The candles at the altar and down the aisle were lighted by Miss Marjorie Tate and Miss Lois Frink of Dayton and just before the ceremony Miss June Young and Miss Annette Kuzmanich of Portland closed the aisle with white satin ribbons. Their dotted Swiss frocks were white to carry out the all white dresses of the feminine members of the bridal party with a touch of American Beauty the only color note. The dresses were made with off-shoulder style necklines and full skirts gathered to eyelet beading and American Beauty velvet ribbon finished with a bow in back. Their wristlets were of miniature nosegays of American Beauty roses and baby's breath.

Eight young women, two honor attendants and six in secondary places, preceded the attractive bride down the aisle. In identical white marquisette hoop skirted frocks over tulle were Mrs. Richard L.
