

Jack-of-the-Beanstalk Leaves For Boston with Case of Beans

Stanton's "Jack-of-the-Beanstalk," little eight-year-old Denny Frank, was the man of the hour in Salem Thursday night.

More than 200 of his townspeople, a brass band and a flock of dignitaries gave Denny a rousing sendoff at Salem's airport when he left by plane to deliver a case of Santiam beans to the bean city of Boston, Mass.

Denny, the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Frank of Stanton, looked just a bit bewildered by all the sudden attention and the large crowd of well wishers.

Like any other celebrity, he was interviewed by a Salem radio station announcer a few minutes before he climbed aboard a United Airlines plane for his 3,000-mile journey.

Asked by the announcer what kind of beans he was taking to Boston, Denny looked perplexed and said: "Boston baked beans." He added that he'd never taken a plane ride and would like to get going.

Leaving with Denny on the 8:55 p.m. northbound flight were Gene Malecki, Salem, manager of the 1949 Santiam Bean festival and creator of "Jack-of-the-Beanstalk" and his mother.

"Jack" was clad in a green Robin Hood suit he will wear during Stanton's annual bean event from July 26 to 30. He will present Boston's Mayor James M. Curley with the case of Santiam beans in exchange for a pot of Boston baked beans which Curley claims are "the best beans in the world."

Denny was chosen from a field of eight small boys in a pre-festival popularity poll. His competitors—Kenneth Ware, Paul Freres, Gail Elmer, Thumper Julian, Leroy Fender, Jackie Ditter and Ray Markham—were all on hand like good sports to wish him a good trip.

Appearing on the radio program with Denny were Stanton's Mayor Clifford Lakes, Mayor R. L. Elstrom of Salem and Lawson McCall, secretary to Gov. Douglas McKay. The party will return July 25.

Bonus Seekers Request Copies of Discharges

Credit Group Slates Sale Trend Talks

Important problems in the credit field will be discussed again today as 33 representatives of Credit Bureaus, Inc., enter the second of a three-day session here.

The present trend of business from cash sales to time payment systems prompted the meeting, said Francis W. Smith of Salem, president and general manager of the organization.

Adjusting to the increasing number of accounts that are coming in to all of the firm's 22 bureaus for collection is an important phase of the meeting, said Smith. A credit education program for both businessmen and consumers is being planned for this fall, he added.

Estonian Father Cries Over First American Meal

PORTLAND, July 21—(AP)—An Estonian father, coming to this country with his wife and baby daughter, cried when he sat down to his first American meal.

That was because it was so good, explained Gustav Vaga. He had two fried eggs — and he hadn't tasted an egg since the war broke out in Germany.

Vaga and his family arrived here today to make their home. An Estonian native who was drafted into slave labor by Germany, he was brought here by a church group. A bricklaying job awaits him.

Scott Opponents Think Gabrielson Chairman Choice

WASHINGTON, July 21—(AP)—Anti-Scott forces said today there is a good chance that Guy George Gabrielson, New Jersey lawyer-industrialist, will be named chairman of the Republican national committee.

Rep. Hugh D. Scott, jr., of Pennsylvania, says he will resign the chairmanship Aug. 4 to promote harmony in party ranks.

One anti-Scott leader told a reporter today, however, that Gabrielson appears to be the most likely choice. He said New York supporters of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey have opposed Gabrielson because he was for Senator Taft of Ohio for the presidential nomination last year.

Flames Damage Klamath Hospital

KLAMATH FALLS, July 21—(AP)—Fire chased 28 hospital patients to safety here today, but the flames were put out without injury or loss of life.

The flames broke out on the roof of the Hillside hospital in the afternoon. Staff members moved the patients to the Klamath Valley hospital as a precautionary measure.

Damage by fire and water was estimated tentatively at \$20,000. Both hospitals are owned by the Klamath Medical Service bureau.

First Woman Treasurer Signs for Cash

WASHINGTON, July 21—(AP)—Assured by six accountants that this sum is correct, Mrs. Georgia Neese Clark today took formal custody of the riches in the U. S. treasurer's vaults: \$27,424,541.357.78 — and 3/4 of a cent.

Mrs. Clark is the first woman treasurer of the United States. She took office a month ago.

The 3/4 of a cent turned on a 113-year-old bond issued by the state of Tennessee. It totaled \$1,666.67.

