

White Paper - Unusual, Says China Envoy

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—The state department's "White Paper" on China was characterized by Chinese Ambassador V. K. Wellington Koo today as "an unusual step, especially at this time when my country is engaged in a desperate struggle to check the communist aggression and to preserve her independence as a nation."

It was the first official reaction from nationalist government representatives here to the diplomatic summary of U. S.-Chinese relations released Friday. Observers said it was probably unprecedented in the severity of its criticism of the Chinese government, a friendly nation.

'Veep' Barkley Squires Widow To Ball Game

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 7 (AP)—Vice President Alben W. Barkley and Mrs. Carleton S. Hadley, St. Louis widow, joined some 29,000 other fans to watch the St. Louis Cardinals defeat the New York Giants 9 to 2 today.

Barkley and Mrs. Hadley and several other friends were guests of Fred M. Saigh, owner of the Cardinals, and Mrs. Saigh.

It was the second time in recent weeks that Barkley visited Mrs. Hadley here.

Barkley, 71-year-old widower, attended a luncheon with Mrs. Hadley and other friends two weeks ago. He had stopped here enroute to Washington from Minneapolis.

Barkley met Mrs. Hadley, an attractive young woman in Washington through Clark Clifford of the presidential staff. Later Barkley gave a luncheon for her in Washington.

Hadley, general counsel for the Washab railroad, died in 1945. He was 42.

GOP Finances Gabrielson's No. 1 Problem

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—How to pay for a 1950 congressional campaign which some members think will make or break the republican party shaped up today as GOP Chairman Guy G. Gabrielson's No. 1 problem.

Picked to head the party in a knock-down battle last week, the New Jersey businessman is reported looking around for some way to get the contributions rolling in.

It's been a case of everything going out and nothing coming in for the republicans. Thus far this year they have spent \$444,000 and taken in only \$71,000.

Harold Talbott, finance committee head, told party members bluntly that he just hasn't been able to interest contributors in putting up cash since last January when the national committee split wide open in an unsuccessful effort to oust former Chairman Hugh D. Scott, jr.

The word he got from prospective contributors, Talbott told a reporter, was that his party members would have to quit rowing among themselves if they expected any financial help.

Gabrielson faces the same sort of a split in the national committee membership that finally forced Scott's resignation last week. He won over Axel J. Beck, a newcomer from South Dakota, by a margin of 52 to 47 votes.

Huge Tumor Removed from Two-Year-Old

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Aug. 7 (AP)—Two-year-old Judy Rae Carpenter was given a better than even chance to live today after surgeons removed from her chest a tumor "at least as big as man's head."

Staff members at University hospital said it was the largest tumor of its kind they ever had seen. It had the bodily components of another child.

Dr. Vernon L. Boersma, of the hospital pediatrics department, said the disorder was known to the medical profession as "the included twin." Its cause has not yet been discovered, he said.

Physicians believed that if there had been a normal development Judy would have had a twin.

Dr. Boersma said the tumor was so large it had collapsed the child's right lung to the size of an egg. After it was removed in a three-hour operation the lung was expanded and it is now functioning.

Judy had complained of stomach pains and shortness of breath for several months.

Chiang, Rhee Ask Anti-Red Asia Conclave

CHINHAE, Korea, Mon., Aug. 8 (AP)—Chinese Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek and Korean President Syngman Rhee today asked for a conference of Asian powers to frame a Pacific pact against communism.

The leaders of Nationalist China and the South Korean Republic requested Philippine President Elpidio Quirino call the conference. In a joint statement, they said:

"We are strongly of the opinion that countries of the Pacific in general and far eastern countries in particular are facing a greater danger from international communism today than any other part of the world."

The request for the Pacific conference came as news dispatches from Manila and Washington indicated Quirino plans to drop Chiang and his nationalist regime from any Pacific alliance.

The original foundation for a Pacific pact was laid last month by Chiang and Quirino. The Chinese nationalist flew to the Philippines for the talks. He flew here last week to confer with Rhee.

The statement said: "We both recognize the menace of international communism, incompatible with human freedom and national independence, must be eradicated and to combat this common threat we must fight collectively as well as individually. Security can only be strengthened by solidarity."

