Organization of the wartime underground against the Japanese in the Philippines was described for the Salem Lions club Thursday by Stanton Turner, a leader in that movement.

Turner, former general secretary of the YMCA in Manila, praised both GIs and Filipinos for their courage against overwhelming odds, in resisting Japanese occupation forces.

Turner also praised Gen. Douglas MacArthur as "One of the great statesmen of the world and certainly the great statesman of the orient."

Services Held For Mrs. Carr

Private services were held Thursday for Mrs. Mattie Carr, Salem route 8, box 788, who died Wednesday at the age of 83.

She was a school teacher for more than 50 years and was a critic-instructor at Oregon college of Education much of that time. During World War II she taught in elementary schools at Spring Valley and Victor Point, although she was nearly 80 years old at the time.

She was born in Ohio, Nov. 23, 1866, and was graduated from Kansas State college in 1889. She married Henry Carr at Concedully, Wash., on April 10, 1891. He died in 1932.

Surviving is a daughter, Vivian F. Carr of Salem, who is an English instructor at Salem High school.
