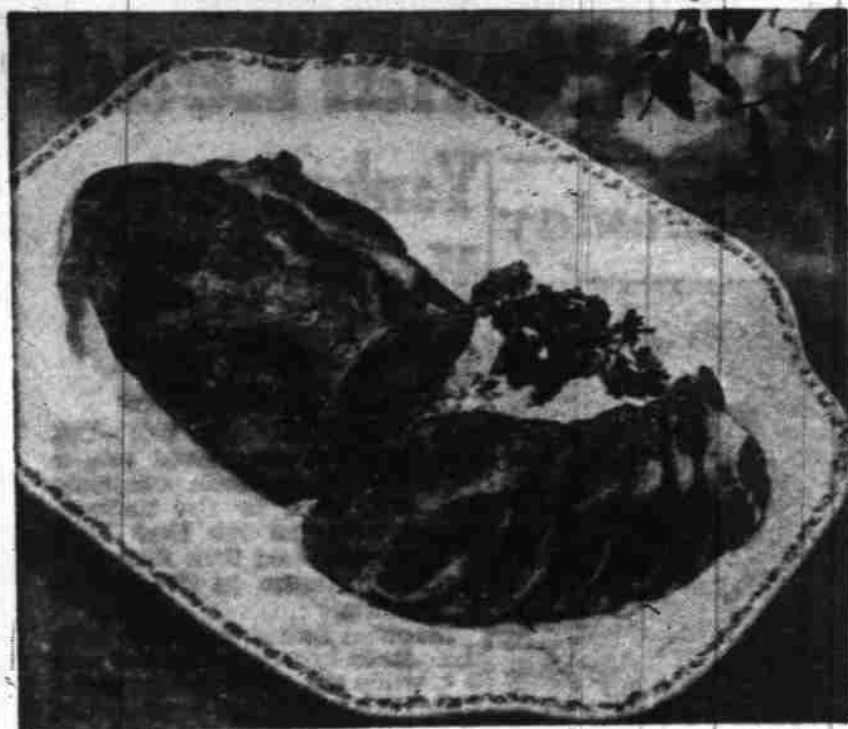


Smoked and Savory



For kitchen vacationing during warm summer hours, cook this smoked shoulder butt in the morning and keep for evening eating. It's good sliced cold, it can be sliced and broiled for quicker cooking or can be cubed and served in salad.

With its fine smoked flavor enhanced by the rich meat juices of the intermingled fat, the smoked shoulder butt is ideal for roasting. This 3- to 5-pound cut is delightful served hot or cold, making it suitable for either a large or small family.

In cooking, place the smoked shoulder butt on a rack in a roasting pan, uncovered and without water. Let it cook slowly in a 300° oven allowing about 35 minutes per pound. Near the end of cooking time, take the roast out of the oven and cover it with a glaze. Return the meat to the oven for the glaze to cook and the meat to become nicely browned.

A fruited combination makes an appealing glaze on this smoked meat cut. Brown slices of pineapple in shortening or bacon drippings, then simmer raisins in the pineapple juice with a little water and thicken it with a cornstarch paste. Place the browned rings on the roast, pour the liquid over it and put it back in the oven for the final cooking.

Additional Glazes
Other attractive glazes are sweetened, cooked apricots, or grated pineapple cooked with sugar until the mixture begins to thicken. Grape or apple jelly is equally appealing. For a difference spread the meat with gooseberries cooked in a cinnamon and clove spiced syrup. A brown sugar, prepared mustard, flour and vinegar combination is also delicious.

However, the smoked shoulder butt does not have to be roasted. It can be simmered in water, allowing 40 to 45 minutes per pound. If you wish, about a half hour before the end of cooking time take the smoked butt out of the cooking liquid, cover it with a glaze and put it in the oven for the remainder of the cooking time. Another variation is cooking this meat with spices as in the following recipe.

Just in case yours is a small family and there is meat left over, it is delicious spread with mayonnaise or mustard and broiled for a follow up meal, or it goes wonderfully well in hearty meat salads that are so popular during these summer months.

SPICED SHOULDER BUTT
3 to 5-pound smoked shoulder butt
6 whole cloves
1/2 bay leaf
1 thick cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon celery seed
1/2 cup vinegar
1 sliced onion

Place shoulder butt in a deep kettle, cover with water and add cloves, bay leaf, cinnamon, celery seed, vinegar and onion. Cover tightly and let simmer until done. Allow 40 to 45 minutes per pound for cooking. 10 to 16 servings.

Vegetable Melange Into Freezer

Today I made "vegetable melange" and popped it into the freezer on the way to town. Odds and ends from the garden were collected and mixed together for next winter's eating. There were half a dozen lima beans ready, a few peas left and not enough of either to fill a whole package. Green, yellow wax beans were included and to give color and flavor I put in enough very young carrots to complete the cartons. I'm looking forward to my "melange" next winter.
