### Bergman May Stay in Movies, 'Source' Says

ROME, Aug. 6 - (AP) - Roberto Rossellini, the Italian movie director, may persuade Ingrid Bergman to remain in motion pictures.

A source close to the Swedish actress said today he confidently expects Miss Bergman to resume acting after about a year of retirement.

"She may make another picture with Rossellini," he said, "although her next role may be directed by some one else."

The informant said Miss Bergman intends to marry the divorced, 43-year-old director shortly after her own divorce from Swedish surgeon, Dr. Peter Lindstrom becomes final.

No legal action has yet been taken, the informant added, but Miss Bergman's attorneys are preparing to file first divorce papers here as soon as Dr. Lindstrom's attitude becomes known.

This may be in a matter of a few days. The informant said Miss Bergman is "strongly attached to Italy and hopes to remain here, perhaps for many years."

### Reprieved on Way to Chair

HUNTSVILLE, Tex. Aug. 7 - (AP) - W. Fred Jones, Floydad, Tex., grocery owner convicted of the shotgun slaying of one of his employees, got a three-day reprieve early today as he was being led to the electric chair.

The stay of execution came from Gov. Allen Shivers' office, upon the recommendation of two members of the state board of pardons and paroles. They said new information had been obtained in the case.

Jones was convicted in the fatal shooting of J. C. Love, Jr., in 1946.
