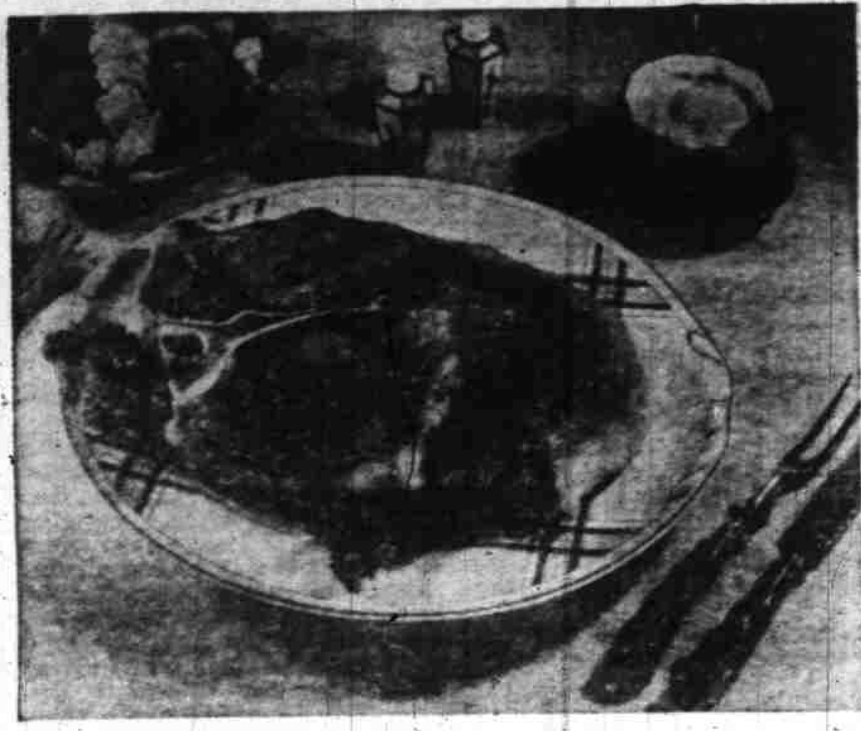


Meal in a Million



A perfectly broiled steak gets three cheers every time. A noble steak, at least one inch thick, broiled slowly and carefully is ultimate in meats.

We knew a woman, wise in the ways of cookery, who said that "anyone can be a good cook if she uses enough butter." Likewise, anyone can serve wonderful meat dishes if she buys expensive cuts.

Steak, to be at its best, should be well aged, and at least one inch in thickness, but two inches give extra juicy pleasure. Allow one club steak to a person, or if it's T-bone allow one for each, but cut off the flank ends and save for next day's dinner served up with garden vegetables.

A tenderloin is good broiling eat too. Cut into uniform serving sized pieces of from 4 to 6 ounces each.

Slow and easy does the steak these days, with no cooking on a smoking hot skillet like we used to do. Keep meat about 5 inches from the source of heat, whether it be live coals or electric oven broiler. When one surface is browned, season and then turn and brown on the other side.

The true gourmet finds that no sauces need be used on a steak, but some of those persons less versed in the delicacies of flavor, prefer that some sort of extra flavor be added.

For a subtle added flavor, rub the steak with a garlic clove before broiling, or top with a bleu cheese and chili sauce mixture just before lifting from the grill.

Here's a standard butter sauce which you might serve, as is, or add a bit of prepared mustard to suit family preference.

BUTTER SAUCE FOR STEAKS

Yield: 1/2 cup
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1 tablespoon minced parsley
1/2 teaspoon salt
Pepper
1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice
Cream butter until soft. Gradually beat in parsley, seasonings, and lemon juice. Spread over broiled steak and serve at once.

SAVORY FLANK ENDS

Cut off the steak before broiling. Yield: 6 servings.
3 pounds flank ends
1/4 cup flour
4 tablespoons shortening
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 cup water
6 potatoes
6 carrots
6 onions
6 turnips
Dip meat in flour. Melt shortening in heavy kettle. Brown the meat well on each side, adding salt and pepper. Add water, cover and cook slowly for 2 hours. Add potatoes, carrots, onions, and turnips and cook for an additional hour.

Grade School Science Class Workshop Set

MONMOUTH—Teachers studying applications of science in elementary grades will present a workshop demonstration at the Oregon College of Education all day and evening Thursday, August 4, from 10 a.m. through 8 p.m.

Visitors will see Oregon teachers in demonstrations of how they plan to use easily obtained demonstration materials to apply the experimental method to science instruction.

