Circuit Court Room Equipped For Jury Use

For the first time in at least 21 years, the small circuit court room in Marion county courthouse will soon be employed for jury trials. The 12 chairs have already been ordered, and the rail and other equipment will be constructed by October, when they will first be used to help clear the crowded court docket, said County Clerk Harlan Judd.

They will be in the department one courtroom, used by Judge Rex Kimmell. The adjacent court room is larger and has a jury box.

Judd, either clerk or deputy since 1928, said Saturday there had been no jury trials in the room in his time. But attorney Allan Carson said he could recall having seen such occurrences earlier.

Judd now has a new worry—what if both juries should go out for deliberation at the same time. The courthouse now has only one deliberation room, a situation which will be remedied in the proposed new building expected to get underway next year.

'Kiddieland' At State Fair Near Complete

Work will be completed this week on the Oregon State Fair's "Kiddieland", the last major construction at the exposition plant before the fair opens September 5.

A large area adjacent to the horseshow pavilion has been set aside as a juvenile area and a number of amusement innovations already have been installed. The entrances and ticket booths will be painted with nursery rhyme characters and the entire area will be surrounded by a picket fence.

The toy train, long a fair standby for the younger gentry, has been rerouted and will include a tunnel and trestle. Large awning-covered benches will be scattered throughout "Kiddieland" for weary parents. All amusement rides within "Kiddieland" will be designed for children 10 and under and will operate at lower admission prices.

Non-Profit Feature of Hospitals Stressed by Superintendent

To meet the questions or objections about "too high" hospital charges, managers of both Salem institutions made statements Saturday to remind that the hospitals are forbidden by law to make a profit and that their charges are based on actual cost.

When approximately 100 women start calling "Salem" telephones Monday morning in a windup canvass intended to give every resident an opportunity to aid in betterment of hospital facilities, they will be backed by these statements from William Gahlsdorf and Irwin F. Wedel, of Salem General and Memorial hospitals, respectively.

Chartered by State

These men who attempt to keep the budgets balanced concur in saying that the hospitals would not be allowed to make a profit even if they undertook to do so. Both are chartered by the state of Oregon and the United States treasury department as non-profit organizations. They are forbidden to use patients' fees to reduce original capital investments or to provide funds for equipment, except to replace that which has become outmoded.

Such a system is not unique with the Salem hospitals, but is universally followed throughout the United States.

Charges to patients are based on actual cost, and last year the per diem cost of hospitalizing a person in Salem ranged around \$17.

Costs Advanced

Per diem costs have advanced, it was pointed out, because of later methods of treatment which shorten the stay of the patient in the hospitalization is more expensive, both from the standpoint of drugs and medicines and of nursing care.

Thus, Wedel and Gahlsdorf agreed, an ill person may spend money faster, but his outlay in dollars actually may run less than in former times.

The care of indigent patients is another factor in the economy of the Salem hospitals. Without a county-operated hospital, supported by public taxation, the brunt of the charity load falls on Memorial and General.

Paid in Part — For such persons, the hospitals are paid at least in part. The business offices, however, must write off the accounts of many stricken individuals — termed borderline cases — who are ineligible for public aid but still unable to pay their bills.

Gahlsdorf cited an argument he had used convincingly with one man who had complained of paying \$9 a day for a hospital room. "Let's compare it with a hotel — not that we want to argue against hotels," he said to the patient. "There you'll pay, say, \$6 for a bed and bath. But the fee for a hospital room covers room and bed, a bath given by a nurse, general nursing care for 24 hours, three meals and refreshments between times."

State Accident Claims Down During Year

A total of 20,937 claims from workmen injured in industrial accidents in Oregon during the first six months of 1949 have been filed with the state industrial accident commission, Paul Gurske, chairman, announced Friday.

Of these claims 10,964 were for injuries which were serious enough to cause the workmen to lose time from their jobs while 329 were for occupational diseases arising out of their employment. Sixty-three involved death benefits to dependents of those killed while at work.

Gurske said total claims received the first half of 1949 were down approximately 5.4 per cent. Lost time claims were down 12.1 per cent and fatalities 5.9 per cent. At the same time there was an increase of slightly more than 1 per cent in the man days worked.

Industries in which fatal accidents were reported and the number killed included logging 25, construction 7, agriculture 6, trade, finance and service 5, state, county and municipal 5, sawmills 4, transportation and communication 4, public utilities 3, auto repair 2, mining and quarrying 1 and manufacturing 1.
