

Hot Intersectional, Conference Frays on Grid Slate Today

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Although intersectional engagements will occupy many of the nation's collegiate grid powers tomorrow, there also will be a marked acceleration of activity in major conferences.

Michigan's Big Ten champions, still shuddering from their narrow squeak with Michigan State, are at Stanford to stake their 24-game winning streak against a team that flattened Harvard last week.

Dust back in the midlands, half a dozen other Big Ten teams will get down to cases in conference struggles. These find Indiana at Ohio State, Wisconsin at Illinois and Iowa at Purdue. Northwestern's Rose Bowl heroes, off to a

fast start with a league victory over Purdue, remain out of conference play to entertain Pittsburgh and Minnesota at Nebraska.

The Southeastern conference matches the Big Ten in titanic activity. Dixie's headlines send Georgia Tech, surprise winner over Vanderbilt, to Tulane, preseason favorite for the conference crown. Vanderbilt, meanwhile, will entertain Alabama with hopes of hitting its expected stride and Kentucky meets Mississippi with each seeking a third straight triumph.

Notre Dame, unbeaten in its last 23 games although tied twice, also is on the coast for an intersectional date with underdog Washington.

Ivy league contests sending Dartmouth to Pennsylvania and Harvard to Columbia share the eastern spotlight with Army's West Point battle against slightly deflated Penn State. Cornell, the Ivy league favorite, is at home against Colgate and Princeton in the Ivy league. Other eastern highlights send Holy Cross to Brown, Rutgers to Temple and Lafayette to Syracuse.

Although Oklahoma's Big Seven champions remain out of league play to meet the invasion of Texas A. and M., two tussles are on tap in that conference. They find Iowa State at Kansas and Colorado at Kansas State. Texas Christian invades Arkansas for a Southwest conference fust, while Southern Methodist

and Texas will be at home for post-season games, the former against Missouri and the latter with Idaho.

Clemson's defending champions go to North Carolina State in the Southern conference, where other league tilts find Virginia Tech at William and Mary and George Washington at Virginia Military. Georgia will be at North Carolina in one of four good inter-league struggles carded in the south. The others find Duke at Tennessee, Rice at Louisiana State and Baylor at Mississippi State.

The far west also will have such promising attractions as Oklahoma A. and M. at Denver, Nevada at St. Mary's, Santa Clara at Fresno State, Montana at Utah State and Utah at Arizona.

Deer Season Opens Today; Nimrods Set

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Nimrods began thronging into Oregon's forests today for the deer hunting season which opens tomorrow.

A record crowd was expected on the U. S. national forests. Encouraged by the last few days' dampness, forest officials authorized campfires without special permits. Only one forest—the Fremont—will require permits for campfires.

The state game commission predicted the best hunting in the Tillamook burn area. Harney county was expected to be the next best, with Lake county third.

The deer season, which runs from Oct. 2 to 20, will be general throughout the state except in Sherman county.

The bag limit is one deer.

Founder of the Green Bay Packers in 1919 and the club's only coach through 28 years in the National football league, Lambeau stepped into the front office and named his three assistants to succeed him on the field.

From now on, he said, he'll work solely as vice-president and general manager, titles he's held for several years. In charge of actual playing will be Line Coach Tom Stidham, Backfield Coach Bob Snyder and Defense Coach Charley Brock.

The move followed the most disastrous season in the Packers' long NFL history and the only year in which the club, playing out of a town of 50,000, smallest in the league, lost money.
