More for Your Money School Dresses Designed Especially For Chubby Girl

Special recognition now is given chubby children by designers who pay attention to their needs in that matter of roomier frocks and coats in proportions, and usually colors and fabric patterns that present a unified effect.

For this reason, you're much more likely to find becoming frocks and coats in chubby sizes rather than by trying to get along with a regular garment in a size or so larger than the girl ordinarily wears. And this season, fashion has been kind to the chubby sisterhood. Here are some of the special designs that are especially good:

GINGHAMS— Simple bodice and four-score skirt in checks and the new small scale plaids, with touches of white. Avoid large plaids and block plaids, stick to an all-over effect in pattern, whether flower print, check, or plaid.

Also avoid expanse of white so much used in bib and bolero styles for standard sizes. The moderate flare of the four-gore skirt is very becoming, usually more so than the skirt with bunched fullness in unpressed pleats or gathers.

SEPARATE LOOK— Extremely popular, and the chubby girl can enjoy it if she avoids sharp contrasts of color between skirt and blouse. Select two tones of one color, or the same color in different fabrics, such as a wool skirt with matching sweater set (avoid close-fitting "slimners") or a corduroy skirt with a cotton broadcloth or chambray blouse of the same color. Avoid oversize plaids and checks in blouses. The same principles apply to the popular suspender sets in corduroy.

CLASSIC CORDUROYS offer many possibilities in dresses and suits. Avoid big pockets that are too pronounced, also over large patch pockets. Strive always for simplicity of line, a single, unified color effect, and skirts whose drapes disguise bulges. (Copyright 1948, General Features Corp.)
