

Nervous Grain Market Dips; Wheat Steady

CHICAGO, Sept. 20 (AP)—The grain market was nervous today and considerable liquidation developed during the board of trade session. Although the September wheat contract managed to finish even with yesterday's close, other contracts had a difficult time.

Short covering brought the September contract fractionally above the previous finish, but other grains with soybeans and lard were dragged lower under the impact of foreign monetary devaluation and the threat of serious labor troubles.

At the close wheat was unchanged to 2 1/2 lower, corn was 1/2 to 1 1/2 lower and lard was off 12 to 42 cents a hundredweight. After a weak start there was a fairly strong rally, but the buying was not sustained, except in the nearby contracts of wheat and corn.

Selling Knocks Billion from Stock Values

NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—Relentless selling hit the stock market one of the worst wallops of the year today.

Key issues were knocked down fractions to stop of 3 points, \$1,000,000,000 (B) or more was wiped-off the market value of all stocks listed on the exchange.

The general price level was forced back to the lowest point since Aug. 31.

Wall street sources credited labor heartening cost of steel labor news and second-currency devaluation on the main reasons behind the selling.

In addition, contract troubles are boiling to a head at the Ford Motor Co. and 16,000 workers are still on strike at Goodrich Rubber plants.

Only the gold stocks, as a group, made any sort of showing. Selling never got out of control but the steady retreat met with little or no resistance. In the last few minutes of trading some leaders made a stand and managed to creep up 1/4 or 1/2 point from the lows of the day.

Business was brisk throughout the day. Turnover amounted to 1,350,000 shares, against 1,300,000 Monday.

The associated press average of 60 stocks plunged 12 points to 63.9. A drop of this size has not exceeded only once this year—on May 31 at 1.4—But has been matched twice.

The industrial group took the worst beating, followed by the rails and utilities.

A total of 1,112 individual issues changed hands, of which 882 declined. Only 86 advanced.

The rumblings of devaluation, touched off by the British pound and swiftly followed by 19 other nations, grew to a roar. In wall street the fear gained ground that fiercer foreign competition may eat deeply into the profits of U. S. concerns operating abroad.
