Beauty Aids

Double Chins are Unbecoming; Correct Weight the Remedy

HOLLYWOOD (INS)—A double chin is one beauty flaw which even the magic powers of make-up aren't able to overcome to any appreciable extent.

It is true that for motion picture purposes a make-up artist can, if he must, temporarily make a double chin into a single one with concealed and uncomfortable applications of adhesive tape or gummed-on goldbeaters skin which will pull the chin sag up for as long as the camera requires. But for private life appearances all that cap advantageously be done with an extra chin is to get rid of it. Lifts of the sort mentioned aren't practical except for pictures, and no cosmetic applications can fully conceal the fact that a person has one or more chins too many.

Very few people who weigh exactly as many pounds as they should have a double chin. On those who are greatly overweight, and especially if they are middle-aged or more, the double chin appears as a sagging, wrinkled bag of flesh. On the overweight person it appears as a plump bulge.

Obviously, remedy for both types of double chins largely lies in the achievement of correct weight.

Weight Correction Eliminates Sag
If you are just a little overweight or a little overweight, and consequently have just a trifle more chin sag than you should, this weight and chin sag situation can be corrected by the simple and obvious device of just eating somewhat more or less as indicated by your poundage.

But if you are greatly overweight or greatly underweight, it is more advisable to consult your physician and have him prescribe diet and exercise procedures for you. After this, the double chin problem can automatically solve itself.

There is one simple restorative measure which will do much toward regaining attractive chin, neck and throat lines. The calls for nothing more than the correction of imperfect carriage and posture of the body. Many of the women who possess a chin or so more than they should also detract from their appearance with a slouching walk and drooping shoulders. These faults naturally accentuate the unattractive let-down appearance of a double chin. Walk, then, with the head held high, shoulders erect, and the chin up-tilted.

This advice, incidentally, is very good for any woman, regardless of how many chins she may or may not have. The distinguished poise and carriage and air of assurance which is largely the result of nothing more than steadily maintaining physical erectness. These same qualities can be commanded by any woman who will make the effort to stand up straight.
