

Stayton Float Sweeps Parade; Feed Tonight

STAYTON, July 29 (Special)—The float of the Stayton branch of the First National bank of Portland won the grand sweepstakes award here Friday as 10,000 people jammed Stayton streets for the San-tiam Bean festival parade.

Other winners were the Yamhill county sheriff's posse in mounted groups; Stayton Hardware and Furniture company, commercial; Paris Woolen mills, industrial; Stayton Plumbing company, comic; and Farwell pharmacy of Stayton, special.

Judges were Mayor Edison Vickers of Idanha, Mayor Carl Warren of Scio and Acting Mayor Paul Christensen of Silverton.

Among the many groups participating in the grand parade were Salem Merry-mans with King Bing Deryl Myers, Cherryland Queen Patricia O'Connor of Stayton and her royal court; Stayton Capital post 9 American Legion drum and bugle corps, and the Salem Eagles' junior drum and bugle corps.

A horse parade at 2 p.m. will start Saturday's activities, followed by a horse show at the high school grounds which will feature Willamette valley riding clubs. A program of sport contests for children will conclude afternoon events.

The big bean-hole bean feed will commence at 6 p.m. at the community building. A concert by the Stayton band is scheduled for 8 p.m. with the Bean Ball at the community building the final festival activity.

LOS ANGELES, July 29 (AP)—Surrounded by his gang, Mickey Cohen quit his hospital bed today to attend funeral services for his slain first lieutenant, Edward (Neddie) Herbert.

Sheriff's patrol cars cruised the streets and the sidewalks were sprinkled liberally with both uniformed and plainclothes deputies.

Union Oil Earnings Down for 6 Months

Union Oil company of California showed earnings of \$2.48 per share of common stock for the first six months of this year compared with \$3.42 a year ago, according to a report received here and released Friday by P. H. Boyd, district manager.

Quarterly dividend rate is being maintained at .625 cent per common share which has a current market value of about \$30. The company's income remains about the same as last year but expenses of doing business have increased by about \$2,500,000,000 for the six-months period, Boyd said.

Norblad Finds July Congress Action Illegal

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—Walter Norblad (R-Ore) said today that congress has been in illegal session since July 1 when the senate and house moved out of the regular chambers to permit repair of the shaky roofs.

"All legislation passed since," Norblad said, "is either void or, if not that, of very questionable legality."

Norblad based his contention on section five of article one of the Constitution. This reads:

"Neither house during the session of congress shall without the consent of the other adjourn for more than three days, nor to any place other than that in which the two houses shall be sitting."

The senate moved its meeting place from its regular chamber to the old supreme court room in the capitol while the house moved its sessions from the regular chamber to the ways and means committee room of the new house office building.

Norblad said neither house obtained the consent of the other though each adopted separate resolutions.

He said that in any event the error should be corrected as soon as possible for if "it was questioned after adjournment it would raise complete havoc with our normal functions of government and certainly we don't want that."

He said many important pieces of legislation have been passed by congress since July 1.

Norblad laid his contention before Speaker Rayburn (T-Tex.).

Couples Plead To Keep Cars As Welfare Aid

PORTLAND, July 29 (AP)—Two aged couples on welfare appealed to the state public welfare commission today to be allowed to keep their automobiles.

Autos, classed as a luxury, are not permitted for persons receiving old age assistance, except in unusual circumstances.

Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Bartholomew, Portland, said their 1935 model car would hardly bring more than \$125 on the market, and was necessary for them in buying groceries. "Neither of us is able to walk anywhere," the wife said.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Sager, who receive \$54 a month in old age assistance, made a similar plea, saying their car was used only to go marketing and to take Sager, who can not walk, to church.

The commission took both cases under consideration.

The commission today reaffirmed its policy of granting at least \$50 a month to old age pensioners as long as funds are available. The rate for hospital care was increased about \$1 a day per ward bed.

The Marion county public welfare commission protested last month's reductions of about \$60,000 in aid to dependent children. Iloa Howard, administrator of the public welfare, said the cut was necessary to keep within the budget.

Cease-Fire Agreed On Indonesia Fight

BATAVIA, Java, July 29 (AP)—Dutch and Indonesian Republican leaders agreed today on a cease-fire order to clear the way for formal peace and independence talks next month at The Hague.

The agreement marked the successful end of truce talks started last spring by the United Nations commission for Indonesia.

N. Y. POLIO GROWS
NEW YORK, July 29 (AP)—Forty-two new cases of infantile paralysis were reported in New York City today. Dr. Harry S. Mustard, health commissioner, said the "mild epidemic" probably will grow worse.