But it's uncollectable. The bonds were issued to pay for a road. Tennessee said union troops tore it up and the federal government wouldn't pay the damage. So Tennessee wouldn't pay the bonds.

They had been acquired by the government as an investment for Chickasaw Indian tribal money. To make amends to the Chickasaws, congress ordered the treasury to pay five per cent interest on the Indian fund.

So the treasury pays the interest and hangs on to the bonds.

Elliott to Air Own Defense

PORTLAND, July 21—(AP)—Sheriff M. L. Elliott planned today to come to his defense in a radio broadcast, while an independent group called a public meeting Sunday in the sheriff's support.

The support meeting was sponsored by Grover C. Fretwell of the legal defense movement. The democratic central committee chairman, who supports the sheriff, said neither he nor the sheriff had heard of it in advance.

Meanwhile 2,400 signatures on recall petitions have been turned into the county clerk's office for verification. A total of 30,528 are needed.

The date of the sheriff's broadcast has not been set.

Cherrians Group To Attend Miss Oregon Pageant

A big turnout of Salem Cherrians is expected for the Miss Oregon pageant at Seaside this week end. King Bing Deryll Myers reported Thursday.

Cherrians will march in the parade at 12:30 p.m. Sunday, preceding final selection of Miss Oregon, for which title Connie Cross, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Olin Cross, 2370 Fairgrounds rd., is the Miss Salem entry.

Salem tickets reservations for the 2 p.m. Sunday final selection will be available at the Seaside chamber of commerce or Seaside hotel.

Military Load of North Atlantic Pact too Heavy, Cordon Says

WASHINGTON, July 21—(AP)—Senator Guy Cordon (R-Ore.) said tonight he had voted against ratification of the North Atlantic treaty because it "would saddle us with a monstrous military load that we can't carry."

He said tonight: "The Atlantic pact is inextricably tied up with furnishing arms to the nations that are parties to it. Any denial of this fact is a denial of what is patently a fact."

"The minute a reservation was presented it was voted down. That implies at least acceptance of the reserve."

"At the present time we are spending up to \$14,000,000,000 a year in this country and that would not give us the kind of national defense that would hold one half the line in Europe against the Russians, even if we could get our strength over there in time."

"Even before we had finished the hearings on economic aid for Europe — to cost \$17-billion between now and 1952 — the beneficiary nations were already asking that aid go beyond 1952. And that is purely civilian economic aid. We couldn't set up the kind of military establishment that would give them the kind of security they want. You can't blame them for wanting it. But we can't do it."

"We can't carry the load for our own protection and at the same time set up the military establishment that those countries feel they must have."

Blood Stains in House Raise Fears for Tacoma Area Couple

TACOMA, Wash., July 21—(AP)—A pathologist found bits of human flesh in two bullet holes today at the blood-spattered home of an elderly couple missing for several days.

The stains, reported Dr. C. E. Larson, the pathologist, were made by human blood.

He estimated the bullet holes had been made late Saturday or Sunday.

The couple, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Easley, were not missed until a relative called and found the house occupied by strangers. Capt. John Kenders, chief of the sheriff's detective division, identified them as Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Love and said he had taken them into protective custody.

Sheriff's officers said they found indications an attempt had been made in the back yard of the modern home, seven miles south of Tacoma, to dig a grave. Late today they were searching in the brush near the home for any trace of the Easleys.

Easley was 62 and his wife, Elizabeth, 67.

Kenders said the Loves told him they had rented the house four days ago and they had not noticed the stains or bullet holes. The stains, found in every room, were faint. A pile of blood-stained clothing was found in a box in a shed at the rear of the house.

The Loves related, said Kenders, that they had taken the house in a neighborhood tavern from a man driving a black automobile. Kenders said the car answered the description of the Easley's and also missing.

Kenders said that the Loves told a story like this: Love was approached at a gas station by a stranger Sunday morning who offered him free use of his house for a few weeks while he went on a "vacation." He said he wanted someone to take care of his rabbits.

Love said he drove to the house where, he said, everything seemed to be in order. The Loves moved in the next day.

"Shortly after we moved in," Love continued, "my wife pulled me by the sleeve into the kitchen. 'That looks like blood,' she said, pointing to some big red smears on the floor."

Love said he recalled some berries and canning equipment in another room and believed the stains to be berry juice.

