

3-Year-Old Wins at Stayton; Bean Festival Parade Tonight

STAYTON, July 28—(Special)—About 1,500 people watched tiny, 3-year-old Bobbie Christiansen of Stayton win the junior division of the Bean Festival amateur show for children here Thursday night. Wearing a top hat and tails, he also won a huge round of applause for singing "Cruising Down the River." Beverly Bauer, 4, a tap dancer from Corvallis, won the senior division top prize.

The Playmates club of Stayton won the grand sweepstakes in the children's parade. Their float depicted "the old woman who lived in a shoe."

Other winners, all from Stayton, were Gail Andersen and her dog, Penny, in the pet judging; Cheryl Angel, 4, in the costume class (wearing a majorette uniform); and Loyd and Marvin Fery and Cherry Ann Messer, as a wedding party, in the vehicle division. Approximately 100 children participated in the parade.

Nearly 100 entries are expected for the festival grand parade at 7 p. m. Friday. Towns sending floats include Independence, Detroit, Sublimity, Scio, Turner, Mehama, Lyons, Albany and Jefferson, in addition to Stayton. Bands from Albany and Jefferson and the Salem Junior Legion drum and bugle corps will perform. Among many other organizations scheduled to appear are the Salem Cherrians and their 1949 royal court, the Robin Hoods of Sherwood and the Newberg Berrians.

Following the parade, Santiam beans will be served free to everyone at Stayton's new community hall.

Ex-Bootblack Testifies on 5 Percenters

WASHINGTON, July 28—(AP)—A fabulous ex-bootblack with an entrée to the White House was a witness today at a secret session of senators investigating alleged "five percenters."

He is John Maragon, whose rise from shining shoes to the status of intimate of prominent men has been one of the minor sagas of the capital.

He appeared before a senate subcommittee looking into reports that persons claiming influence with government officials have been seeking to get government contracts for business men, for a 5 per cent fee.

Tarem Details Baltics' Role In Conquests

The 6,000,000 people of the Baltic states are not communistic by choice, it was averred Thursday in Salem by an Estonian who spent homeless years in European concentration camps before coming here as a displaced person.

He is Ardo Tarem, new physical department staff member of the Salem YMCA, who was brought to Salem with his family and established in a home by the YM and its supporters. He addressed Salem Lions club Thursday noon in the Marion hotel.

Tarem said he had learned that resistance to the communist influence of Soviet control in his native country is low, after nearly one-sixth of the population had been deported by the nazis or the Soviets. Tarem himself was deported with a group of 100 boys as slave labor for Germany during World War II and never got back to Estonia.

He said Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania are significantly located in Europe as a crossroads for ideas as well as for armed forces, and for that reason have assumed importance to nations like Russia who can nearly control 10 countries by being entrenched in the Baltic states.

The Lions club inducted into the membership Capt. Bert Walker of the state police. Dewey Robinson, West Salem member of Lions, played the piano and sang. Carl Greider of the YM staff introduced the speaker.

Medford Rent Decontrol Has Governor Okeh

Removal of rent controls in Medford was approved Thursday by Gov. Douglas McKay, who had earlier okehed an end to rent control in Eugene and Ashland.

Meanwhile, Salem City Recorder Alfred Munt announced he had delivered papers concerning the Salem city council's recommendation to lift rent controls to the statehouse Thursday afternoon. The governor has deferred comment on Salem's decontrol proposal pending receipt of the formal papers, including testimony at a local public hearing.

In approving an end to rent controls at Medford, the governor again outlined his feeling that he should abide by a city council's decision on the subject. The Medford council had asked decontrol despite objections from veterans and labor groups.

The formality of approval by the national housing expediter in Washington, D. C., is the only remaining step before controls are actually removed.

Recession 'Mostly Beneficial' And Orderly Report Asserts: Great Expansion Held Possible

PHILADELPHIA, July 28—(AP)—Recession from postwar business peaks has been "orderly and for the most part beneficial," the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia reported today in a midyear analysis of the state of the nation's business.

Summing up, the bank said the drop in employment and prices may not present a "pretty" picture but that these declines are necessary corrections of distortions created by World War II and the postwar period.

Two of the key distortions deal with dollars and production. Money held by individuals and business now totals more than 2 1/2 times the amount at the end of 1939. But production is less than double what it was before the war.

The bank noted declines in production during the first half of 1949 with resulting decreases in employment. But unemployment "has not yet reached what was regarded as the danger point in many previous discussions," the federal reserve bank said.

Heat, Selling Lower Stocks

NEW YORK, July 28—(AP)—Another day of sticky heat—or maybe it was a mild touch of selling pressure—put the stock market a trifle lower today.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dipped .1 of a point to 63.

Heat Kills 9 In DC; West Stays Pleasant

WASHINGTON, July 28—(AP)—The president of the Brookings Institution said today the United States has the ability to support a doubled population, 100 years from now, on a plane of living eight times as high as that of the present.

Dr. Harold G. Moulton, widely known economist, is the author of a 397-page report issued by the non-profit, privately endowed research organization.

Discussing those policies he said, for example, that the huge 100-year advance would require a continuing increase in productivity — or per-capita production — and a "progressive expansion of mass purchasing power," preferably through price reductions.
