

Edwin H. Lovegrove, Famed Hero of World War I, Taken

A World War I British war hero, veteran of nearly 30 years service under three flags, died in Salem Tuesday after more than a year's illness.

He was Edwin Howard Lovegrove, 54, who had lived at 140 N. 24th st. since the end of World War II, and was an employee at various state institutions in Salem.

Lovegrove, born March 20, 1895, in Wallingford, England, enlisted in the British army as a drummer boy in the King's Grenadier Guards when he was 15.

When war came in 1914 he landed in France with the "Old Contemptibles," a famed British regiment, and was wounded four times and gassed twice while serving with his outfit. He was bayoneted at Amiens and Salonika, shot while serving in the Balkans and wounded by shrapnel and gassed at Ypres.

It was in World War I that Lovegrove was decorated by four nations. He was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal, Mon's Star, the General Service Medal and the King George Order of Bravery from England, the Croix-de-Guerre from France, the Order of St. George from Russia, and the Italian Order of Bravery. In addition, he received three other citations.

Lovegrove served with the British army until 1922 and rose from private to captain. He last served with the military intelligence staff in Egypt.

In 1922 he came to Canada and served three years as a trooper with the Royal Canadian Mounted. He came to the United States after his discharge and worked at hospitals in Portland, Pendleton and La Grande prior to World War II.

He joined the 218th field artillery band of the Oregon national guard in 1932, serving until 1941, and was drum major of the band four years.

Lovegrove also was drum major of the American Legion band at La Grande and the VFW band of Portland.

During World War II Lovegrove tried to enlist in both the army and navy but was turned back because of his age. He was accepted Feb. 4, 1942, for limited service with the marine corps and served as a drill sergeant at various stations in this county until discharged in March, 1945.

Lovegrove was a member of American Legion post 1 and the Allied Officers club, both in Portland.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Venetta Lovegrove, whom he married May 15, 1948, in Washington; two children by a former marriage, Stanley and Gordon Lovegrove, both of Portland; and two grandchildren.

Funeral services will be at 2:30 p.m. today at the W. T. Rigdon chapel with the Rev. George Swift officiating. Ritualistic services will be conducted by Capital post 9, American Legion. Interment will be in Belcrest Memorial park.

Cheerful Victim Of Polio Returns

PORTLAND, Aug. 24 (AP)—A six-year-old boy who left here on a vacation with his parents several weeks ago returned today in a wheelchair—but as cheerful as ever.

Little Rodney Phelps was stricken by bulbar polio while driving through Texas. "The doctors said he didn't have a chance," reported the father, E. H. Phelps.

But the boy recovered enough to return here. He still can not swallow, but his once-paralyzed arm can move again.

He was taken to a hospital here for further treatment.

Board to Reconsider Offer of Hospital

ASTORIA, Aug. 24 (AP)—The Astoria naval hospital problem will come before the state board of control once more.

Gov. Douglas McKay wrote State Sen. Bob Holmes that the question would be referred again to the board, although the governor doubted that the board would change its opinion.

Holmes wants the surplus structure taken over by the state, but the board said it felt expenses would be too great.

Juveniles Held For 'Wrecking' School Interior

Three Salem juveniles were arrested by city police Wednesday and charged with juvenile delinquency after they were seen in the Washington school shortly before considerable damage to the interior of the school was discovered.

The boys, two of them 15 years old and the other 16, were trapped by officers in the building but escaped down a fire escape and ran off in different directions.

One was tracked down by a squad car at Capitol and North Marion streets and another was arrested at his home, although he tried to escape from the house.

Both are being held in the county juvenile ward.

The third boy was brought to the police station by his father and was released in his father's custody. He is cited to appear in court this morning.

Police said one of the juveniles admitted breaking into the school on at least two separate occasions.

Inmates Tunnel Out of Walla Walla Prison

WALLA WALLA, Aug. 24 (AP)—An inmate of the state penitentiary described as "dangerous and vicious" by officials is at large tonight and three others are in solitary confinement after the four tunneled out from under the walls of the institution.

Warden John Cranor said that George Madison, serving life on a murder conviction from Spokane county, made his getaway in a truck taken from the state game farm across the highway from the prison.

Madison, along with Lawrence (Curley) Colton, Robert Frazier and Harold Ruddy, escaped through a tunnel believed started several weeks ago.

