

Arms Aid Cut Said Slap at Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Rep. Vorys (R-Ohio) said today the house voted a "lack of confidence" in the administration's foreign policy when it chipped in two the administration's \$1,180,000 arms aid program for western Europe.

He said the administration, in turn, had demonstrated "its lack of confidence in the house."

The Ohio lawmaker, a high-ranking republican member of the house foreign affairs committee, offered his analysis of the administration's staggering setback as Truman supporters in the senate surveyed the wreckage and laid plans for a fresh start.

No Policy for Half the World
Vorys called attention to the administration's determined stiffening of moves to provide weapons for non-communist China, and declared:

"The administration presented no foreign policy for half the world; the house showed only half confidence in their policy for the other half."

"Members of the house were not consulted in the formulation of the plan or the drafting of the legislation that was introduced," he said in a statement. "All attempts at a workable compromise before going to the floor were rejected."

To Go Behind Doors
The senate foreign relations and armed services committees, which

held joint hearings on the arms legislation, go behind closed doors Tuesday to get down to details on the bill which is aimed at staving off Russian aggression.

Senator Connally (D-Tex.), chairman of the foreign relations group, bugled a call for approval of the full \$1,450,000,000 sought by the administration.

"This is no time for piecemeal treatment," Connally said. "To cut the amount as was done by the house will be exploited by communist states as a lack of sincerity on our part, and will discourage and depress the members of the North Atlantic pact."

The administration knows, however, it faces a big job in trying to get senate approval of the full amount.

Both Employer, Union Guilty in NLRB Case

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Both union and employer today were ruled liable for the back wages of an employee held to have been illegally laid off at the union's insistence.

The national labor relations board decision said the worker can collect only wages actually lost. The board didn't say how the payment should be divided between union and employer. But if one can't pay the other must hand over the full amount.

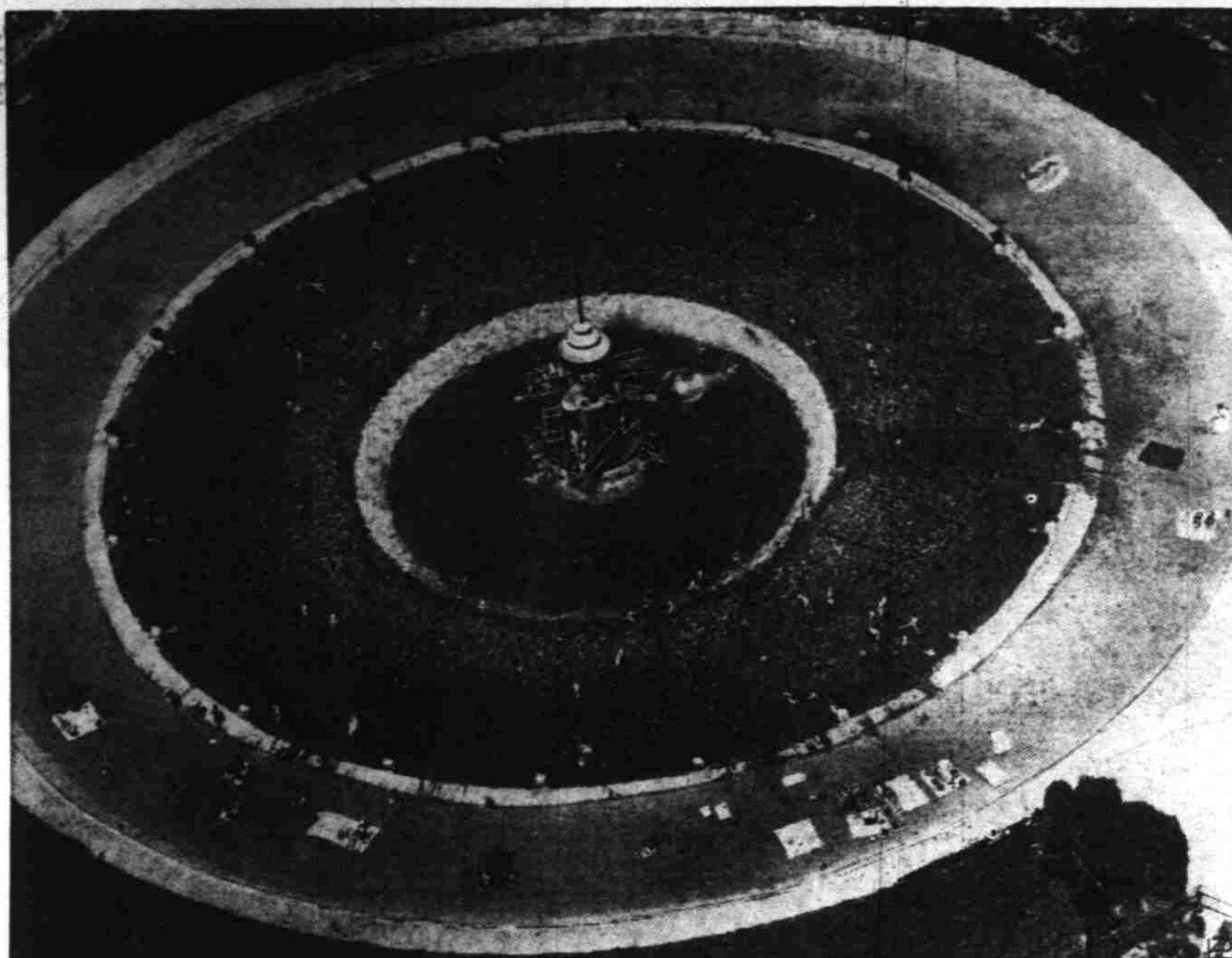
Officials described it as the first decision by the NLRB in a contested case on the Taft-Hartley act's provision making a union as well as an employer liable for back pay in certain cases of illegal discrimination.

