As Clothes Make the Man, so Does The Luggage Distinguish Traveler

An epidemic of luggage borrowing sets in every year about vacation time.

Women usually are afflicted by this complaint more generally than men. There seems to be something in their make up which balks at spending money for proper luggage equipment when, they argue, they can use the cash for more vacation clothes.

This is a sad state of affairs, as any hotel manager, porter or luggage manufacturer will tell you. Shabby luggage is a dead giveaway of an inexperienced traveler. When you check in at a hotel the first impression you make is through your luggage. If it's cheap, scuffed and tied together with ropes it's pretty certain you won't get a choice room or proper service.

Also it's a sure way to lose a friend if you borrow good luggage and return it in a damaged state. And you can never be sure that borrowed luggage will not be damaged in transit.

Even if it means cutting down on your vacation wardrobe, it's wise to invest in proper luggage equipment when you plan a trip — and then take care of it.

A wide variety of good luggage is available on today's market, at prices considerably below those of a year or so ago. Growing in popularity are the new scuff-proof plastics, the airplane weight canvas luggage and even the aluminum variety.

Many persons, however, prefer leather for all types of luggage, and this, too, has been restyled. You may have rugged leather luggage nowadays in practically any color you fancy, from shocking pink to chartreuse, as well as in the standard leather tones.

Indispensable for the feminine traveler is the cosmetics case or train case, just big enough to hold makeup supplies, a night gown and a change of lingerie. This can be kept with you on a plane trip when larger luggage is locked away, is little bigger than a handbag, and carries all overnight necessities.

As a companion piece, you should have a matching wardrobe bag, big enough to hold half a dozen dresses and all accessories. These two places will see you handsomely through most trips. But if you like you may add matching shoe case and hat box, and an in-between size bag for odds and ends.

The wise tripper travels light, however, takes only necessities and packs them scientifically.

After you have invested in correct luggage, you should take care of it. Here are some tips on luggage care:

1. In storing, choose a dry, cool place. Heat dries out the leather and dampness may produce mildew.
2. Never overload bags.
3. Never oil locks or hardware — you may stain the leather.
4. Keep luggage clean. Use saddle soap on leather luggage and polish with a neutral wax twice a year. Canvas or plastic luggage may be wiped with a damp cloth.
5. Use zipper luggage covers if you have them.

Old Booklet Reveals Collection of Uses for Sweetened Canned Milk

A recent telephone request for "something to use sweetened condensed milk" took me to my files to find recipes. A book published some years ago by the manufacturer of a well known brand practically overwhelmed my telephone quizzier with answers. If she could have seen the pretty colored pictures she'd have been doubly impressed.

Salad dressing are made from the milk. A "boiled dressing" without being cooked is this:

ECONOMY SALAD DRESSING
1 1/2 cups (1 can) sweetened condensed milk
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup vinegar
1 teaspoon dry mustard
Blend well, stirring until thickened. It thickens more upon being left in the refrigerator. This dressing is recommended for cold slaw.

Mayonnaise, too, is made from the milk.

MAGIC MAYONNAISE
2 1/2 cup sweetened condensed milk
1/4 cup vinegar
1 egg yolk

1/2 teaspoon salt
Few grains cayenne
1 teaspoon dry mustard
Place ingredients in mixing bowl. Beat with whip until mixture thickens. Makes 1 1/4 cups.

You can double the recipe by using one whole egg, doubling all other ingredients.

The booklet says that custards made with the milk can't go wrong.

BAKED COCOA CUSTARD
3/4 cup sweetened condensed milk
1/2 cup cocoa
2 1/4 cups hot water
3 eggs
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Blend milk and cocoa, add water and pour over slightly beaten eggs, add salt and vanilla. Pour
