Elsolde Eland, social missions worker on Ellis Island, N. Y., for the United Lutheran church in America, will be guest speaker at St. Mark Evangelical Lutheran church Sunday at the 11 a. m. service. The public is invited.

Miss Eland, Estonian by birth, has an international background. She has been the immigrant and social worker at the U. S. immigration station for the past seven years. She is one of the staff members of the ULCA board of social missions.

Kells, who has seen her at work, called her "the guard angel" of many immigrant families. She writes letters for the anxious immigrant families, purchases articles and helps in many ways to ease the discomforts of DPs and other immigrants.