Silverton Church Extends Call to Rev. C. J. Johnson

SILVERTON, Aug. 24 (Special)—The congregation of Trinity Lutheran church tonight voted to extend the call to the Rev. C. J. Johnson, Tacoma, Wash., to be pastor of the church.

Johnson now is pastor of a congregation of 313 in Tacoma. The church congregation here numbers 467.

If he accepts, Johnson will come to Silverton early in September with Mrs. Johnson and their two daughters. The Rev. M. J. K. Fuhr, now the pastor here, has accepted a call in Washington and will preach his farewell sermon September 4.

Johnson is a member of the American Legion post 1 and the Allied Officers club, both in Portland.

Trio Rescued from Submerged Auto

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Aug. 24 (AP)—Three persons were rescued from a submerged automobile in a roadside lake along the Columbia gorge highway tonight.

Rescued were Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hurst, Nampa, Idaho, and their son, Fred Jr. All are in a hospital here. The elder Hurst was described as in the worst condition of the three, but he is expected to survive if pneumonia doesn't develop.

Marine Reservists Invade Rifle Range For Arms Training

CAMP PENDLETON, Oceanside Calif., Aug. 23 (Special)—Marine reservists of the 4th 105mm howitzer battalion and the 17th reserve engineer company invaded Chappo Flats rifle range today for small-arms firing.

The northwest reservists, including a Salem, Ore., battery, are undergoing 15 days of summer active duty training. During their eight hour firing spree, they bettered last year's records.

Earlier this year, Salem's "C" battery won the Northwestern Company Pistol league championship with a 901.4 average, 200 points above the second place competitors.

Opening its second week of training, the battalion will train as separate batteries in preparation for an overnight field artillery problem.

Tito's Forces Pledge Support

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Aug. 24 (AP)—The airforce and the future leaders of Yugoslavia's best army units pledged to fight today against any aggression.

There seemed little likelihood that this tough little country's offer to settle her row with Russia over communist politics would ease the tension soon.

Foreign observers believed the feud had gone too far and too deep, particularly since Yugoslavia has clearly stated she is not going to climb down from her position of independence from Moscow in domestic and foreign affairs.

A letter to Premier Marshal Tito from the airforce declared: "Conscious of the situation we are in, we are prepared to defend our socialist homeland against anyone—no matter from which side it comes."

Welfare Group Rules Cars Go Or Pensions

PORTLAND, Aug. 24 (AP)—The state public welfare commission ruled today that 78-year-old Logan Fields must give up his automobile or lose old age assistance.

The commission upheld the Multnomah county welfare commission, which had discontinued welfare payments to Fields because he owned a car. The rules permit relief recipients to own cars only if essential.

The decision was made after another appeal for pensioners to be allowed to keep inexpensive cars, so that they can reach grocery stores and hunt bargains. Joseph E. Dunne, old-age pension group head, said he planned to take court action in the matter.

UPS PRODUCTION
LEBANON, Aug. 24 — The Lebanon Crown Zellerbach paper mill, which for several weeks has been operating on a five-day-a-week basis, Monday stepped up production to six days a week.

George Galloway, resident manager, announced today. Galloway said the new schedule will be observed for at least three weeks.

Glass Worker Strike Delays Construction

Salem construction work involving glass installations may be in line for delays soon as the indirect result of a wage dispute between glaziers and glass firms in Portland, it was indicated here Wednesday.

Glaziers have been off the job in Portland since Monday. Union officials and dealers in Salem said negotiations were to be confined to larger firms in Portland, which set the pace for agreements.

The present supply in Salem is adequate for a normal period of approximately three weeks, or less in some outlets, according to one large dealer. If the regular supply is not available from Portland, it was expected that some might be obtained from San Francisco.

Constructor Henry Carl reported Wednesday night construction on Capitol and Four Corners school projects already is being slowed by the dispute. He said workers need glass for windows immediately and doubted that sufficient material could be obtained from sources other than in Portland.

Benefit Dog Show Set by Labor Council

A dog show to be presented by the Northwest Guide dog foundation will be sponsored next month by Salem's Trades and Labor council, Executive Secretary Herbert Barker said late Wednesday night.

