Irl McSherry Once Editor Of Newspapers

Irl S. McSherry of Salem, who died Thursday, was born near Warrensburg, Mo., Sept. 5, 1896. With his family he moved to Milton-Freewater in 1908 and was graduated from high school there in 1915.

He received degrees of bachelor of arts and bachelor of science from Linfield college at McMinnville in 1920 and his master of science degree from Columbia university in New York City. He was a member of Phi Kappa Delta, forensic honorary.

He was editor of the McMinnville Telephone — Register from 1921 to 1925, and a year later became city editor of The Oregon Statesman. In 1927-28 he was managing editor of The Statesman, and in 1929 was editor of the Tillamook Headlight.

He was president of the Capital City Bindery here for 10 years starting in 1929. He married Elyn M. Doak of McMinnville in 1929. He was a member of the Baptist church, the Pacific Geographic society and a former Rotarian. He also was a member of the Salem planning and zoning commission, and had served as general manager of the Salem Centennial celebration in 1940.

Cherry Tariff Cut Protested From Chamber

A resolution protesting the proposed reduction of tariffs on brined cherries was sent to President Truman and to congressional delegations of Oregon, Washington and California Thursday by Salem Chamber of Commerce.

The resolution pertains to the proposed tariff reduction being considered by the state department in connection with a pending trade agreement with Italy.

It was stressed in the resolution that the present tariff is essential to continued existence of the American brined cherry industry which now uses more than 25 per cent of all sweet cherries produced in the United States.

Santiam Road Move Sought

A supplemental petition seeking a change in the road up the Little North fork of the Santiam river was filed with Marion county court Thursday.

The petition asks the court to place the road on the south bank of the river from Keel creek to Lumbers bridge and to slope the slide area farther up the river.
