Willamina Gets Duty Firemen, Added Lighting

WILLAMINA—Two members of the Willamina volunteer fire department are on active duty all day on Sunday, during the critical fire season, it has been announced, in order that more prompt and effective service may be given in case of emergency.

The city reservoir received a thorough cleaning Saturday night under the supervision of Fire Chief A. D. Newby and Assistant Chief Martin Myers.

Officials of Portland General Electric company have announced that they expect to start installation of the new city street lights some time next week. Thirteen new lights, of the modern mercury vapor type, will be put in between the south end of the narrow bridge over Willamette creek and the intersection of Main and D streets. The new lights will cost the city an additional \$60 per month, but city officials believe this will be a worthwhile investment from a safety standpoint.

Lester N. Bennett, Jr., Yamhill county sanitary officer, was in Willamina Wednesday, accompanying Perry Beck, city water supervisor, on a survey of sanitary facilities in town, including properly installed and inadequate septic tanks. He will make an official report to city officials giving specific recommendations, following which it is likely that some property owners will be required to take steps to remedy unsanitary conditions.

Funds Sought For Sewerage; Plan Detailed

INDEPENDENCE—No definite action has been taken by the city council of Monmouth on the proposed combined sewerage disposal for Monmouth and Independence, but Mayor Howard Morlan reports the council favors the plan. A joint meeting of the Independence and Monmouth city councils will be planned soon.

At the present, the council is soliciting Oregon College of Education for a portion of the funds required for Monmouth and is approaching the board of the new joint high school for funds.

According to a report on the plan, the plant should be for an average flow of not less than 1,000,000 gallons per day. It would serve 6,000 population at 150 gallons per day per capita.

The 15-inch trunk sewer joining the two cities will start in Monmouth with a supplementary disposal plant and run on the north side of the highway through the proposed high school site and to Independence. The combined disposal plant site is to be built across the Independence - Salem highway on the river about even with the fill just north of the city.

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Soybeans Up Limit; Other Grain Variable

CHICAGO, July 22 (AP)—July soybeans jumped 10 cents, the daily limit, as trading in all July contracts was closed out on the board of trade today.

The upturn carried July soybeans to the highest point at which it has sold since trading in it started back last November. At the top of \$2.82 1/2, it was up 8 3/4 cents from the low revised during the general price break in February.

July wheat ended 1/4 lower to 1 cent higher, July corn 3 1/2 lower, July oats 1 1/4 lower, July soybeans 7 1/4 to 10 cents higher and July rye 2 cents a hundred pounds lower.

Deferred wheat futures were 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 higher, corn 1/4 to 1 cent lower, oats 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, rye 1/4 to 2 cents lower, soybeans 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher and July 5 cents a hundred pounds lower.

Firmness in wheat followed overnight news that a large bakery chain had bought flour equivalent to 2,500,000 bushels of wheat overnight. It was also announced the government had procured flour equal to 317,381 bushels of wheat for shipment to Austria.

Caution Note Slows Stock Mart Trading

NEW YORK, July 22 (AP)—Caution keynoted trading in stocks today.

The market for the most part steered a narrow course between lukewarm demand and at the final bell losses and gains were thoroughly scrambled.

Business was the slowest in the past ten days. Only 730,000 shares changed hands, compared with 780,000 Thursday, and more than 1,000,000 each on the two preceding days.

Air line shares had the benefit of some excellent current earnings reports.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dipped 1 of one point to 62.4. The railroad group ended unchanged but the industrial and utility sections were a trifle lower.

A total of 910 individual issues changed hands, the smallest since July 5. Of these 358 advanced and 289 declined.