Proceeds of the show will be used to provide a seeing-eye dog for at least one and possibly two deserving blind persons in Marion county, Barker said.

The show is scheduled tentatively September 23 and will include a trick-dog troupe and an exhibition of seeing-eye dogs in operation designed to explain the process of adapting blind persons to the dogs.

The Trades and Labor council also went on record Wednesday night as unanimously backing the drive to secure an iron lung sponsor by the Order of the Eagles, Williamette aerie. The council plans to canvass local unions for contributions.

Mountain View School Project Contract Let

ORCHARD HEIGHTS, Aug. 24 —Work of adding a third classroom to the Mountain View school is to begin immediately, it was reported today following opening of bids on the job earlier this week.

The contract went to Ted Patzer, Salem contractor, on his low bid of \$14,126. Four other bids were received. Frank Struble of Salem is the architect. The new room will be of glass brick and is to be completed about a month after school opens.

About 70 students are expected to register for the school's eight grades this year. It is located on Orchard Heights road about two miles west of Salem in Polk county.

Newspaper Claims Proof Elliott Collected on Ads

PORTLAND, Aug. 24 (AP)—The Oregonian tonight published photographs of cancelled checks which the newspaper said proved that Multnomah County Sheriff M. L. Elliott had received at least some payments for advertising in a publication that had gleaned \$8,000 to \$10,000 from businessmen.

The publication had been distributed as the sheriff's reserve yearbook. This organization later said it obtained no benefit from sale of the advertisements.

Elliott is under fire in a recall action.

Loggers Find Wreckage of Light Plane

LONGVIEW, Wash., Aug. 24 (AP)—The moss-covered wreckage of a small private plane was found today by timber cruisers who recovered from it a pilot's license issued to Elmer West, jr., of Bakersfield, Calif.

The men said they thought there were two bodies in the plane and guessed, from the growth of brush around it, that it had been there at least two years.

Sheriff C. W. Reynolds said the plane, from the description of the wreckage, possibly was a two-place Stinson. The civil aeronautics authority in Seattle said it had no record of such a craft being lost in that area.

The sheriff, Coroner Gordon Quartroun and representatives of the CAA and the air search and rescue service plan to go to the site early tomorrow. The wreckage is about 12 miles southeast of here in the rugged Italian creek district.

One man reached into the plane and obtained the license, the sheriff said. The timber cruisers who located the craft were N. T. Stubbs of Buckley, Jack Southerland of Seattle and Jack Bruge of Kelso.

Late Sports 'Shrines' Set Final Drills

PORTLAND, Aug. 24 (AP)—The Oregon All-Stars today elected Tackle Doug Hogland of Bend and Halfback Don Donovan of Grants Pass as co-captains for Saturday night's second annual Shrine hospital football game. The Portland team picked Halfback Bob Hamblin of Roosevelt and Center Bob Rudolph of Jefferson as field leaders.

The Oregon team worked out under the lights at Multnomah stadium tonight and found the turf in excellent condition for its quick-opening T-formation attack. The Portlanders will drill at the stadium Friday night while the upstate team finishes its workouts tomorrow and Friday at Cleveland.

A mammoth rally at Multnomah Athletic club Thursday night will launch festivities for Saturday's pigskin clash. The rally will be preceded by a parade through downtown streets.

Players of both squads were reported in top physical shape today, with no injuries serious enough to keep anyone out of action.

Favored to repeat last year's victory are the Staters, though the contest is expected to be closer than last year's 35-13.

Hiestand Nabs Shoot Title

VANDALIA, O., Aug. 24 (AP)—Joe Hiestand, 42-year-old Hillsboro, O., farmer, continued to dominate the 50th grand American trapshoot today as he captured the Class AA championship with a perfect 200 score at 16 yards.

Hiestand was tied for the title by E. M. (Gene) Wenz, Louisville, Ky., taxidermist, but defeated the Blue Grass marksman, 150 to 149, in a shootout.

Behind Hiestand and Wenz in the double AA race were four shooters who tied with 199 of 200. They included Arnold Riegger, Seattle, Wash.

WICHITA, Kas., Aug. 24 (AP)—The Mt. Vernon (Wash.) Milkmaids eliminated the Detroit (Mich.) Jerry Lynch team from the National Semi-pro Baseball tournament tonight with a 10-0 defeat.
