Baruch Backs Less U.S. Aid For Europe

NEW YORK, July 26—(AP)—Bernard Baruch came back from Europe today on the Queen Mary with these ideas on things in general:

The Marshall Plan is effective "but not as effective as it should have been."

"There's a heap of sense" in the idea that Europe would help herself more if we helped her less.

The English are spending too much time on nationalization and "not devoting sufficient energy to developing their country and its production."

There is no "slump" in America and "if we happen to lose a little money—and we've suffered this before—we'll tighten our belts and go ahead as we have done."

It's not true that this country is "looking more toward the left than to the right—no nation ever adopted communism voluntarily."

The attack on Mrs. Franklin Roosevelt by Francis Cardinal Spellman over her stand on federal education aid and the resulting controversy were "very unfortunate."

The cardinal is "a fine and religious man" and Mrs. Roosevelt is "free from any intolerance—race, color or creed."

NEWPORT, July 26—(AP)—Newport, which despite its 5,000 residents still has an old fashioned postoffice box system, may get regular mail delivery soon.

An application for door to door delivery was sent to the postmaster-general by Postmaster Frank Payden. The proposal bore the okay of Postal Inspector H. E. Young, who called Newport one of the largest towns in this region without mail delivery.

Three postmen would be employed.

Anderson to Offer Farm Bill Compromise

WASHINGTON, July 26—(AP)—Senator Clinton Anderson (D-NM), former secretary of agriculture, guardedly discussed today a compromise farm price support program he said he would offer tomorrow.

All he would say about it was that it entails a flexible support program under which the level of government loans and purchases could be lowered to counteract excessive production.

Anderson let out word of his proposed compromise after his successor, Secretary of Agriculture Brannan, reportedly had stiff-armed all proposals for compromises in his own subsidy payment plan. Brannan attended a long session of the senate agriculture committee, held behind closed doors.

The house last week rejected the Brannan plan, and the senate agriculture committee has given not the slightest indication it will approve it either.

GOP Forms Substitute for Arms Program

WASHINGTON, July 26—(AP)—An "economy size" substitute for President Truman's history-making program of military aid to non-communist nations was reported taking shape among republican supporters of the bi-partisan foreign policy today.

Senators Vandenberg of Michigan and Dulles of New York, together with Representative Vorys of Ohio, were reported working on a plan to start the new program of military assistance with \$602,000,000 in cash and existing arms originally worth \$450,000,000.

The cash outlay they were said to have in mind compares with \$1,450,000,000 asked by the president.

The program is designed to help stabilize grower prices by keeping low quality nuts off the market.

The hearing is being held, the department said, at the request of the Northwest Nut Growers, a cooperative association with headquarters at Dundee, Ore.

K. of C. Meet to Hear McGrath

PORTLAND, July 26—(AP)—Senator J. Howard McGrath of Rhode Island, democratic national chairman, will address the Knights of Columbus national convention here Aug. 16.

Dan Hay, general convention chairman, said McGrath will address the States dinner the night the convention opens.

McGrath, prominent catholic layman, has been mentioned as a possible successor to the late Supreme Court Justice Frank Murphy.

Francis P. Matthews, secretary of the navy, also is expected at the convention which continues through Aug. 18.

Hawaii Governor Asks Government Seizure of Docks

HONOLULU, July 26—(AP)—Hawaii's governor today asked his legislature for government seizure and operation of docks "to bring an end to the progressive paralysis" caused by 87 days of CIO stevedore strike.

Minutes later the senate rammed through on first reading 19 labor bills and a resolution to investigate communism in the island.

The bills would restrict the right to strike in public utilities, stevedoring, hospitals, sugar and pineapple industries.

We must insure continued operation of shipping," Gov. Ingram M. Stainback told a joint meeting of senate and house he summoned into special session. "We cannot do that unless the government itself takes over the stevedoring operations with its own employees, or is empowered to do so whenever necessity arises."

Colorful Ceremony Dedicates Salem's Navy-Marine Armory

Salem's \$400,000 navy-marine training center (picture on page one) was dedicated Tuesday night in colorful ceremonies witnessed by more than 700 citizens, uniformed reservists and visiting dignitaries.