There was no reference to the United States white paper on China which wrote off Chiang's nationalist regime as a failure.

Boy Squirms From Rescuer, Dies in Ditch

YAKIMA, Aug. 7 (AP)—Robert Laroque, 4, squirmed from the hands of a would-be rescuer tonight, fell back into the churning waters of the Sunnyside irrigation canal and was swept away to his death.

The child, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Laroque of Buena, fell into the canal while playing on the bulkhead adjacent to the waterway. An unidentified youth who saw the boy tumble, dove in and grabbed him.

As the youngster was being passed out to his father, he squirmed free of his rescuer's grasp and fell back into the water.

The swift current carried him 40 feet downstream before Laroque could get the boy from the water. Efforts to revive him were fruitless.

SYNAGOGUE BOMB KILLS 11

DAMASCUS, Syria, Aug. 7 (AP)—The death toll from the Synagogue bombing here Friday night rose today to 11. Six persons were killed in the blast and the government announced the death of five others from injuries.

Iron door keys, locks, bolts, hinges and nails, steel knives, scissors and hunting weapons have been found in the ruins of Roman dwellings in Britain.

Malaria Cure Story Refuted

CHICAGO, Aug. 7 (AP)—Widespread reports of a new permanent cure for malaria were termed "premature and inaccurate" today by a University of Chicago official.

The reports were based on a story published by the Chicago Herald American that a "three-day permanent cure for malaria with one pill" has been discovered. The Associated Press carried an account of the newspaper's report last night.

Today, Dr. Lowell T. Coggeshall, dean of the university's division of biological sciences, said many obstacles still remain to be overcome before a cure can be claimed, and it definitely isn't a one-pill proposition.

Trumans at 'Shangri La'

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—President and Mrs. Truman, relaxing in the mountain coolness of the presidential retreat, "Shangri La," in Maryland retired early and got up later than usual this morning, the White House said.

They took a 20-minute walk, returning at 7:20 for breakfast. Mr. Truman went swimming at 10.

They will leave at 6:45 a.m. tomorrow to return the 60 miles to Washington. They left here Friday afternoon.

Montana Fire Deaths at 13

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 7 (AP)—Weary, heat-singed firefighters began to see signs of victory today in the battle against crackling flames that have burned 13 people to death and seared 4,200 acres of timberland in the mountains northeast of here.

If no strong winds come up, the U.S. forest service said there was a chance the fire's wild dance of death could be halted by morning.

Five hundred men were straining to stop the fire as it moved toward the northeast.

The death toll rose to 13 with discovery of two more bodies. They were believed to be those of two parachute firefighters who earlier were reported missing.

Robed Riders, Townspeople Trade Gunfire

IRON CITY, Ga., Aug. 7 (AP)—Robed night riders and townspeople swapped gunfire in a brief but hectic renewal of Ku Klux Klan strife early today, Mayor C. L. Drake reported.

The tires of several automobiles bearing klansmen were flattened by bullets. One klansman was said to have been slightly wounded in the flare-up just after midnight.

The mayor said nobody on his side was hit but "some of the bullets whizzed by within five feet of me."

The mayor, an old enemy of the Klan, said the battle broke out as 12 or 15 automobiles of klansmen rolled into the town at the eerie, near-midnight hour.

Paraders Unmasked
The highway patrol reported from its Atlanta headquarters that the paraders were unmasked. Drake, however, said he thought some of them were masked—in "direct" violation of the town's recently-enacted unmasking ordinance.

He said he did not shoot but "some of my friends did" and the gunfire promptly was returned.

In the wake of the gunfire came a welter of charges and counter charges.

The mayor reported someone had sworn a warrant against him charging shooting at another and he, in turn, he had a Ku Klux Klan official charged with assault with intent to murder.

Acting Agent
Drake identified the Klan functionary as Bill Hendrix of Tallahassee, Fla., "acting agent of the grand dragon of Florida."

He said he and friends chased Hendrix at high speed to nearby Dothan, Ala., and had him jailed on a warrant issued in Iron City.

