Building for County Health Unit Proposed

Marion County Judge Grant Murphy was directed Wednesday by the county court to contact directors of Salem General hospital to secure a price on D street property in view of establishing the county health unit in its own separate quarters. The move, under consideration by the court for some time, was headed Wednesday when Judge Murphy and Dr. W. J. Stone were approached by William Gahlsdorf on behalf of the hospital in regard to the property located near the hospital. If a satisfactory price on the

property can be settled upon, the court will put a proposal to levy \$35,000 in excess of 6 per cent limitation on the 1950 primary ballot. Federal aid would be expected to raise the total to \$50,000 for the project. No facilities for the county health unit have been provided in the plans for the new courthouse, because members of the courthouse committee felt it should not be quartered there.
