400 Treated to Plane Rides at McNary Field

More than 400 persons were treated to airplane rides, many of them for the first time, as they and thousands of others watched Salem's Aviation day at McNary field.

A United Air lines DC-4 carried about 176 persons on four one-hour trips up the Santiam canyon over Detroit damsite and around Mt. Jefferson.

Another 96 were given hour courtesy tours to the Oregon coast by a West Coast airlines DC-3.

On Short Rides over City
After other events, commercial operators began taking from one to three passengers per trip on short rides over Salem and vicinity, carrying nearly 200 persons before closing up about 7 p.m.

Not only did the control tower, in charge of Stanley Dilatush, direct a steady stream of landings and takeoffs, but it displayed its high-side facilities to scores of visitors.

Other events of the day included eight fast-flying F-51s of the Oregon national guard and the demonstration of crop-dusting by Ace Flying service craft.

Dusters and sprays, as well as deal-ers aircraft, were also on display.

Visiting fliers and local participants had high praise for the airport's hospitality and for control of auto and airplane parking by various organizations. Sponsors of the show were the local flying services, state board of aeronautics, company B of the national guard and Salem merchants.

Cherrians Assist
Assisting were the Cherrians and the Salem civil air patrol unit. The national guard served approximately 500 fliers and aides in an army-style lunch in one hangar, as well as handling the cooling concessions.

State, County Fairs on Slate For September

The annual state fair, 15 county fairs and seven salmon and bass fishing derbies head the list of state-wide attractions for Oregon residents and tourists during September.

Final preparations will be completed this week for the 84th annual state fair which opens a week from today in Salem.

Salmon derbies are scheduled August 20-September 5 at Astoria, September 2-5 at Warrenton, September 3-October 31 at Pacific City-Woods and September 17-October 9 at Nehalem. Open salmon derbies will be held at Taft and Seaside with an open bass derby at Coos Bay.

Linn county's annual 4-H fair will be held at Albany August 29-September 1.

Other County fairs will be held on the following September dates: Coos at Myrtle Point, 2-5; Grant at John Day, 22-24; Harney at Burns, 16-18; Hood River at Hood River, 2-3; Jefferson at Madras, 2-3; Lake at Lakeview, 3-5; Lane at Eugene, 21-24; Morrow at Hephner, 1-3; Union at LaGrande, 22-24; Sherman at Moro, 16-19; Gilliam at Condon, 23-25; Wasco at Tygh Valley, 2-4; Washington at Hillsboro, August 31-September 3; and Joseph at Grants Pass, third week in September.

Other September events include the Portland Dahlia show, September 17-18; Harvest festival at Ashland (open); Illinois valley miners' jubilee at Cave Junction, September 3-5; and Pacific university centennial pageant at Forest Grove, September 24.

About 500 people came to join in the fun. More than 200 automobiles were parked off the road—and there are only 225 inhabitants in this country town.

It was quite an anniversary for the senator. He began the custom in 1903 and has kept it up except for the war years. Some said there were tears in his eyes as he played away at the piano.

And when the last "amen" had been sung, the clouds closed and another cloudburst descended.

Heaviest Advance Ticket Sale In History Precedes State Fair

Oregon's 84th annual state fair opens one week from today in Salem, and Manager Leo Spitzbart reports the heaviest advance ticket sale in the history of the colorful exposition.

All commercial space already has been sold for the event. A ticket booth for reserved seats is to open this week at High and State streets on the courthouse lawn.

As a further boost to possible attendance records, Southern Pacific railroad officials announced over the week end that special passenger cars from Portland will stop at the fairgrounds for the first time in more than 20 years.

Trains will carry as many extra cars as the traffic demands.

At the fairgrounds last week 100 men were working daily to prepare the 167 acres of grounds for the Labor day opening.

To Get Week's Rest
Rodeo stock of Henry Christenson, Eugene, arrived at the grounds Saturday for a week's rest before opening of the night combined rodeo-horse show in the main pavilion. Horse show entries closed Thursday night with a record entry list.

Livestock will arrive this week with more than 5,000 animals to be stalled on the grounds in competition for \$75,000 in prizes.

Miss Hughes Due in Salem
Helene Hughes, San Francisco producer, is due in Salem Wednesday to supervise final preparations for her 1949 state revue to be held each evening in front of the racing grandstand.

The military service exhibit will cover nearly 30,000 square feet and is expected to be the largest peacetime arms display ever seen on the west coast. Four military bands, including the San Francisco marine corps band that thrilled thousands at Saturday's Shrine all-star football game in Portland, will furnish music for the exhibit.

'Kiddieland' Ready
A new fair feature will be the recently-constructed "Kiddieland" for youngsters 10 and under which includes a new lawn, white picket fence and dozens of nursery rhyme characters.

Gate admission will remain at 50 cents, including tax. Children 12 and under will be admitted free. Midways shows, presented four times daily, will be free to the public.

GAR Oldsters Dispute 'Last Meeting' Plans

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Six union veterans were in town today, looking game enough to change their minds about this being their last encampment.

Like most convention delegations, some of the aged veterans didn't even bother to go to the memorial service that opened the Grand Army of the Republic encampment.

Charles L. Chappel, the 102-year-old senior vice commander from Long Beach, Calif., ate a hearty meal instead.

"This is supposed to be the last encampment," he told hotel lobby well-wishers, referring to the decision made at the encampment in Grand Rapids, Mich., last year.

"Some of them said they aren't going again, but they are," he said with a twinkle of the eyes.

Commander-in-chief Theodore A. Penland, 100, of Vancouver, Wash., said when he arrived yesterday that this is definitely the last meeting. That would give him the commander's post for the rest of his life.

Charles Chappel had an idea today. "I'm going to ask Penland for his place and see what he says."

"He doesn't want to give up his post," explained Mrs. Lillian M. Gardner of Los Angeles, secretary of the California-Nevada GAR department.

Old Charles loves the GAR so much, she said, that he goes into Los Angeles once a month for a "post meeting," although no other veteran ever gets there.
