

Biggest Race Meet in Fair History Slated

Plans have been completed for the largest horse racing meet in Oregon since the history of September 5 to 11, fair officials announced Friday. Charles A. Evans, speed superintendent, said purses would include two \$1000 races for the first time.

Workmen have been busy putting finishing touches on the half mile Lone Oak track, generally considered one of the best fair tracks in the entire west. Much of the pari-mutuel plant, which handled \$368,000 last year, has been rearranged and several new quincis windows added.

Daily cards will include at least nine running races except on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday of fair week when the cards will be increased to ten. Quarter horse specials will be presented for the first time.

Unearned Runs Help Tigers

BREMERTON, Aug. 12-(Special)- Salem's Senators lost a possible chance to move back into sixth place in the Western International league last night (dependent on what Bremerton did) as they were thumped by the last-place Tacoma Tigers, 12-5, in the opening game of a four-tit series.

The result left the Salems only 1 1/2 games above the dungeonedwelling Tigers.

Tacoma got a winning margin early by the expedient of scoring eight runs in the first three frames off Bob Drilling — and but one of those tallies was earned. In fact of the Tigers' 12 runs exactly 11 of 'em were of the unearned variety.

The Tacomas finished off Drilling with a four-run blast in the third and then whaled Jimmy Foster, third Salem hurler of the evening for four more in the eighth.

Meanwhile Ray Fortier, who went the pitching distance for the Tigers, was having his troubles but they didn't add up to the miseries the Solon hillmen suffered.

After blanking the Senators through the first five innings Fortier gave up a pair of runs in the sixth. Orrin Snyder collected his third hit of the night behind three walks. Snyder, incidentally, had a perfect four-for-four evening.

In the eighth Salem got two more on singles by Mel Wasley and Snyder plus a balk and finished with one in the ninth with base hits by Bud Peterson and Mr. Snyder.

For Drilling it was his eighth loss against six wins.

Pro Eagles Crush College Stars, 38 to 0; Cards Win, Regain Lead as Bums Dropped

Wilkinson Crew Never Allowed Near Score as Foe Wild

CHICAGO, Aug. 12-(P)-Championship class paid off tonight as the Philadelphia Eagles smothered the College All-Stars 38-0 to roll up the most decisive margin in the 16-year-old charity series. Behind a shirt-sleeved throng of 93,780 in flood-lighted Soldier Field, the Eagles, champions of the National Football league, pushed across five touchdowns, plus a field goal, against a completely bewildered collegiate array.

Only once did the hapless collegians advance as far as the Eagles' 30 yard line in the entire contest. That was in the first period which was a scoreless affair. The humiliating shutout found the collegians more inept than in any time since the series started in 1934. Play for almost the entire game was crammed deep in All-Star territory and the Eagles were in complete control almost from start to finish.

Philadelphia's great running back, Steve Van Buren scored the first touchdown of the game in the second period. After that it was just a question of all-around superior play which smothered Head Coach Charles "Bud" Wilkinson's outclassed collegians.

The important names of the college gridiron — George Taliaferro of Indiana; Bill Fischer of Notre Dame; Chuck Bednarik of Pennsylvania; Pete Elliott of Michigan; Norman Van Brocklin of Oregon; Barney Poole of Mississippi, and Frank Tripucka of Notre Dame — were just ordinary players against the polished, seasoned professionals. Not one of the All-Stars stood out.

All of the Philadelphia scoring, including two touchdowns in the second period, one in the third, and two more in the fourth were scored by five different players.

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Red Sox Move Into Second

NEW YORK, Aug. 12-(P)-The St. Louis Cardinals jumped back into the drivers seat in the National league pennant race by a half game tonight, trouncing Pittsburgh, 8-2 as Brooklyn bowed, 5-3 to Boston. Gerry Staley limited the Pirates to six hits while the Cards pounded three Pittsburgh pitchers for nine hits including a home run by Stan Musial and Joe Garagiola.

Two-run homers by Tommy Holmes and Jeff Heath were the telling blows in Boston's triumph. Nels Potter, making his second start of the season, checked the Dodgers on seven hits.

After the contest, Dodger Manager Burt Shotton protested the game on an eighth inning decision on a blow by Duke Snider. Snider slammed a ball off the three-foot screen atop the center field wall and Umpire Art Gore ruled it a home run, then reversed himself and ordered Snider back to third. Shotton claimed that Snider might have had an inside-the-park homer but for Gore's decision.

The Boston Red Sox pulled into second place, five games back of the New York Yankees in the American league race, taking a day-night doubleheader from the Washington Senators, 15-7 and 13-11. The Yanks trampled the Philadelphia Athletics, 7-3 and the Cleveland Indians dropped from second to third place as a result of their 6-5 defeat by the Chicago White Sox. Chuck Stobbs went the distance for the Red Sox in the day game although touched for 12 hits. Roberto Ortiz drove home five runs for the Senators on a homer and single. Vern Stephens sent five runs across the plate for the Sox on his 29th homer and two singles.

The Sox scored eight runs in the third inning of the night game to take a 9-4 lead but the Senators pecked away and tied the score at 11-11 in the eighth only to have the Sox come back with two in the bottom of the eighth to win.

Lefty Tommy Byrne survived a shaky start and hurled brilliantly after the first inning in besting the Athletics. The Yankee went man allowed only four hits after the first round. Chicago edged the Indians on the strength of a two-run ninth inning single by Herb Brown. Rookie Johnny Ostrowski drove home Chicago's first four runs on a homer and double. Virgil Trucks pitched the Detroit Tigers to a 4-1 two-hit triumph over the St. Louis Browns. The Philadelphia Phillies blanked the New York Giants, 2-0, in the National's lone day game. The game was called after seven innings because of rain. Hank Borowy blanked the Giants on three singles.