He added that he expected later to bring charges against what he called "the cyclops of Iron City."

Warring with the Ku Klux Klan is an old story with the mayor of this little southwest Georgia town. Only recently he announced he had foiled a Klan kidnap attempt with a volley from an automatic shotgun.

Chinese Reds Forced to Fight Guerrillas

NANKING, Aug. 7 (AP)—The Chinese communists are mobilizing to fight widespread guerrilla resistance that extends behind their lines from Manchuria into south China.

Thousands of red troops are reportedly reported being moved north to augment Manchurian and north China garrisons. Their mission is to suppress guerrillas and dissidents opposing-communist officials in the countryside.

An editorial published in Nanking today by the official communist New China news agency calls for mobilization of large numbers of political workers and students to cooperate with the army in putting down "special bandits in liberated areas who are backed by Kuomintang-nationalist-reactionaries and American imperialists."

23 Injured as Baseball Field Ramp Crumbles

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 7 (AP)—A concrete runway gave way under an overflow baseball tonight today. Twenty-three or more fans were injured — half of them in a 15-foot fall through a gaping hole.

Late Sports NCAA to Halt Bowl Disease

CHICAGO, Aug. 7 (AP)—The amazing growth of post season football bowl games is to be brought to an abrupt ending.

Nine collegiate athletic leaders, representing each section of the nation, will meet here next week end to take the drastic step.

Their goal is to establish sensible curbs for the bowl game craze which started with the original, Pasadena's famed Rose Bowl, 47 years ago. Since then the business has grown to approximately 50 games held annually from late December through Jan. 1.

This 1949 bowl game committee of the National Collegiate Athletic association has been empowered by the NCAA to establish rules for post season games as to sponsorship, management, participation and promotion.

The nine-man committee will draft rules at its meeting here Saturday and Sunday. It is anticipated that delegates to the next NCAA convention in New York City, Jan. 13-14, will adopt these suggested curbs. This will mean that an NCAA member school cannot compete in a bowl game which is not conducted in strict accordance with NCAA regulations.

Victor O. Schmidt, Los Angeles, commissioner of the Pacific Coast conference, is chairman of the committee.

It is expected that the committee will recommend tossing out lesser games and require responsible management for all games.

There is also indication that the committee may require a NCAA member college or university to have a voice in the management of the game before it is approved by the NCAA.

Banks Reaches Semi-Pro Final

PORTLAND, Aug. 7 (AP)—Undeclared Banks vaulted to the state semi-pro baseball tournament final by edging previously unbeaten Reedsport, 4 to 2, tonight and posting a fifth consecutive win.

Three other teams will fight it out tomorrow night and Tuesday for the other berth in the Wednesday night final.

Banks' Manager Lenore Lyda allowed but one hit in hurling his team to the win. Both Reedsport runs were unearned. The victors started their scoring with three runs in the third and added another in the fifth inning.

Seamen Unions Head Towards Showdown

NORFOLK, Va., Aug. 7 (AP)—Two Pacific Coast maritime unions may have a head-on collision tomorrow if they both attempt to crew the S.S. Asa Lathrop, a maritime commission vessel now at the Newport News shipbuilding and dry dock yards.

The Lathrop, described as a 225-foot freighter, is scheduled to be delivered tomorrow to the Alaska Ship Lines, Inc., a newly formed Seattle steamship firm.

Claiming a jurisdictional dispute, the CIO marine cooks and stewards and the independent marine firemen, oilers and watermen plan to board the vessel at 8 a.m. (EST).

They are likely to be opposed by a crew sent by the AFL Sailors union of the Pacific, which is expected to claim a "straightaway" contract on the ship.

Bishop Oxnam Raps Catholics For Tax Stand

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6 (AP)—Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam, Methodist bishop of the New York area, accused "the Roman Catholic hierarchy" tonight of killing federal aid to education at the present session of congress.

He declared that "the hierarchy" is carrying out a coldly calculated plan to deny federal aid to public schools unless it can "get its hands into the public treasury and secure millions for the support of parochial education."

Recent criticism of Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt by Catholic Cardinal Spellman is a part of this plan, Bishop Oxnam said.

