

Judges Back Hawaii Dock Seizure Law

HONOLULU, Aug. 29 (AP)—A two judge federal district court ruled today that the Territory of Hawaii may continue its stevedoring service but that striking longshoremen may continue to picket the operation.

Judges J. Frank McLaughlin and Delbert E. Metzger gave their oral opinion on a challenge of the territory's special stevedoring law by the striking CIO International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union.

The judges meanwhile agreed to hear the union application for a permanent injunction against the law.

The decision forbids payment of any profits from government operations to the struck stevedoring companies. The special dock law had provided that all profits, minus one-fourth of one per cent, be paid to the companies for use of their facilities.

The decision also held that the territory could not apply the dock law in any way that would deny the union's exercise of federal rights or to deny the union's right to publicize its view of the law.

Chest Workers Hear Hazen

A new slant on Salem's community chest drive was presented to committee members and workers Monday by Ben Hazen, who is president of the Portland community chest for the second successive year.

Hazen observed that persons who donated to chest drives when they were poor also donate when and if they become wealthy. Those who failed to donate when they were poor could not afford to do so, also fail to donate in later years when they can afford sizable contributions, he added.

Success of Salem's drive, Hazen said, will depend on selling the fact that everyone should contribute some amount because everyone benefits in some way.

Hazen, who is president of Benjamin Franklin Savings and Loan of Portland, addressed local workers at a noon luncheon in the YMCA.

Armory Fund Use Clarified

The state emergency board, under a law of the 1941 legislature, is primarily concerned with the approval of expenditures by state officers and departments in excess of the amounts budgeted and does not have to authorize the expenditure of the state armory fund created by the 1941 legislature.

Ryegrass Yield Increase in State Forecast

PORTLAND, Aug. 29 (AP)—Ryegrass yields will be higher in Oregon this year, but legume cover crop seeds will be down, the federal crop reporting service said today.

The ryegrass crop was estimated at 49,000,000 pounds, compared with last year's 34,600,000. A severe winter and late spring frost are blamed for a cut in legume cover crop seeds to 113,000,000 pounds, which nevertheless represents 68 per cent of the nation's supply.

The hairy vetch crop in Oregon was estimated at 14,500,000 down 500,000 from last year. The common and Willamette vetch crop was estimated at 11,900,000 pounds, less than half the 1948 output.

Plantings of Austrian peas were increased 17,000 acres, but the harvest will be 29,600,000 pounds, only 4,600,000 above a year ago. Hungarian vetch output was estimated at 630,000 pounds, compared with 1,100,000 last year.

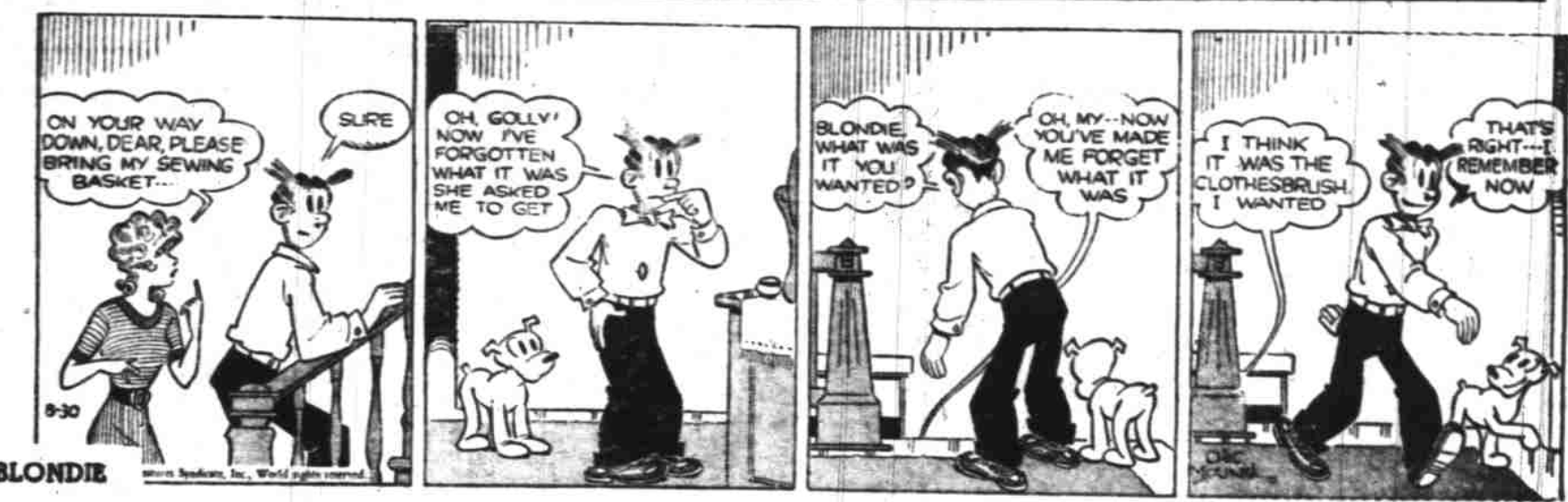
Firm Tone in Wheat Prices
