

### Good Land Use Show Set Sept. 17

AUMSVILLE — The stage is set for Oregon's biggest good land use show, Saturday, September 17 on the Irvin Bartels farm, one mile north of Shaw in Marion county.

"Willamette Valley Soil Conservation Day" is different than most farmer-gatherings. It will be a time for making new friends and

greeting old ones. But it will go further than that. Its purpose is to get more landowners to farm the soil conservation way.

By day's end, field day visitors will have been shown the right conservation treatment for most of the hills of Willamette valley lands. For example, the increasing soil losses which are occurring on hillside farm lands has a special spot on the program. Two of the soil conservation practices that help keep soils in place on sloping lands — contour strip cropping and diversion terraces — will be laid out on the field day site.

Farmers will also be shown what can be done to drain wet

bottomlands, and carry off water on rolling upland fields. But, the day-long program won't stop there. It will feature such good land use measures as sub-soiling, use of crop residues for erosion control, seeding of grass waterways, roadside erosion control, building of a 1/2-acre stock water pond, and wells and spring development, to rid fields of blackberry vines, by the chemical weed and brush eradication demonstration. Instruction in the right way to treat fence posts, fertilize pasture and croplands, and select the right seed mixtures, will be given.

Seven implement companies will supply farm equipment and

carry out construction work on the soil conservation practices. Technicians and engineers of the Station staff of the U. S. soil conservation service were scheduled to complete survey work on the practices by late next week.

Oregon's governor, Douglas McKay, and state agricultural leaders will speak during noon-time activities.
