"Everybody had a theory on how to pitch to Dickey. I tried 'em all. Got so I'd just throw and tip back my head to watch the ball sail."

"That Bob Johnson over in Ta-

coma; I remember him, too. He still holds an American league record off me. Batted in six runs in one inning. I'll never forget it. "I went to the showers, got dressed and came back to the stands and doggone if they weren't still in the same inning."

The ex-Chicago White Sox tosser whose career was wrecked by a hunting accident has a remarkable resemblance to the picture of Stratton in the picture based on the tall Texan's life.

Dodgers Trip Red Birds, 4-2

Bosox Blank Indians; Tigers, Giants Win

NEW YORK, July 31.—(AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers behind big Don Newcombe halted the St. Louis Cardinals' nine-game winning streak today, beating the Cards, 4-2. The triumph cut the Cards' National League lead over the Dodgers to a game and a half.

Meanwhile, the New York Yankees took a firmer grip on first place in the American league, increasing their lead to four games over the Cleveland Indians. The Yanks divided a doubleheader with the Chicago White Sox, winning the first game, 3-2, but losing the second, 2-1, in ten innings. The Indians bowed, 3-0 to the Red Sox in Boston.

The Detroit Tigers took over fourth place from the Philadelphia Athletics, blanking the A's twice, 3-0 and 6-0. The Washington Senators trounced the St. Louis Browns, 7-3.

Lippy Durocher's New York Giants pounded out a double triumph over Cincinnati, 10-0 and 9-0, to secure fourth place from Philadelphia in the National league. The Phils edged the Chicago Cubs, 5-4, in ten innings.

The Giants trail the third place Boston Braves by a game. The Braves divided with the Pittsburgh Pirates, winning the first game, 9-1, and losing the second, 6-5.

Newcombe stopped the Cards on eight hits but lost his shutout in the ninth.

The Yanks pulled their first game out of the fire with a two-run ninth inning rally that included a home run by Johnny Lindell. Luke Appling socked a two-run homer to break up the second game in favor of the White Sox.

Slender Mickey McDermott, young Red Sox southpaw, checked the Indians on eight hits; fanned seven and walked three in recording his fifth victory and second shutout.

Detroit pitchers Ted Gray and Freddie Hutchinson blanked the Athletics on eight and five hits, respectively.

Sherry Robertson socked a pair of home runs to spark the Senators' victory over the Browns. Eddie Robinson also weighed in with a round-tripper.

The Giants enjoyed a field day at the expense of the Reds. They scored all of their runs in the first game in the first two innings with Johnny Mize, Ray Mueller and Hank Thompson belting homers.

Sid Gordon was the big man with the stick in the finale. Sid started and completed a nine-run second inning drive with a home run. His 22nd of the season came with nobody on off Ken Raffensberger. His 23rd—second of the inning—found two on and was hit off Johnny Vander Meer.

Johnny Sain breezed to his eighth triumph in the first game at Pittsburgh. The Pirates pulled the nightcap out of the fire with a three run rally in the ninth.

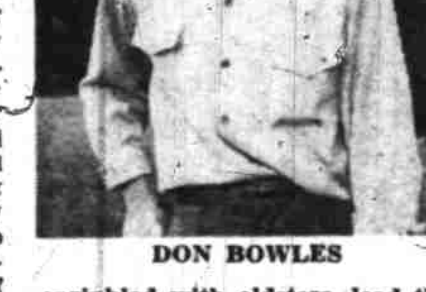

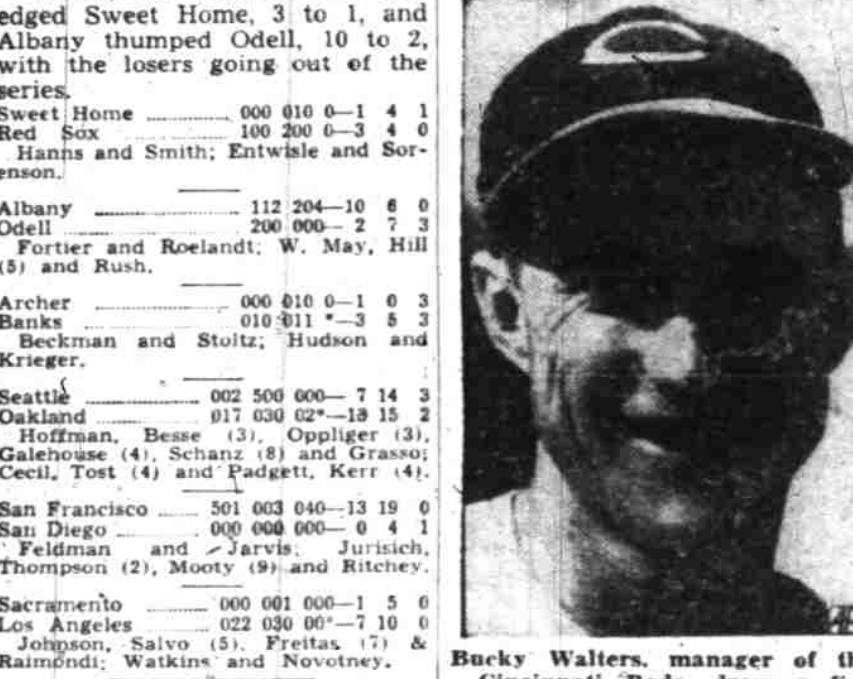