"The hierarchy," he said, "has launched a full scale attack upon the principle of separation of church and state."

The Methodist leader declared also that the Roman Catholic church seems ready "to summon the world to holy war to salvage its power, its property, and its prestige" in Europe, where it is "fighting for its life."

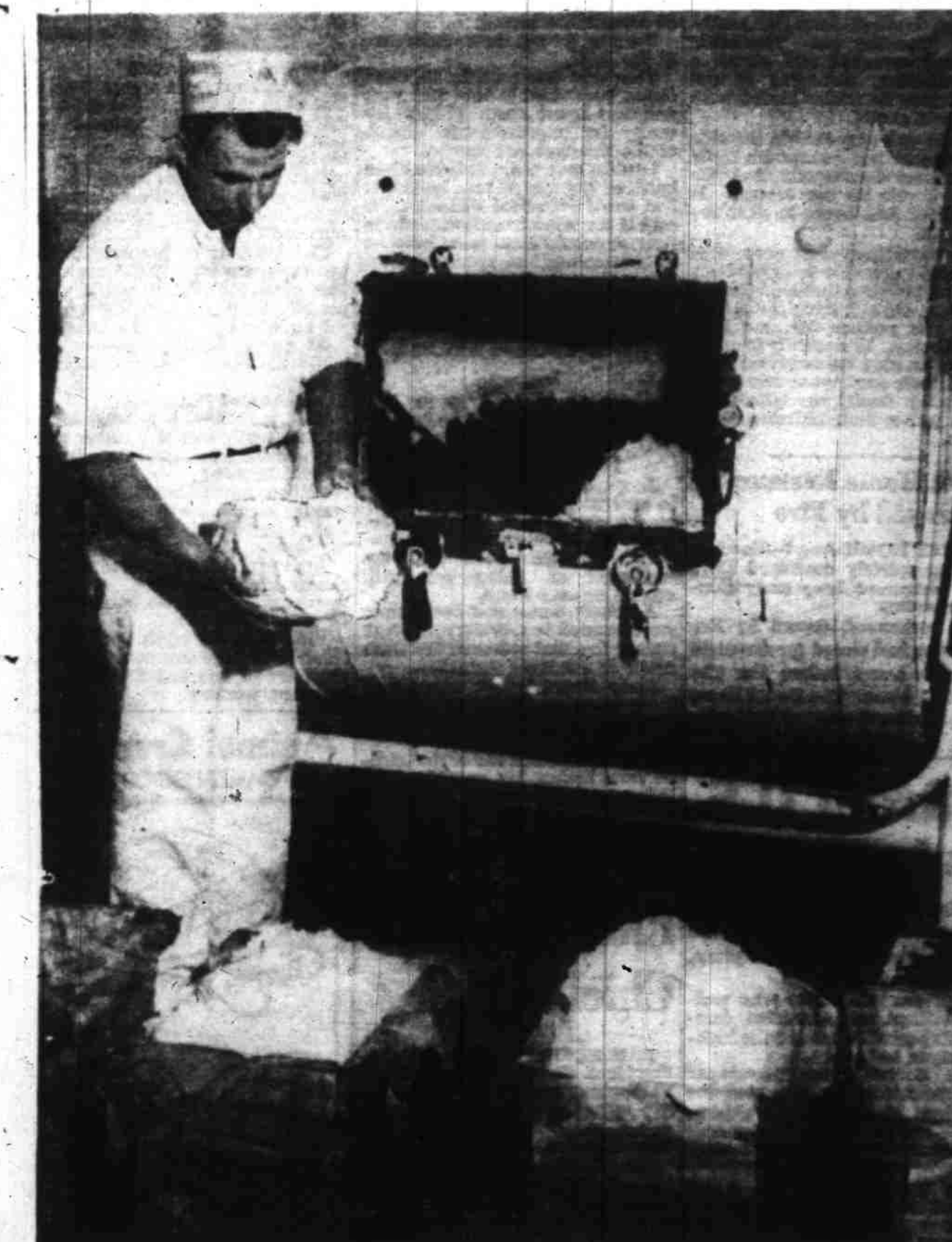
