## Visitors Lose By 10-2 Count

### US Grabs 11th Win Out of 12 Attempts

MAMARONECK, N. Y., Aug. 20 (AP)—A Great Britain's well-laid plans for reclaiming the Walker cup were buried today under an avalanche of American pars and birdies on Winged Foot's sunny fairways.

The "best team Britain ever put together" went down by a final score of 10-2 as it managed to salvage only one victory in today's eight concluding singles matches. The one-sided triumph was America's 11th in the 12 times the amateur event has been played since 1922.

The two-day international test of skill between the two great golf-playing nations saw only one of the invaders, a balding young Englishman named Ronnie White, stand up against the ruthless efficiency of this country's sharpshooters. White shot close to par golf in trouncing our amateur king, little Willie Turnesa, 4 and 3.

McCarthy of Philadelphia gained the distinction of applying the clincher by shutting out Gerald Micklem of the British side, 5 and 4. Charlie Coe, a lanky son of Oklahoma, made the victory doubly certain by winning from Cecil Ewing, 1 up, on the final green — the only contest in the two-day struggle to go the limit. Ray Billows, a seasoned runner-up to the American title, finally subdued Ken Thom, a muscular Briton, 2 and 1. And Charles (Chuck) Kocis, veteran campaigner from Detroit, survived a spectacular comeback by Arthur Perowne, 19-year-old "baby" of the British side, 4 and 2.

## Gals' Tourney Opens Monday

CHICAGO, Aug. 20 (AP)—Defending Champion Dot Kieit of Long Beach, Calif., and at least a dozen strong contenders lead a parade of 125 golfing gals into the 49th Annual Women's Western Amateur Monday. An 18-hole qualifying round over the rolling acres of Westmoreland Country club in suburban Wilmette will reduce the field to 32 for daily championship match play beginning Tuesday. The champion will be crowned in a scheduled 36-hole windup Saturday.

Although shooting fine golf this season, Miss Kieit, also a figure skater and airplane pilot of renown, may find the going rough in trying to defend her title. Seeking revenge for a beating last year in little Polly Riley of Fort Worth, Tex., she was only two over par in losing on the 36th hole to Miss Kieit in the 1948 finale.

## American Boat Record Topped

KALAMAZOO, Mich., Aug. 20 (AP)—Jack Schaffer's lightning-like Such Crust 1 set a new American powerboat speed record on nearby Gull Lake today.

Such Crust's time of 126.588 miles an hour knocked down Gar Wood's old mark that has stood for 17 years. The dean of American racers reached a speed of 124.86 Sept. 20, 1932.

Danny Arena piloted Such Crust. His achievement fell far short of the world mark of 141.74 miles an hour, set Aug. 19, 1939, by Sir Malcolm Campbell on Lake Coniston in England.

## Lone Oak Oval 'In Top Shape'

### Strip Being Worked For Fair Hoss Meet

The Oregon state fair's half-mile Lone Oak track has been pronounced in top shape for the Labor Day opening of the exposition's six day horse racing meet. The strip is being constantly worked in preparation for the fair's most outstanding race card in history.

The main grandstand, which seats 6,200, has been repainted while the pari-mutuel area underneath has been rearranged. Opening day feature is the Labor Day handicap at a mile and sixteenth for a purse of \$1,000. The first day's card will include 10 running races. There will be no harness racing at the fair this year.

Among the recent stall applications has been one from Manners Effort, long time Portland Meadows favorite, who will come to the Salem meet from a tour of the Montana fair circuit. Mersa Flip, A. H. McCumber's veteran gelding, and a consistent winner here in past years, will also be on hand for handicap entries.

A full field of 10 two year olds is expected to break in the five furlong Debutante Stakes, the feature race of the Tuesday card on September 6.

Jack Kyne, San Francisco, is expected here sometime next week to assume charge of the pari-mutuel plant which handled \$368,000 last year, a high record.

## Handicap Taken By Prevaricator

DEL MAR, Calif., Aug. 20 (AP)—Prevaricator drove to a hard-earned victory in the seventh running of the \$10,000 added San Diego handicap before 17,943 fans here today.

The E. O. Stice and Sons' gelding flashed under the wire a neck in front of King and Luellwitz's Moonrush, only 3-year-old in the field. Dinner Gong, high-weighted even-money favorite, ran seventh. The winner paid \$23.80, \$10.40 and \$5.30.

## Mark Cracked By Coaltown

### Runs Mile in 1:34

CHICAGO, Aug. 20 (AP)—The Calumet farm's mighty Coaltown streaked to a world's record of 1:34 for the mile today in winning the \$2,250 Whirlaway stakes at Washington park.

This searing performance shattered the former record of 1:35 2/5 established by the great Equipoise at Arlington park 17 years ago. It was equaled by Prevaricator last year at Golden Gate fields near San Francisco.

Coaltown, ridden byockey Steve Brooks, was loaded down with 126 pounds, compared to 128 pounds which Equipoise carried and 118 for Prevaricator in their record runs.

Because of the small, five horse field there was no place nor show betting. The Calumet entry went to the post at 1 to 5 odds, paying \$2.60 to win. First money in the Whirlaway was \$21,400. Ponder picked up \$6,000 for second place.

## 'Sugar', Belloise Go After Prize Wednesday

NEW YORK, Aug. 20 (AP)—Welterweight Champion Ray Robinson and 160-pound Contender Steve Belloise, both gunning for a middleweight title shot, fight for the chance at Yankee stadium Wednesday night.

The non-title ten rounder between a master boxer and a terrific puncher shapes up as the fistful "natural" of the year. Besides sharing in an expected gate of around \$150,000, the boxers will be pitching for a promised first crack at either Champion Jake Lamotta or Marcel Cerdan. King Jake and the Frenchman meet in return bout here Sept. 28.

Interest in the fight has picked up considerable in the past few days and the promoting International boxing club predicts 25,000 or more fans will pay from \$2 to \$16.50 to see the contest. It will not be televised. It is slated to start at 9 p.m. (EST).

Robinson is rated about a 5 to 9 favorite but the odds may drop several points by fight time. One of the reasons is the optimism shown by the Belloise camp and the unexpected gloom which has permeated the Robinson training quarters at Pompton Lakes, N. J., of late. A rift has developed in the Robinson camp. Manager George Gainford stalked out of the camp the other day, complaining about the methods of the various trainers. Robinson hasn't looked himself in training and is even talking pessimistically of retirement.