Covering a wide-ranging list of science studies, the demonstration will present exhibits in astronomy, weather, sound, magnets and electricity, earth history including rocks and minerals, Oregon rocks, plant studies, animal studies, visual aids in science, conservation and rehabilitation. Each topic will be the particular field for a group of students in the workshop, and will be the results of specialized study under the direction of Kenneth Wanless, elementary science specialist from the Detroit, Mich., public school system, who is directing the OCE summer session workshop on science.

The 32 members of Wanless' group are at work completing their individual projects, which range from star boxes used in star study, to demonstration and experiment material for all the fields covered in the planned exhibit. Members of the class will be on hand to demonstrate the use of the exhibits.

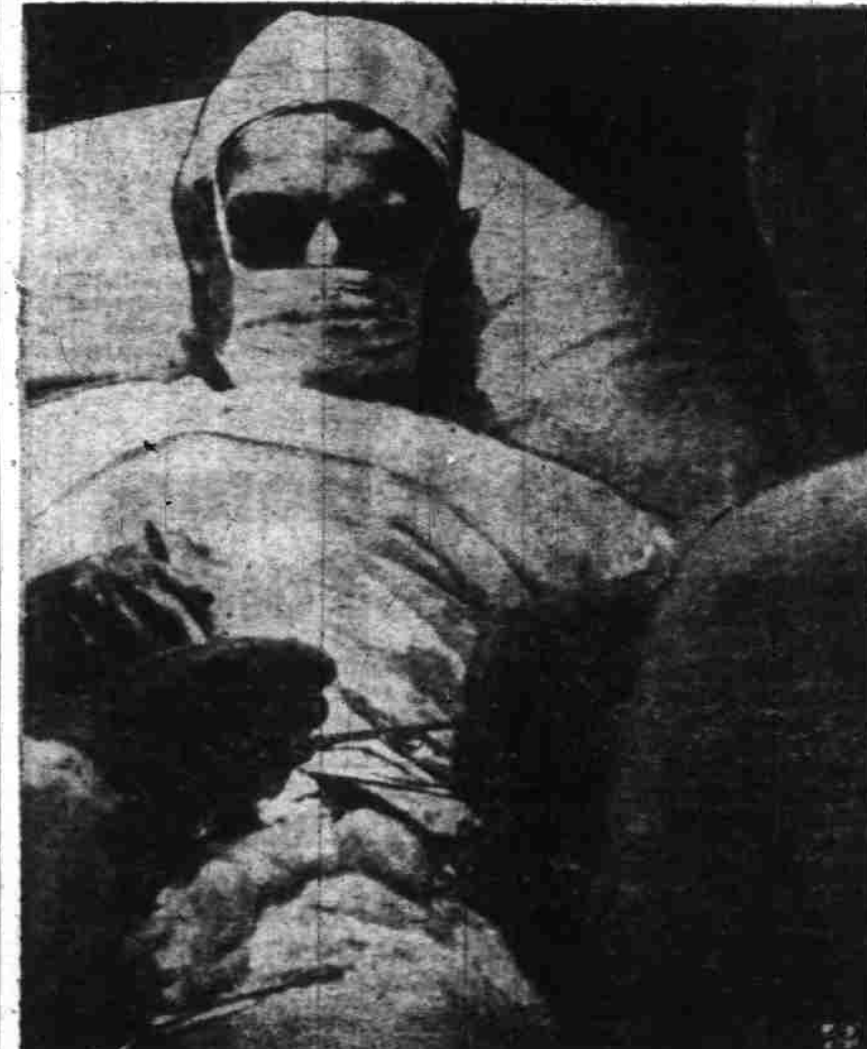

Solons Out to Clip Power of Senate Appropriations Group

WASHINGTON, July 31—(AP)—A determined effort to clip some of the vast powers wielded by the 21-member senate appropriations committee appeared under way today.

Some senators told a reporter privately that is the real cause of perhaps the worst snarl in regular money bills in 25 years or longer. Although the new fiscal year is a month old, nearly \$30,000,000,000 worth of appropriations now are piled up waiting senate action.

Majority Leader Lucas (D-Ill.) and other democratic congressional leaders hope to break this legislative logjam next week. But no one now is certain when the disputes will end and congress can plan to adjourn.

Normally most appropriations are cleared by congress before July 1 when government agencies need the funds to operate. Two stop-gap measures are providing funds until August 15.

Usually decisions of the appropriations committee on bills carrying operating funds for all government agencies slide through the senate without serious challenge.

But senators who object to provisions they regard as new legislation, or changes in previous legislation, are attacking them on the senate floor with increasing success.
