**Aluminum, Stainless Steel
Now Make Table Pieces**

Aluminum, long popular for cooking utensils, is taking on decorative importance these days at its bows in for use at the table.

On of its most popular forms is in beverage sets, tumblers and a matching pitcher. You'll find these in a mat hammered finish, also plain with a high polish. Quite new, too, is its use as a casserole with a liner of glass. Of course, for some time it has been familiar in small decorative pieces such as coasters, butler's trays, and larger serving trays.

In a good weight, it is quite attractive in all these uses. The



tumblers will be especially welcome to mothers of small children. Unless really mistreated with blows that will dent them, these aluminum tumblers can take a lot of hard use. Keeping them polished offers no problem — all you need is a bit of very fine abrasive or cleaning powder to supplement ordinary dishwashing once in a while.

Another interesting development in metal is the use of chrome plated stainless steel in small trays and vegetable serving dishes and meat platters. These pieces do not look like silver, but they are attractive and serve the same purpose — at considerably less cost. The serving trays in some cases are adaptations of the close and intricate chased designs used on the old English tinware of early days.
