

Talbot Project Needed to Halt Soil Erosion

Soil erosion of the Santiam river near Talbot can be stopped effectively only by a major channel stabilization program, army engineers reported to the Marion county court Monday.

The report was in answer to a letter written May 31 by Judge Grant Murphy which asked investigation of erosion on the Karel Tomasek farm near Talbot.

The county court feared erosion might change the river course and wash out several county bridges if a flood should arise. None of Tomasek's cultivated lands are threatened as yet.

Lt. Col. D. A. Eliot, acting district engineer, said the river is changing course constantly and only a major stabilization program would be of permanent value.

Eliot added that if federal funds are made available he will "attempt to get approval of a project" for the section.

Salem Chosen as Testing Ground For New Cigaret

A 15th century "cavalier" will parade through Salem today, and all because Salem is one of several western test markets for a tobacco company with a new brand of cigarettes.

Several open cars and other autos with police escort will parade at 11:45 a.m. from Portland road through the city on highways to the south, displaying several Salem girls and a brightly costumed "cavalier" to publicize placing the new product on the Salem market prior to general distribution and advertising through the nation.

The product? Cavalier cigarette, king-size, standard-price and made by R. J. Reynolds Co.

Circuit Judge Hears Fishing Gear Law Suit

A suit to annul a law prohibiting use of fixed fishing appliances on the Columbia river at its tributaries went on trial Monday in Marion county circuit court.

The suit was filed by Pete Anthony and others against the state fish commission and charges the law prohibiting such fishing does irreparable damage users of fixed appliances who have been licensed by the state.

The law was passed by the people of Oregon at the November general election.

Testimony was heard during the morning session but no decision had been reached when court adjourned in the afternoon.

In the opening testimony, Donald Johnson, biologist of the fish commission, explained the use of fixed appliances and said he believed fish taken from traps usually were in better condition than those taken from nets.

William Suerfert, fish packer of the Dalles, testified that Indians fishing at Celilo use set nets but that they no longer are licensed by the state. The state supreme court banned these licenses, he said.

Berhard Ready, commercial fisherman from Canas, Wash., said that drift rights, which entitle a fisherman to exclusive use of certain portions of the river by agreement among fishermen, all are being used at the present time. He said he knew of no rights available for sale.

Local Navy Air Unit to Receive Commission

A Salem naval air facility to train reservists in navy planes will be commissioned here August 5.

Comdr. Wallace Hug of the navy air establishment at Salem airport received word Monday that Salem's will be one of three Oregon facilities to be commissioned in the near future. The announcement came from Adm. R. F. Whitehead, Glenview, Ill., chief of U.S. naval air reserve training.

E. T. Eldridge now commands the volunteer reservists' group which has been taking weekly class work in preparation for arrival of planes and establishment of the new unit, to be later given an official number and titled Associated Volunteer Unit, Aviation.

Near 200 to Take Part

The 90 reserve officers and 99 enlisted men who have been with the volunteer unit are all expected to take part in the new training aloft. As many as possible will assemble at the airport on the second week end of each month for training. Other classwork, especially for those unable to train on week ends, will be held the first and third Wednesdays each month.

Planes due to the stationed here soon include four SNJ's (North American), two F6F's (Grumman Hellcats) and two SNB-1's (Beech), according to Comdr. Hug.

The two other navy reserve flying units to be commissioned will be from either Portland, Corvallis or Eugene, probably the first two named, said Hug.

When training with the planes progresses to the point where the navy establishes an organized training unit here, the men and officers will draw pay for their reserve training periods.

The commissioning at 3 p.m. Friday, August 5, will include special ceremonies coinciding with the stunt flying of the famous "Blue Angels" from Pensacola during the state American Legion convention here. The five Grumman Bearcat planes will be based here several days next week.

Burglars Loot Pedee Store

PEDEE, July 25—(Special)—State police were searching today for an unidentified person who early Sunday entered the Kings Valley store and stole an estimated \$2,000. The money was hidden in a refrigerator. Entrance to the general merchandise store, operated by J. V. Price, was gained by breaking a glass window in the front of the store.

Yarn Weaving Exhibit Slated

An exhibition in the hand-weaving of Angora yarn will be given here Thursday, July 28, at the Salem Chin Up club store, 1275 N. Church st., by Mrs. Mark H. Thompson of Woodburn.

