

Emergency Board Halts Above-Budget Spending

Oregon's state emergency board applied the brakes to over-the-budget spending by several state departments in a meeting here Friday.

By referring several appropriation requests to the further study of the state budget office, the emergency board exercised newly legislated powers of control over state government functions which are self supporting and formerly were not responsible to any outside officials in matters of finance.

State Labor commissioner W. E. Kimsey appeared before the emergency board here with a request for authority to expend \$98,878, outside his department budget, to carry out the provisions of the new electrical inspection law.

State Sen. Dean Walker asked State Budget Director Harry Dorman if his department had gone on record favoring the expenditure.

Dorman replied in the negative and explained that most of the requests for additional funds now before the emergency board arrived at his office less than two weeks ago and he had not had time to give them consideration.

Walker then moved that action on the request be deferred until a recommendation was received from the budget division. There was no opposition to the motion.

From Increased Fees

Similar action followed consideration of a request from the state game commission for authority to expend \$2,174,059 not included in its budget. Game department officials explained that the additional money would come from increased fees. The additional

money is needed, the officials said, for operation of added services under the commission reorganization plan. The increased fees and reorganization were approved by the 1949 legislature.

Senator William Walsh, president of the state senate, would chairmen of the emergency board, told officials if they required additional money for operating costs they should have a recommended budget before the emergency group at its next meeting within 30 days.

Received Approval

The board authorized transfer of \$193,698 from the state flax fund to the penitentiary improvement fund. This money, according to prison officials, would make it possible to construct a number of small buildings at the institution. These projects have received approval of the state budget department.

Among larger revised budgets of self sustaining activities approved included \$2,399,679 for the state fish commission, \$90,000 for crippled children's division, \$1,947,405 for the state board of health and \$938,403 for the state division of vocational training. The milk marketing administration budget was increased \$18,150.

Dallas Couple In Burma Area Due for Attack

RANGOON, Burma, Aug. 26—(AP)—Embassy officials of five nations set out today on a flying diplomatic mission intended to rescue 12,000 foreigners trapped by civil war battles in rebel-held Taunggyi.

Eighteen Americans involved were safe at last reports.

The Burmese government sponsored the diplomats' trip to call on the rebels in hopes of getting foreigners out of the way of an offensive and air-bombing planned by the army to retake the town.

The Karen tribesmen, fighting to establish a state of their own, captured Taunggyi August 13.

The Americans were identified as educators and Baptist missionaries.

The Diplomatic mission from the U. S., British, Chinese, Indian and Pakistani legations planned to land at Heho, 22 miles from Taunggyi, and wait there while an embassy flying with them goes on to deal with the Karen command.

Asks Evacuation

Official sources here said the government had asked the embassies to get their nationals out of the Taunggyi area quickly to escape the coming air attacks.

Experts here said such evacuation would be a high-impossible task because it would have to be made by air to be completely successful and would take at least a week.

DALLAS, Ore., Aug. 26—(Specials)—A Dallas couple, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Dashiell, are among 18 Americans trapped in rebel-held Taunggyi, Burma.

The couple flew in June from San Francisco to Rangoon where Dashiell is a Fulbright fellowship student studying geography to obtain a doctor's degree from the University of Washington.

Dashiell's parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Dashiell of Dallas, said Friday their son had been in Taunggyi about two weeks. His last letter home arrived in Dallas August 18. He mentioned that conditions were unsettled in the area but saw no immediate danger in the situation.

Dashiell, educated in Polk county schools and at Oregon College of Education, taught last year at Eastern Washington College of Education at Cheney and previously had taught at the University of Denver.

Detroit Dam Blaze Quelled

EUGENE, Aug. 26—(AP)—Williamette forest headquarters in Eugene was alerted for two hours this afternoon when Detroit ranger district reported a blaze in the forest's worst fire headache—the Detroit dam site.

What headquarters and district Ranger T. E. Moore termed a miracle held the slash fire to three acres, straight up the mountain on the river side at Hall's camp, a mile above the dam.

About 60 men contained the blaze two hours.

Martin Luther Morris, 95, One Of State's Oldest Natives, Dies

One of Oregon's oldest native sons, Martin Luther Morris, died at his Salem home Friday night just a few days before his 96th birthday. Morris was a descendant of Robert Morris who signed the Declaration of Independence. He was born in a log cabin near Yamhill Sept. 3, 1853, and lived with his daughter, Mrs. Roseville Allender, at 2395 N. 4th st., Salem. Dr. Henry E. Morris, Salem optometrist, is a son and another son, Dr. M. L. Morris lives at Pine Bluff, Wyo.

His parents came to Oregon in 1851 by ox team across the plains and settled near Yamhill. His mother, Susan Good Morris, was the first white girl born in Missouri, and his father came from Pennsylvania.

His wife, Emma Daniels, who came to Oregon from Minnesota, died in April, 1946.

He lived in Salem the last 12 years of his life. He was believed to be the oldest member of the Elks lodge in Oregon.

Among survivors are a brother and sister M. G. Morris, 85, and Lizzie Morris, 82, of Yamhill; eight grandchildren, Luther Seibert of Virginia; Kenneth Morris, Darlene Sandmark, Morris Carol and Catherine Allender of Salem; Robert Morris and Virginia McDougall of Long Beach, Calif.; and 8 great grandchildren.

Funeral arrangements will be made by Clough-Barrick Co.

**U.S. Citizenship
Restored to
Nisei by Court**

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 26—(AP)—In a bitter criticism of the wartime exclusion of those of Japanese blood from the west coast, the U. S. district court of appeals today affirmed restoration of citizenship to three Japanese-American women.

Three, like thousands of others, had renounced their American citizenship while interned in relocation centers, such as Tule Lake, in California.

District Judge William C. Mathes of Los Angeles held that the three women renounced their free and intelligent choice, but rather because of mental fear, intimidation and coercion, depriving them of the free exercise of their will.

Santiam River Change Stalled By Breakdown

JEFFERSON, Aug. 26—Equipment breakdown Friday afternoon forestalled diversion of the North Santiam river to a temporary channel as planned earlier in line with flood control work now in progress about four miles above Jefferson.

W. F. Weddle, in charge of the dike and diversion channel project, said late Friday that final bulldozing and stump clearing would allow diversion of the main North Santiam river from its channel late Saturday.

The flood control work, consist-

ing of ripped channels and a 15-foot dike, is aimed at straightening the course of the North Santiam and guiding it into a new junction with the South Santiam a few hundred feet below the present fork. The project is mostly a private venture of 13 farmers whose more than 2,200 acres of prize river bottom farmland is being stripped by the yearly floods of the North and South Santiams. The area lies between Jefferson and Green's bridge, about five miles east.
