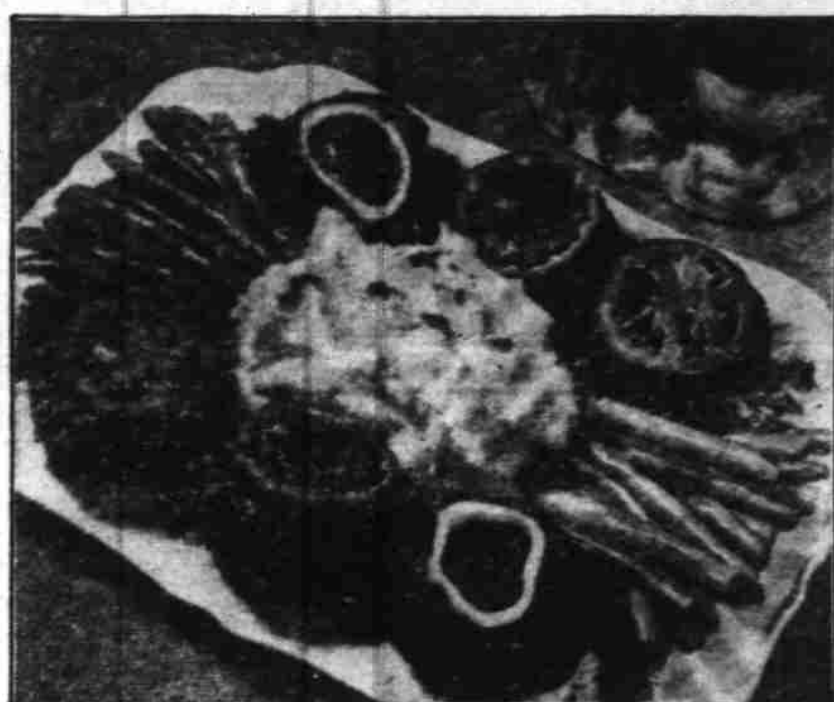
Robert L. Barovicka was best man and ushering the guests to their seats were Alfred Forman and Malcolm Campau of Bend.

Pear Canning Time Here; Experts Give Advice on Handling of Fruits

Pears, unlike many other fruits, should be picked while green and should be stored in a cool place until they turn a full yellow. Sort and can the pears as they ripen, but do not let them get overripe or they cook up too much.

Bartlets are the best for canning, the season ordinarily being from August 15 to September 30, but this year is earlier pears will probably be ready for canning up to Labor day.

Hot packed pears require 20 minutes and cold pack 25 minutes

in a hot water bath. Use a medium thin syrup, judged according to the use intended.

The prune season is approaching. This fruit should be allowed to ripen as much as possible on the tree, as the sugar content is developed while on the tree.

If fruit is too firm, let it stand in a cool place for a few days until ripened. Wash, halve and pit, if to be left whole, prick the skins to allow syrup to penetrate. A medium syrup is recommended. Allow 15 minutes for hot pack and 20 minutes for cold pack in a hot water bath.

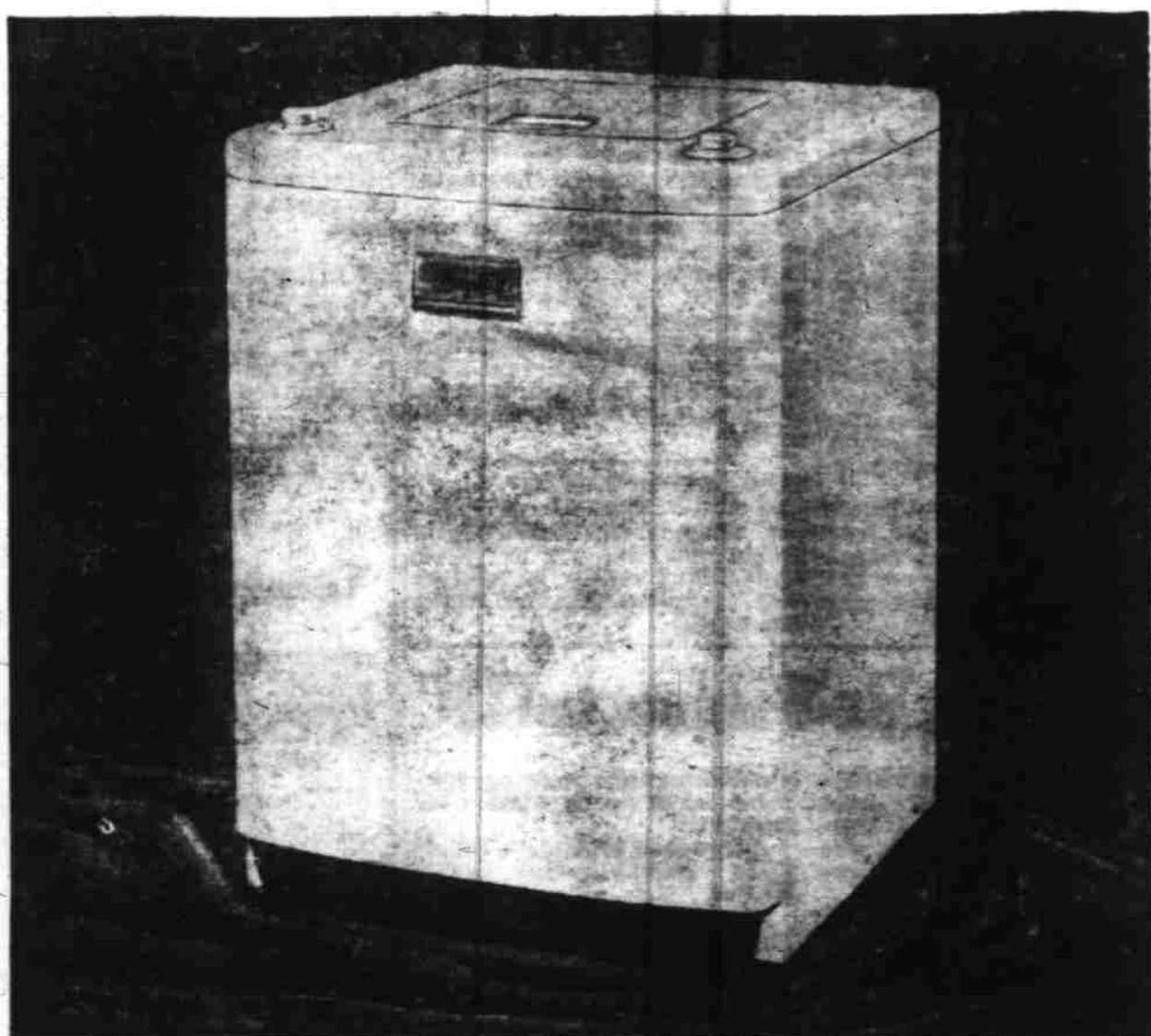
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