The department of hospitals said 157 persons now are hospitalized with the disease, the largest number since 1944.

Opinion Polls Now On Wire's Service

Western Union is now offering an opinion survey service, it was disclosed Friday by Arnold Davis, manager of Salem's Western Union telegraph office.

The telegraph company's new service will be available to advertising agencies, research and poll businesses. Under the plan, Western Union will interview persons at the direction of its customer agency and immediately return the results of the interviews. Interpretation of the information sent would be left to analysis by the experts of the customer agency.

Income, Excise Tax Collection Up 17 Per Cent

Net collections of personal income and corporation excise taxes for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1949, aggregated \$55,904,813, an increase of 17.8 per cent over the preceding year, the state tax commission reported here Friday.

Increases in wages, incomes and business activity during 1948 were the prime factors which boosted the income tax yield for the last fiscal year, officials said.

Individuals paid \$35,836,526 of the 1948-49 fiscal year collections of 64.2 per cent of the total collections, of which \$2,726,626 was collected on 1949 salary and wage payments which substantially represents advanced payments of employees' income taxes due on April 15, 1949, which have currently been withheld by employers. The comparable amount for fiscal year 1947-48 is \$30,863,181.

Personal income tax collections in 1948-49 advanced \$5,000,000, or 16.2 per cent over the year before. Officials said the degree of increase is astonishing in view of the fact that the personal income tax base was narrowed in 1948 which is the year upon which the 1948-49 collections are largely dependent.

Approximately 200,000 personal income tax returns filed this year claimed a refund.

Of the 193,000 returns upon which refunds were found actually due, the commission by last June 30 had issued 82,957 checks aggregating \$892,831 in refunds.

Corporations paid \$20,041,287 of the 1948-49 collections, an increase of 20.9 per cent over the corresponding amount paid by them during the previous fiscal year.

Corporation excise tax collections have nearly doubled over the past two years, as corporations paid only \$10,921,853 in excise taxes during 1946-47.

The total number of income tax returns filed during the past year is 809,988.

Total net collections, tax commissioners explained, are gross collections after refunds but before administrative expenses. Refunds amounted to \$977,497 in 1948-49, of which \$857,010 were withholding tax refunds made to individuals.

Mrs. Cecil Rhoades Dies in Portland

PORTLAND, July 29 (AP)—Mrs. Vivian Venell Rhoades, 47, Salem, whose father formerly published the Canby Herald, died in a hospital here yesterday after a three week illness.

The widow, Cecil, and a daughter, Mrs. Rex Schultz of Molalla, survive.

FDR, Jr., to Wed New York Socialite

NEW YORK, July 29 (AP)—Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., (D-NY) will marry socialite Suzanne Perrin of New York.

Their engagement was announced today by Miss Perrin's mother. It will be the second marriage for Roosevelt, who has two children, Franklin D. III, 10, and Christopher, 7, by his first marriage to the former Ethel Du Pont.

GOP Segment Asks Vitalized Party Policy

CHICAGO, July 29 (AP)—A group of republicans from 25 states, discontented with their party's policies, adopted a program today and laid the groundwork for a later "grass-roots" convention.

Fred A. Virkus of Chicago called the conference, contending the GOP needs revitalizing. The 105 attending all were either delegates or alternate delegates to the 1948 republican national convention.

Virkus himself is president of the Conference of American Small Businesses and a former Illinois state legislator.

After two days of close committee sessions, the dissident republicans:

Recommended a labor policy based on the Taft-Hartley law. Urged a farm policy based on government purchases in the open market.

"We oppose federal aid for housing eventually in socialism and the loss of individual liberties" (and) government use of the taxpayer's money to compete with private enterprise."

Those elected to the executive board included: W. V. Smith, Seattle, Wash.; and E. H. Tivkie, Monterey, Calif.

Play Equipment To Be Installed In Highland Park

Sponsors of a community improvement program, the club selected Highland park as its first project. Marion square will be next on the agenda.

The playground equipment is being manufactured by Stevens Equipment company in Salem.

ROA Backs Halt On Super Carrier

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., July 29 (AP)—The Reserve Officers' association, representing 81,000 military reservists, tonight in effect gave a vote of confidence to Defense Secretary Louis Johnson for his action in cancelling the Navy's super-carrier program.

The group rejected by a close vote a resolution sponsored by naval reservists which would have sharply criticized the joint chiefs of staff for advising Johnson to scrap the projected \$100,000,000 super-carrier United States.
