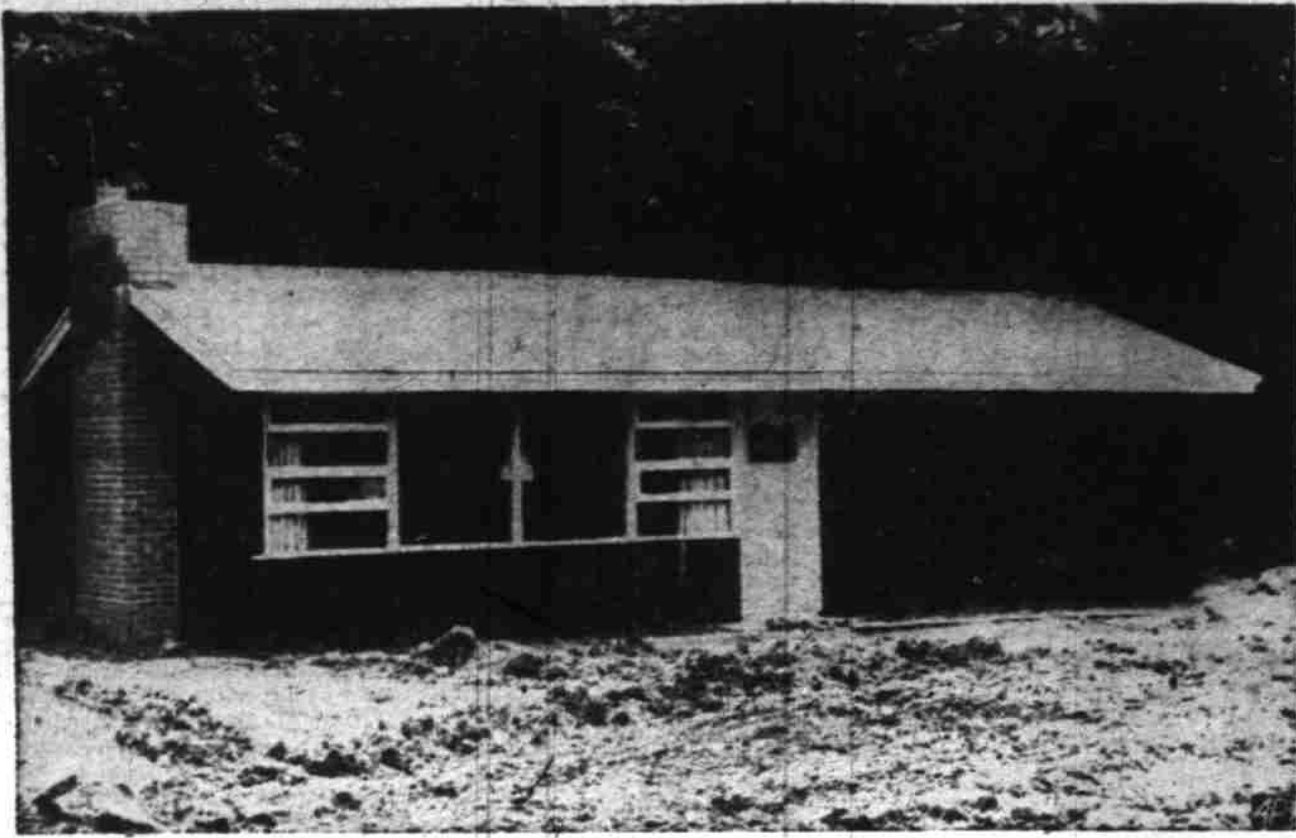


A Hope for Housing Difficulties
