

40,900 Jobless In State During Harvest Peak

Approximately 40,900 persons were unemployed in Oregon in July, the peak of the harvest season, the state unemployment commission reported Friday. This was nearly 75 per cent above 1948 levels.

Trade, finance, government, utility and other service groups had 267,500 persons on the job, slightly more than a year ago, while lumber, logging, food processing, machinery and construction lines were running considerably above similar 1948 periods, although they now have 37,500 more workers on the payroll than at last February's low.

Migration into the state, as measured by new registrations at employment offices, dropped slightly from last summer's 6,000 a month level, but continued to account for many of those seeking Oregon jobs.

Unemployment High
Although more than 17,000 employees of lumber and logging firms have been rehired since the winter layoffs, unemployment in the timber areas reached a new post-war mid-summer high. The Eugene district entered August with 3,800 out of work, a rise of 500 in a month and 3,125 more than a year ago. Roseburg reported 960 idle against 190 a year before. Many other sections also reported unemployment increases.

The Portland area increase amounted to only 34 per cent but represented an unemployment rate of between 8 and 9 per cent of the civilian labor force — not in the danger zone but still among those with a surplus of available workers well above the country's average of 6.3 per cent.

Here are reports by main industry:

Construction — Reporting firms see a 7 per cent decline in employment over the next few weeks but most jobs will continue active until the holiday season. Construction workers drawing benefits in mid-August numbered 1173 of which Portland had 754, as compared with 289 a year ago.

Food Processing — Although nearly 100 concerns engaged in canning, packing and distributing food products predict peak operations for September, several large employers expect to curtail employment late this month upon completion of the season. By November about 10,000 fewer workers will be required.

Lumber and Logging — Peak employment will be maintained this month and few layoffs are expected during the fall. A 3 per cent decline is estimated by 160 firms for mid-November, but the direction of later operations depends on market and weather conditions. Large inventories of logs have built up some mills, while many smaller concerns have been operating on part-time or have extended vacation periods. Paid unemployment has been running from three to four times as high as similar periods a year ago.

Other Manufacturing — Changes in employment will be minor in most lines during the next few months according to representative reports. Ship repair firms expect a slight pick-up in the fall and paper mills see continued good conditions. Few openings are listed, but most of the insured em-

Farmers Send Light-Weight Pigs to Market, Report Shows

Hog farmers are, say national farm reports, doing something about too big a pork supply. They are sending their hogs to market at 180 to 200 pounds. This is estimated at one-fifth lighter than usual, and that means, the editor of the Farm Journal points out in the September issue, that the 15 per cent bigger spring pig crops won't put 15 per cent more pork on the market.

With swine support prices last until March 31, interest in hogs is holding high. Leo Spitzbart, state fair manager, reports this interest is holding over to the state fair where entries are numerous and varied in the swine division.

First Chairman Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.) of the senate agriculture committee announced his opposition to the Anderson proposal. Thomas said he favors the bill passed by the house providing for another year of the high-level farm price supports which prevailed during the war.

Then Thomas made public a five-page letter by Secretary of Agriculture Brannan criticizing the Anderson compromise measure. Brannan called the compromise inadequate and its price support levels "too low," but he promised to try to make it work if it becomes law.

Anderson, who preceded Brannan as secretary of agriculture, expressed surprise at Thomas' announcement. But he told a reporter he still expects a majority of the agriculture committee to support the compromise bill at a closed session set for Monday.

Employment comes from the metropolitan area and the rest of the state. Transportation and Utilities — September employment is expected to be nearly 10 per cent above May, but a slight drop may be expected in November.

Wholesale Trade — Distribution of early fruits and other Oregon products is providing more jobs than at any time this year. The recent pickup has been from 25 to 30 per cent above early spring levels, but a return to normal is expected after next month.

Retail Trade — A steady improvement during the fall months is foreseen by 135 stores. The number of jobs to be filled in November will be about 3 per cent above current levels, while December will see the year's high.

Finance and Service — Unemployment trends are noted by 105 employers in various parts of the state. Some service lines may pick up slightly during the fall but only a few hundred additional jobs are expected. Unemployment is about double that of last summer.
