Food Lovers Celebrate 45th Anniversary of Hamburgers

CHICAGO — Hamburger lovers are celebrating the 45 anniversary of the invention of the sandwich.

Daniel J. O'Connell, honorary president of the Hamburger Society of America, has taken up the spatula in defense of this American table fare. Operator a chain of food shops, he is a connoisseur of the hamburger. His cooks prepare some million of them a year.

Until the St. Louis World's Fair in 1904, the hamburger was a dish of uncooked, shredded meat. It was relished by the citizens of Hamburg, Germany. An unknown chef created the modern hamburger when he boiled ground beef and served it on a bun. Visitors to the Exposition found the sandwich would satisfy an appetite. Americans Love Them

Since then, the hamburger, with apple pie and vanilla ice cream, has become a favorite American dish.

The budding Hamburger Society seeks to have President Harry S. Truman declare a "National Hamburger Week." Members — there are 18 of them — all named Hamburger. Persons with monikers like Pickle, Mustard, Onion, Bun and related names also are eligible for membership.

O'Connell says such highbrow names as Salisbury steak, ground beef, hamburger, and chopped round steak malign the hamburger. "The hamburger properly made does not need an apology," he said.

The society wants to remove the stigma attached to the hamburger when the hot dog received prior rights as the main food for visiting English royalty at the Roosevelt home in Hyde Park.

"But the hot dog and the hamburger really aren't competitors."

O'Connell said, "There's a place for both. The hot dog is ideal for eating at the circus, ball game and picnic. The hamburger is a restaurant dish."

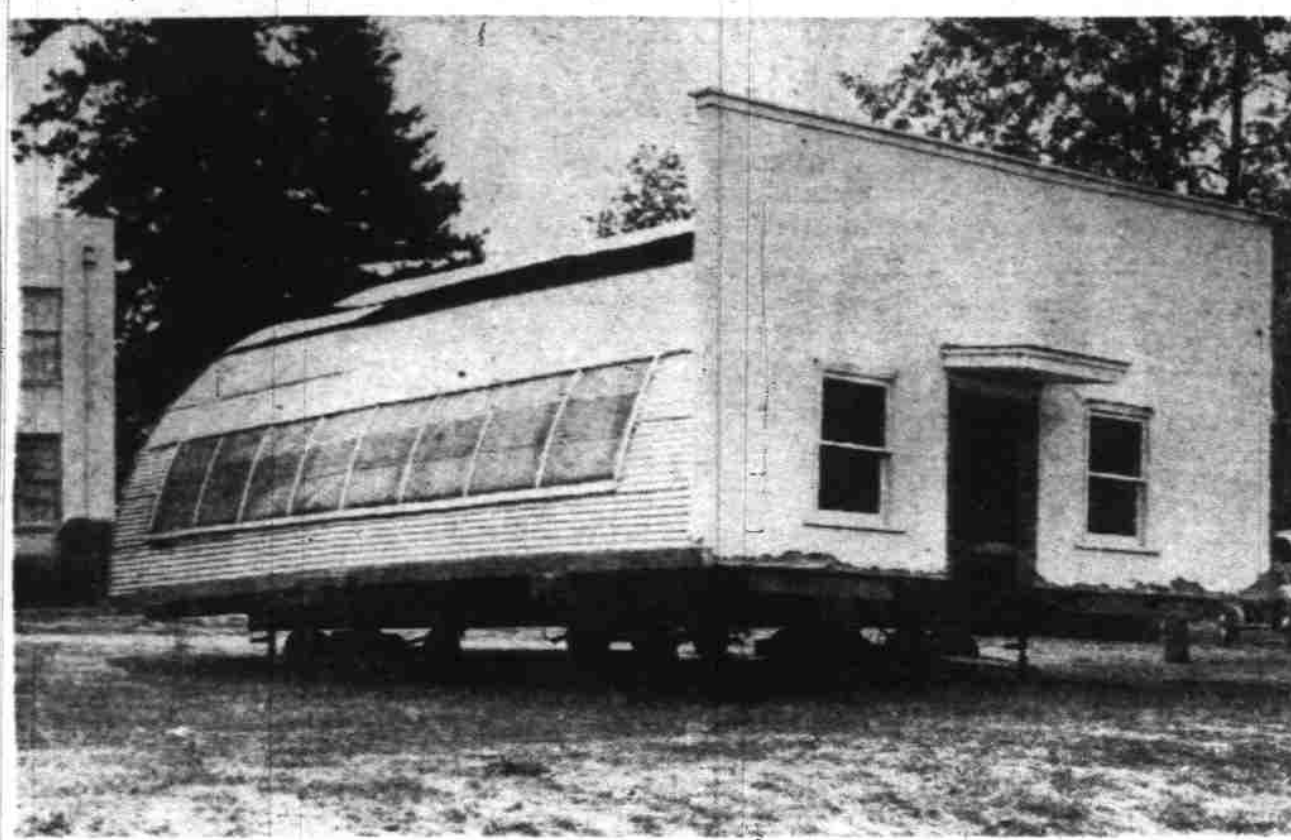
A hamburger epicure, O'Connell gives some advice on how to prepare the sandwich. The hamburger is cooked in its own fat and juices on a hot steel griddle, he said.

It shouldn't be fried with butter or shortening. Four or five hamburgers should be patted from a pound of ground beef. They should be at least one-half inch thick. O'Connell recommends meat ground from chuck cuts of beef.

O'Connell Names Specialty
While the standard hamburger is served with a grilled onion and a lone slice of spiced pickle, O'Connell has his specialty. He calls it the outdoor hamburger sandwich. It's a gourmet's delight. The hamburger is cooked over a charcoal broiler. The buns are toasted. The hamburger is placed on one half. The grilled tomato goes on top. On this he pours melted rarebit sauce. It is garnished with a sprinkling of paprika.