Kenders said that the car driven by the "stranger" answered the description of the missing Easley automobile, which bears the license number B-13566. A relative added that \$130 was missing from the house.

One was \$80 from the state system of high education; another \$150 from Delta Delta Delta; and the last \$600 from the American legion auxiliary for her essay on "The Place of Education in a Democracy."

Wedding Note Leads Groom To Prison Cell

ASTORIA, July 21—(AP)—A bridegroom whose wedding announcement led to his arrest faced the prospect today of spending the first 10 years of his married life in prison.

A 10-year sentence — the stiffest meted in court here for two years — was imposed upon Robert E. McCready after he pleaded guilty to forging checks.

Police had been hunting vainly for months for McCready, who was accused of cashing bad checks up and down the coast by purchasing flowers for out-of-town funerals and then having the florist cash a check.

Early this week an officer happened to glance at the Astoria Budget's society section — and there was a notice of McCready's marriage. Officers arrested him honeymooning in Kelso, Wash.

Deputy Unsure Marksmanship A Good Thing
PORTLAND, July 21—(AP)—Deputy Sheriff Clyde Lowry shot an enormous bird near Bonneville, and he's still trying to decide whether to be proud or ashamed about it.

The deputy shot the bird — the thought it was a hawk — because residents complained of losing chickens to it. He said the hawk measured 5 feet 4 inches from wingtip to wingtip.

But just after that was reported, Stanley Jewett jr., of the U. S. fish and wildlife service said Lowry probably broke a law. The bird, Jewett said, sounded like an osprey, protected by state law.

"Oh," groaned the deputy sheriff, "I must have stuck my neck out."

A little later the telephoned back jubilantly to say that residents of the area told him it was a Cooper's hawk — quite all right to kill.

But Jewett said no. "Cooper's hawks," he said, "never get that big."

So Lowry still doesn't know whether he performed a public service or broke a law.

Polio Treating Course Offered For City Area

A course of instruction in the care and treatment of polio victims will begin Monday night at Salem Memorial hospital, it was reported Thursday.

Mrs. Adam Lefor, superintendent of nurses at the hospital, will conduct the course. It is open to nurses, nurses' aides and all other persons interested in the technique of polio treatment.

During the first week of instruction, beginning Monday, the class will be held Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights. They are to begin at 7 o'clock in the hospital chapel. The second week course will be a repetition of the first and will be held on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday nights.

Members of a new advisory committee on local polio problems met Thursday noon at the Spa restaurant. Appointed by Dr. Harold O. Schneider, chief of medical staff at the Salem Memorial hospital, they include Dr. William Crothers, Dr. Tom H. Dunham, Dr. Paul Wolfe, Dr. Lewis D. Clark, Dr. Thad Moreland and Dr. Robert F. Anderson. Dr. W. J. Stone, Marion county health officer, and Mrs. Lefor also work with the group.

Tax Commission Talks Microfilm To Save File Space

Microfilming the tax records of the state tax commission, in order to reduce storage space and provide a permanent file of all tax transactions, is being considered by the commission, Ray Smith, in charge of the state income tax division, declared Thursday.

Smith predicted that such a program would reduce the space now used for files by approximately 50 per cent and simplify the operations of the tax department. He said the cost of microfilming the tax records had not been determined definitely and there was some question whether it would be cheaper for the state to install its own equipment or have the work done by a private concern.

In conducting the investigation the commission is taking into consideration the so-called "secrecy clause," under which all income taxes and many other tax records are treated as confidential.

Dallas Police Officer Returns to Duty Status

DALLAS, July 21—(Special)—Arthur Teterud, assistant chief of the Dallas police force, was back on duty Thursday following recovery from injuries incurred nearly four months ago in a motorcycle accident.

He sustained torn shoulder tendons and four broken ribs when his machine collided with a car turning into a driveway.

Railroad Worker Cleared of Murder

EUGENE, July 21—(AP)—Howard Jack Holmes, middle aged railroad laborer, said Thursday afternoon when told that he was wanted for murder after all, "I'm worried about getting my job back."

Holmes had been brought by state police from his job near Oakridge when Portland officers notified them he was wanted in connection with a hobo slaying in Davenport, Iowa. It turned out that the bulletin listing Holmes was about a year obsolete, and had been issued by Illinois officials, but later cancelled.