Using a Danish spinning wheel Mrs. Thompson will demonstrate her skill from 10 a.m. to noon, from 1 to 5 p.m. and again from 6 to 7 p.m. The store is open to the public.

Mrs. Thompson took up the making of yarn about four years ago in New York. She raises her own Angora rabbits, from which she plucks the wool when it is from 3 1/2 to four inches long.

Monkey Helps As Baby Sitter

Objections to Storm Sewer Plan Voiced

Proposal for a new downtown storm sewer drew tentative objections from two aldermen at a Salem city council meeting Monday night in city hall.

Alderman David O'Hara asserted the near-\$1,000 cost might better be put into some relief for home owners in easily-flooded sections of Salem, and Alderman Albert H. Gille questioned whether the city is obligated to remedy drainage troubles of downtown businesses.

As a result the council returned to the city manager for study a previously requested report from City Engineer J. H. Davis on what could be done about a complaint from Salem Federal Savings & Loan Co. that its new building at 560 State st. was flooded by backed-up rain water dumped by nearby buildings into sanitary sewers. Davis recommended a storm sewer for relief, stating that the new building had a deeper basement and seemed to catch most of the water of the area.

The again - deferred Baldock plan brought sharp criticism from a North Summer street resident, Mrs. T. J. Brabec, who asserted the plan for one-way traffic on Summer street would soon become a bottleneck when new state buildings are erected at the south end.

Also deferred for further study by City Manager J. L. Franzen was a request for brief parking restriction on North Capitol street in front of the new Sears, Roebuck store. A 10-minute limit was asked by Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Co. and a 15-minute limit recommended by Franzen, but aldermen indicated this limit might cause congestion of Capitol street traffic with cars frequently backing into traffic lanes.

Permission was granted for the American Legion, in connection with next week's state convention here, to have a carnival at Marion square, for issue courtesy auto cards to visitors and to use a public address system for downtown announcements.

Hearings were called for August 8 on proposals for new business zones at 1240 Center st. and at the Home Fuel Co. site, 1710 N. Commercial st.

Civil service examinations for appointment of three permanent captains on the Salem police force will be held August 10 at the city hall, it was reported Monday by Police Chief Clyde A. Warren.

Two temporary captains are on the force now, said Warren. They are Walter Esplin and Stanley Friese. A third captain has been authorized by the last city budget committee.

All members of the Salem police who have been on the force under civil service for at least three years are eligible to take the exams, Chief Warren stated.

Alger Appointed to Polk Welfare Commission

DALLAS, July 24—(Special)—Mrs. R. S. Kreson, Dallas, has been replaced on the Polk county welfare commission by E. D. Alger, Independence.

Mrs. Kreson, a member for 1 1/2 terms, asked Gov. Douglas McKay not to reappoint her as other duties conflicted. Her term expired June 30. Alger's term is for four years.

Extradition of Pair Sought, California

Extradition will be asked for two carnival workers charged with the armed robbery Friday morning of George E. Fuller of Rickreall, Marion County Sheriff Denver Young said Monday afternoon.

The two youths, Norman Betts, 21, and James Reed, 20, were captured Sunday morning by authorities in Red Bluff, Calif. Two girls from Bend, aged 14 and 16, who reported to police that they had been abducted, also were held at Red Bluff.

Meanwhile Sheriff James N. Froome of Red Bluff said the FBI would file charges against the men of taking a stolen car across a state line at Sacramento, Calif. The girls are to be released to their parents today. Possibility of abduction charges seemed unlikely, said the sheriff.

The girls' parents came for them Sunday night but Sheriff Froome refused to release them, according to the Associated Press Monday night. He said the men told him the girls had helped repaint the stolen car in which they were travelling.

The men were found asleep in the car on a country road near Red Bluff after the girls went to police with their story. The men were armed but offered no resistance.

The Salem charge is based on armed robbery of Fuller, who was left trussed up in a field. The men later abandoned his car, and held up Linn Long, Eugene, and made off with his automobile and money.

British Face Mine, Railway Strike Threats

LONDON, July 25—(AP)—Britain's labor government was harassed by strike threats in the state-owned coal mines and railways today, just as London dockers ended their month-long walkout.

Prime Minister Attlee called his cabinet into session twice during the day to ponder ways of averting new rail and mine strikes which would cripple the government's fight to beat the economic crisis.

Delegates representing the country's 400,000 railway workers voted to postpone action on a proposed slowdown until their spokesmen meet with Labor Minister George Isaacs tomorrow on pay raise demands.
