Summer Fluff

Rice Combined with Meat, Vegetables Make Good Summertime Main Dishes

Veal seems a practical meat for summer, and the combination of veal and rice is a happy one. The rice association send this suggestion for:

VEAL and RICE RING

- 1 onion
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 1/2 cups cooked rice
- 2 1/2 cups previously cooked veal
- 1 tablespoon green pepper
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 egg
- 1 cup milk

Put 1 cup of white rice, 1 teaspoon salt and 2 cups cold water in a two-quart saucepan. Cover with a tight-fitting lid. Set over a hot flame until it boils vigorously. Then reduce the heat as low as possible and simmer for 14 minutes more. During this time the rice will absorb the water and come out deliciously tender. Remove the lid to permit the rice to steam dry. Lift rice with a fork to test its consistency. Never stir rice while cooking — and the grains will be separate and tender. Makes approximately 3 1/2 cups fluffy white rice. Keep left-over cooked rice in a covered bowl in refrigerator — you'll find it handy next time you're in a hurry to fix a quick meal.

Brown the chopped onion in the butter. Mix the cooked rice and ground cooked veal and chopped pepper together. Add the rest of the ingredients and put in a well-buttered eight-inch mold. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. This will yield six servings. Tomatoes will soon be in abundance.