The armory with its 40 rooms for training classes, offices and services was officially placed in the custody of Lt. Comdr. David Morey, inspector-instructor in charge of the center, by Rear Adm. Howard H. Good, commander of the 13th naval district.

During the ceremony Adm. Good and Brig. Gen. William L. McKittrick addressed an overflow crowd on the bleachers and seats outside the airport road armory and the massed formation of five local reserve units under combined command of Maj. Leonard Hicks, senior unit commander.

Includes Local Units

Some 200 troops in the formation included the surface navy reserve unit commanded by Lt. Comdr. Coburn Grabenhorst, the marine reserve howitzer battery commanded by Hicks, air reservists commanded by Lt. Ernest Eldridge, and two Seabee units headed by Lt. William C. Hill and Lt. Donald Fisher.

Visiting navy and marine dignitaries were introduced by Morey and special civilian guests by Lt. Comdr. Vernon Gilmore, who commanded the navy reserve when it formed here after World War II, and layed groundwork for the establishment of the armory.

After the ceremony hundreds of guests streamed through the large armory to inspect various classroom exhibits, training equipment, recreation and office facilities. The local Navy Mothers club served refreshments. A Portland marine reserve band played before and during the presentation ceremony.

Mayor R. L. Elstrom and Chamber of Commerce President Roy Harlan were among the special citizen guests on the speakers' platform.

Gen. Vaughan Miffed, Cancels Press Talk

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., July 26—(AP)—Maj. Gen. Harry H. Vaughan, President Truman's military aide, called off a press conference here today after he became miffed over reporters' questioning.

Gen. Vaughan, here for the Reserve Officers Association convention, landed at the Grand Rapids airport.

A reporter for a Grand Rapids newspaper (The Herald) started asking him about the medals he had on his uniform, the "five percenters" under investigation in Washington and other matters.

Gen. Vaughan abruptly broke off the interview. A short time later his press conference, scheduled for 4 p.m., was cancelled.

A captain handling press relations for the reserve officers attributed the action to the incident at the airport.

U.S. Housewife Takes Beating As Bullfighter

TUDELA, Spain, July 26—(AP)—A young American housewife took her first real step today toward her career as a bullfighter. It hurt.

Mrs. Edith Laurie-Entin, 21, of New York City, fought two yearling heifers. She was knocked flat several times. She came up smiling and said she'd be back for more.

Mrs. Laurie-Entin, who wants to become the first woman bullfighter from the United States, tangled with the two heifers in a tiny private bullring on a ranch near this north Spanish town.

The heifers had only half-inch horns. On one occasion she was caught almost head-on and went head over heels.

Her instructors were Julian and Isidro Marin, brothers who are professional bullfighters. They praised her courage but said she still has a lot to learn.

Mrs. Laurie-Entin left New York July 1 for Spain. She has been studying the theory of bull fighting during her stay.

Today was her first real practice. Afterwards she left for Barcelona en route home to the United States. She said her husband, Richard, a chemical distributor, was insisting that she return.

Weather Forecast: Thermometer to Rise—70 Miles

CHICAGO, July 26—(AP)—Scientists are building a special thermometer to be shot 70 miles high in a rocket. The data recorded will be helpful to a man on the trip to the moon, its builder said Monday.

The thermometer is being built under supervision of Dr. Severin Raynor at the Armour Research Foundation of the Illinois Institute of Technology.

Dr. Raynor said the tests probably would be made in 1950 in a V-2 rocket.

Demo Leaders Back ECA Cut

WASHINGTON, July 26—(AP)—Democratic senate leaders agreed today to slash \$419,820,000 off the funds asked by President Truman for the Marshall Plan's second year.

They fought other changes which they claimed would "cripple" the European Recovery program, however, and won 41 to 37 in their first senate test on this issue.

The vote came on a proposal of the senate appropriations committee to cut \$74,000,000 off the pending appropriation for the economic cooperation administration, in addition to the general 10 per cent slash to which the democratic leaders agreed.