Employers alone were liable under the law (Wagner act) before the Taft-Hartley act was passed by the 80th congress.

The NLRB, deciding this case, ordered a New York truck operator and a local of the AFL-Teamsters union to reimburse an employee for wages lost when he was laid off for being behind in union dues. It held an agreement for a union shop was not yet effective and that a closed shop contract had expired.

Bankruptcy Marks Finish of Famed Majestic Radio Firm

CHICAGO (INS)—Bankruptcy proceedings have rung the death knell of the fabulous Grigsby-Grunow radio empire which once produced \$60,000,000 worth of Majestic radios in a single year.

Profits were more than \$5,000,000 annually. The value of the stock soared from \$40 a share to \$1,100 in less than 18 months.

William C. Grunow, promotional genius of the company, built a \$400,000 house in Chicago's suburban River Forest.

Grunow equipped the home with orange marble bathrooms and gold water faucets. He installed a bowling alley in the basement and a swimming pool in the garden.

Three-Year Rise
All this was but three short years from the time he had been a salaried auditor in Bertram J. Grigsby's little auto parts firm.

Grigsby and Grunow pooled their limited resources in 1927 and their radio firm clicked to fantastic financial heights within the next two or three years.

This was in the golden era when every concern and industry was pyramiding earnings and development ideas into almost incredibly sprawling expansion programs.

Grigsby-Grunow proved no exception. The company announced it was creating a subsidiary to manufacture refrigerators. Stock buyers flocked to get on another "sure thing."

Stock Price Soars
Wall Street broke a precedent to list the stock even before the new company was in operation. Immediately, the stock climbed to several times its par value.

Grigsby, a former trolley conductor, decided to build a new plant which would be the most modern electrical manufacturing center in the world.

The plant, located in Chicago, cost \$9,000,000 to construct and several times that much to equip.

It hardly had produced its first refrigerator when the 1929 stock crash hit the world's markets.

Go Into Decline
Grigsby-Grunow, its reserves depleted by the new building, went into a sickening decline. Its stock sold for only 40 cents in 1933.

When a creditor presented a bill for only \$14,000 the subsidiary firm went bankrupt.

Both Grigsby and Grunow managed to salvage personal fortunes from the crash. Grigsby retired to a Barrington, Ill., farm. He was reported to have established a million dollars in trust funds for his wife and children.

Grunow swung over to Wal-O-Wil farms where he enjoyed success in the chicken business.

The Majestic Radio and Tele-Phy along to fade to an inglorious end in the spring of 1949 in bankruptcy.

Neuner Clarifies Law Providing for Road Improvement

Improvement of dedicated and platted streets outside towns may proceed, under a 1949 state law, when petitioned by 75 per cent of the adjacent property owners representing 75 per cent of the abutting property, Attorney General Neuner ruled Saturday. The opinion was requested by Marion county court.

Wording of the new legislation was interpreted recently by District Attorney E. O. Stadler, Jr., to require assent by all persons residing along the involving road, as well as owners.

Under the law, owners may petition for road improvement to be done by county equipment and assessed back to the adjacent land on a proportionate basis.
