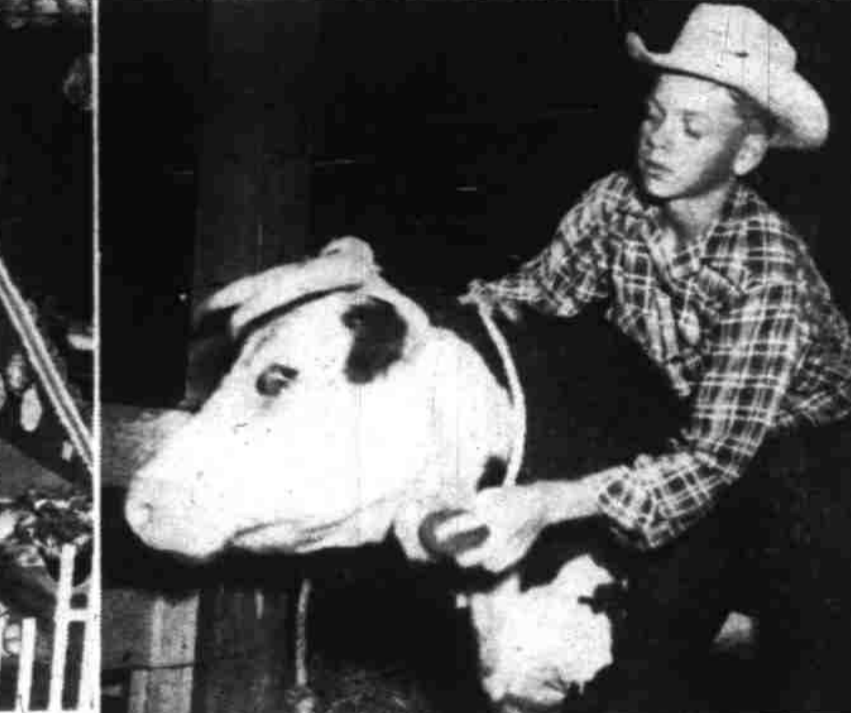

Poor Salmon Season Ends With Decline

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 26—(AP)—One of the poorest summer commercial fishing seasons in history ended at noon today.

Early reports from packers indicated that salmon catches declined sharply during the last 24 hours from an average of 1,000 pounds a boat to only 600.

That was depressing news for the sports fishermen, beginning to throng into this area for the annual salmon derbies. Among the crowds were the mayors of nearly a score of cities, who met in Ilwaco, Wash., for the "mayors' derby."

"The commercial catch this August was bewailed by both packers and fishermen as "one of the worst and maybe the poorest on record." The exact figures will not be compiled for several weeks.

Commercial fishermen now begin a 15-day holiday, awaiting opening of the fall season September 10. Many won't actually vacation; they'll take tourists out sports fishing in their boats.
