Boy Drowns In Ocean at Church Camp

REDMOND, July 26 (AP)—The death of a Redmond boy in the surf at a coastal church camp was reported here today. Lloyd Welch, 17-year-old son of Lawrence Welch, Redmond, drowned yesterday at Camp W. Ne-Ma, a Christian Service camp on the Oregon coast near Tillamook. The Rev. O. Wendell Herblison, Redmond, said Welch took a boat out into the breakers despite a warning. The boat was knocked over by a wave, and Welch—who could not swim—was carried off by the undertow. The body was recovered later, but five and a half hours of artificial respiration failed. It was the camp's first fatality in 15 years of operation.

Bruns, Stehn To Lead Music At State Fair

The musical rostrum of the Oregon state fair, opening here September 5, was completed Tuesday with an announcement that George Bruns and his orchestra of Portland will play during the dances and stage shows. The Eugene municipal band, under the direction of John Stehn, will be the official state fair band this year. The Eugene band was employed here during last year's fair.

Solon Seeks ECA Aid for Pulp Industry

WASHINGTON, July 26 (AP)—Assistance of the economic cooperation administration in giving the American pulp industry a shot in the arm was requested today by Rep. Jackson (D-Wash). Jackson suggested that ECA Administrator Paul Hoffman ask Britain and Canada to break off their agreement whereby the British buy nearly all of their pulp from the dominion. In a letter to Hoffman, the Washington congressman pointed out that most of Britain's dollars come from ECA funds. Jackson said American producers only want a chance to bid competitively in the pulp market.

Union Pacific to Lay Off 400 Men

OMAHA, July 26 (AP)—The Union Pacific railroad disclosed today it has started to lay off 400 mechanical employees, 220 of them in the Omaha shops. Railroads customarily call such layoffs "furloughs." P. J. Lynch, vice president, said he hopes they are furloughs in this case "but I'm not too optimistic."

Philippine Huks Infiltrate Manila to Escape Fighting

By Frank Emery International News Service Staff Correspondent MANILA (INS)—Filipino police officials are convinced that scores of Huk guerrillas, attempting to flee from hard hitting government forces in Central Luzon, are infiltrating into Manila. The new wave of infiltrations is caused primarily by a major military campaign in which nearly 3,000 crack Government troops have been hurled into bitter fighting against the insurgents in Central Luzon. At least, this is the belief of Colonel Eduardo Quintos, Manila Police chief, who said he is prohibited by law from arresting "peaceful" Hukbalahaps living in the Philippine National Capital. He told International News Service: "At present, we know the location of most Communists and Huks in Manila. But there is no law that says we can apprehend them for holding membership in the Huk movement. Furnish information. "There are many Huks in Manila. I call them ex-Hukbalahaps because they do not disturb peace and order although many are sent to the city to gain information. Actually, the Huk spy system is so well organized in Manila that some observers claim its destruction would be impossible under the present Philippine legal code. Quintos indicated that even government officials are not free of suspicion. A police officer was recently arrested when his membership in the Hukbalahap movement was discovered. As a result, Quintos said careful screening of all policemen and officers have been undertaken. He added: "We are screening our policemen in order to detect Huks or Huk sympathizers who act as spies. So far, however, we have found none." Quintos asserted that it is impossible to estimate the Huk population in Manila or make similar estimates of communists. Aside from this, he said Manila police are currently working with Constabulary authorities, whose military courts are used to try Hukbalahaps arrested by police for violating "peace and order" in Manila.

'Disc' Flies Over Redmond

WASHINGTON, July 26 (AP)—President Truman, who in the past has had some biting things to say about the American press, spoke a good word today. He told a group of German and Austrian editors and publishers that the United States has a "great many wonderful newspapers." Mr. Truman did not name any he had in mind. The president received the foreign newspapermen in the rose garden of the White House where he posed for photographs with them. He said he understood that the visitors had heard it wouldn't be possible to be photographed with the United States' chief executive and he wanted to give them their opportunity to have this done. The foreign newsmen—19 Germans and 3 Austrians—arrived here Monday for a four day stay in the capital to observe the way government officials meet with newspapermen. Their visit to this country was arranged by the office of education.

Ecuador Revolt Flares, Dies; 2 Casualties

QUITO, Ecuador, July 26 (AP)—A revolt against the government of President Galo Plaza Lasso flared and died in a matter of hours here early today. The government listed only two casualties, a policeman killed and a police chauffeur wounded by the gunfire of a rebel prisoner as the two were driving him to police headquarters. Swift counter action repulsed an armed attack on the presidential palace. Troops rounded up Col. Carlos Mancheno, former dictator and a group of officers who were trying to induce a tank detachment in the southern part of the city to join the uprising. Up to 60 persons, mostly retired military men, were arrested. Mancheno in 1947 overthrew the constitutional government of President Velasco Ibarra. His dictatorship lasted only eight days. He resigned and fled to Argentina after promising troops loyal to the constitutional government headed for Quito and defeated units of the Quito garrison in a battle 50 miles south of the capital. He returned later and devoted himself to farming. Oberlin college in northeastern Ohio was the first American college to adopt co-education.
