The first Marion county council after the summer recess will be held in Mt. Angel in October, at which time the council will elect officers for the following year.

Farm Prices Dip While Costs Stay About the Same

Oregon farm prices declined during the month ending July 15, but farm costs prices held about unchanged according to Wednesday's farm price, crop and weather reviewed prepared by the USDA.

The general farm price level in Oregon dropped for the fourth consecutive month, and by mid-July had reached the lowest point in nearly three years. The decrease is reported at five per cent for the month, and 20 per cent below a year earlier.

Farm costs prices, on the other hand, including farm wage rates, have held about unchanged so far this year, but are around 5 per cent below a year ago.

Dry Concrete Slowly Says Farm Engineer

Concrete poured during hot weather needs protection against too rapid drying which frequently results in hairline cracking, states M. G. Huber, Corvallis agricultural engineer. Slow drying gives more strength and makes concrete more waterproof, he adds.

Best concrete results from drying or curing that takes at least 10 days. Prolonged drying may be accomplished by covering concrete that has had time to "set" with burlap, straw, earth, or some other material which will hold water. Then keep the covering wet, Huber concludes.

Four Corners Man Raising Tropical Fish

FOUR CORNERS — A unique new business in the Four Corners vicinity is the raising of tropical or exotic fish at the Doyle Moore farm near the Riskey school-house. The Moores came to Oregon from California about five years ago. The fish raising began as a hobby, but has grown into a commercial business.

In primitive blast furnaces, hand-operated bellows of skin inside cylinders supplied air to a mixture of iron ore and charcoal in a fire.

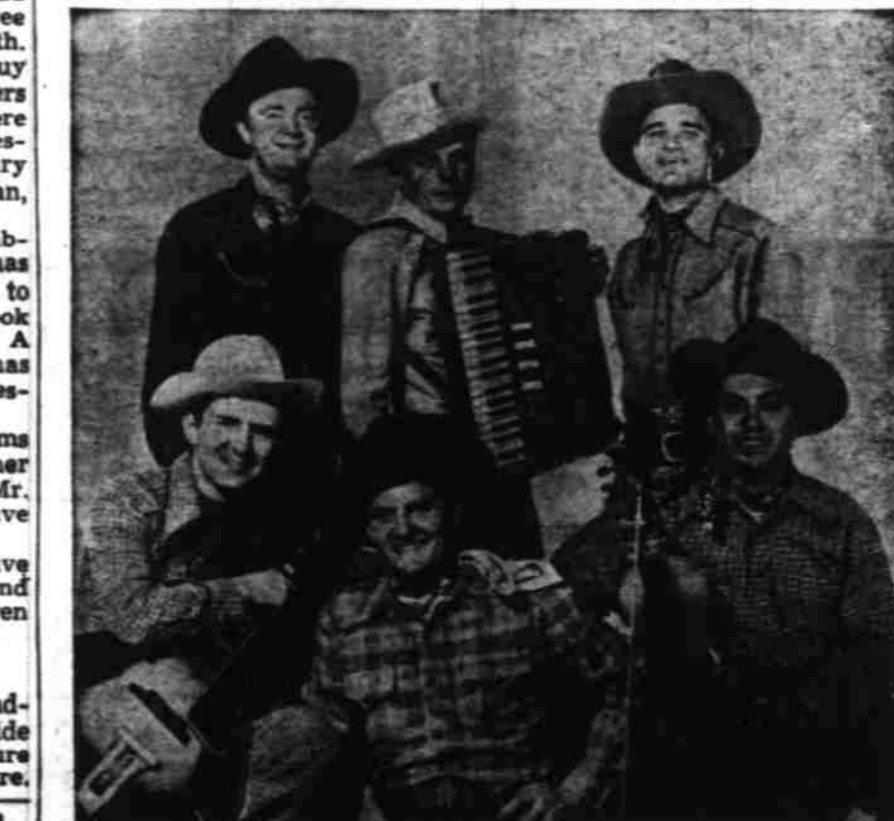
