary nor wise to "surrender to government responsibility and direction for all the details of living. Socialized medicine, he said, resulted in inferior care at greater cost and would be dominated by politicians. The scheme, he said, would create a new bureaucracy, with doctors required to spend much of their time filling out forms for the reporting of cases and collection of fees.

The question period reflected sharp division of opinion among the audience.

Harold Lloyd Heads Shrine

CHICAGO, July 19-(AP)—Harold Lloyd, once the breathless hero of silent movie comedy thrillers, was installed as imperial potentate of the Mystic Shrine today.

The ritual, which made the 57-year-old comedian chief of 610,000 North American Shriner, was watched by President Truman and a crowd which nearly filled the Lake Front stadium at Soldier Field.

It was the first time in the Masonic order's 75-year history that the secret ceremonies have been conducted in public.

President Truman, a Shriner, spoke, as president of the United States, on the nation's foreign policy. (Story on page 1.)

Funeral services will be announced later by Ekman's Funeral home.

Truman Orders 5 % Probing

WASHINGTON, July 19-(AP)—The Washington Post said tonight President Truman has ordered "a searching investigation of Washington 5 per cent and their obliging friends in high-placed government positions."

The Post said in a copyrighted story that the chief executive gave instructions to Secretary of Defense Johnson to conduct such an inquiry regardless of who is embarrassed by it.

Shortly after Mr. Truman talked with Johnson, the Post said, Secretary of the Army Gordon Gray announced the temporary suspensions of two major generals pending the completion of an investigation.

Vampire Killer To Be Hanged

LEWES, England, July 19-(AP)—Handsome John George Haigh, a one-time choir boy who confessed he killed nine people and drank their blood, was condemned tonight to death by hanging.

Deliberating only 15 minutes, a jury rejected Haigh's plea for a special verdict of "guilty of the acts charged, but insane at the time they were committed."

The jury, made up of 11 men and one woman, convicted the 39-year-old business man of murdering Mrs. Olive Durand-Deacon, 69, a wealthy widow, in a London suburb last February 18. Haigh was not charged with any of the eight other murders mentioned in two statements to police.

Lions to Construct Illinois City for Homes and Schools

NEW YORK, July 19-(AP)—The Lions here plans today for establishment of a "Lions International City."

International President Eugene S. Briggs of Enid, Okla., said the project includes building a world headquarters for the service club, with homes for staff members and a hotel for visiting Lions and guests.

In addition, the plan calls for establishment of schools and colleges "where may be taught the theory and practice of the principles of good government and good citizenship."

Briggs said some 375 acres already had been purchased and \$442,000 spent on the development near Matteson, Ill.

'50 Chest Budget Has 14 Agencies

PORTLAND, July 19-(AP)—Oregon community chest directors today approved a budget of \$525,883 for 14 statewide social agencies during their 1950 campaigns.

Eleven of the agencies provide care for homeless, dependent and delinquent children; The USO, with a fund goal of \$65,000, was included in the drives in seven counties.

Flares Light Port For Aircraft Here

Zone Hearings Set; Business Areas Okehed

Controversy over a proposed apartment building in the medical clinics area near Salem General hospital will be aired August 16 at a public hearing in city hall before the Salem planning and zoning commission.

This was decided Tuesday night after zoning commissioners heard representatives of both sides of the issue before giving their tentative approval to James Minty's petition for change from class I (residential) to II (apartment) zones for property north of Center street and lying between Jason street and Catherine avenue.

Petitions favoring the change were signed by owners of 52 per cent of affected property. City Engineer J. H. Davis reported—just over the minimum required to process a zone change. But one of the opponents, Mrs. Grace E. Hibler, told the commission that several signers have since changed their minds.

Other zoning actions taken at the city hall meeting last night: Final approval of a variance permit allowing F. C. Salter to change house at 507 N. 18th st. into two-family dwelling.

Recommended that city council change from a business zone now limited to laundry use to a general business zone property at North Commercial and Jefferson streets where Alfred W. Loucks seeks to expand Home Fuel Oil Co. facilities.

Recommended city council action to change from apartment to business zoning property at 1240 Center st. where Jack Watson seeks to establish medical offices in an apartment building.

Tentatively set an August 16 hearing on business zoning at Court and Cottage streets as proposed for a Donald A. Young attorney's office building, eventual expansion of the YMCA and possible business use of the Court apartment building. Petitions for the change are not yet completed.

Killed a request for business zone to allow Henry Barr to continue operating a plumbing shop at 1100 S. Liberty st., over the objection of Attorney Robert DeArmond, who said the property owners had petitions favoring the change from 70 per cent of affected property.

Gave tentative approval to Myrl G. Clark's plans for a 40-foot street and turnabout leading north from Oxford street about 270 feet east of South Capitol street.

Atom-Bomb Sharing with Britain In Secret Congress Controversy

WASHINGTON, July 19-(AP)—The administration was reported today to have sounded out legislators on the question of sharing atom bomb secrets with Britain by executive agreement, without action by congress.

Members of congress who cannot be named said the idea had been discussed, but emphasized that no decision to take the step had been made. The question was considered likely to come up at an extraordinary closed meeting of the senate-house atomic committee (11:30 a. m., PDT) tomorrow with representatives of the state department, the armed services, and the atomic energy commission.

Senator McMahon (D-Conn.), chairman of the joint committee, announced this morning's meeting as a sequel to the "hush-hush" conference of high government officials and legislators with the president at Blair house last Thursday night.

Judging from private statements made by both republican and democratic members of the senate-house committee, their prevailing sentiment seemed tonight to be against any such executive agreement. A majority seemed also to oppose handing any additional secrets to the British at this time.

Frances Tull Passes After Year's Illness

Mrs. Frances Evelyn Tull, 42, a Salem resident for seven years, died Tuesday at a local hospital following a year's illness. Her home was at 810 Vista dr.

Danger Grows For Brannan Subsidy Plan

WASHINGTON, July 19-(AP)—Skeptical lawmakers put a blight on the Brannan farm plan today, and it appeared to be in danger of withering on the vine.

A senate agriculture subcommittee rejected a bill that would have empowered Secretary of Agriculture Brannan to try out his subsidy program on hogs.

While this setback was not decisive, it appeared to symbolize the strong congressional opposition to the administration plan. One democratic senator close to the White House confided in reporters: "There won't be any trial run of the Brannan plan."

The plan would set market prices of perishable crops drop to their natural level. Then the government would pay subsidies to farmers to keep their income up to a certain level. These subsidies would eventually be paid by taxpayers.

In the house, a coalition of democrats and republicans rejected a Brannan plan compromise proposal and decided on an all-out fight to extend the present program another year.

Prague Hears New Charges At Catholics

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, July 19-(AP)—Czechoslovak communists and their supporters hurled new charges of anti-government intrigue and underground activity today against the Vatican and the nation's Roman Catholic bishops.

The attacks included: Declarations in the party press that the Catholics had organized "an illegal network of communications" to promote anti-government resistance here.

A purported open letter from a Catholic worker to Archbishop Josef Beran, the primate who is a semi-prisoner in his palace, accusing the archbishop of lies about his country.

A statement, attributed to a non-Catholic churchman, denouncing Catholics' complaints of persecution as false propaganda.
