

Carl Hall to Display Work At Art Gallery

Carl Hall, one of Oregon's foremost young artists, will display his artistic versatility in a special showing of 39 pieces of his work at the R. L. Elstrom art gallery, opening today.

Hall, unlike many artists who specialize in only one field of art, is proficient in oils, water colors, etching and pencil drawings, according to Larry Boulier, gallery director.

Among the pieces to be shown are landscapes and seascapes done by Hall here in Oregon. Pencil sketches of field hospitals, soldiers worn out from battle, wounded soldiers and field church services made by Hall while he was artist-historian with the 83rd Infantry division in the Philippines will be shown publicly for the first time during this show.

Also included will be a series of etchings completed by Hall, this summer in preparation for his art classes at Willamette university this winter where he is artist in residence and art instructor. The show will continue until October 28.

Hall was born in Washington, D.C., educated in Detroit, Mich., studied art at the Meisinger art school in Detroit on a scholarship, graduating with honors. He trained with the 83rd Infantry division at Camp Adair and Camp White, near Medford, and later saw much action in the Pacific war theatre. After discharge he and Mrs. Hall, a native Oregonian, came to Salem to live. They are the parents of a year-old daughter, Merrilee Ellen. Last spring Hall received a \$2,000 grant as one of 15 artists, writers and composers awarded grants by the National Institute of Arts and Letters.

Draft of A-Probe Report States Hickenlooper Case Unfounded

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(AP)—A proposed report of the senate-house atomic committee said tonight that "incredible mismanagement" charges by Senator Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) against the atomic energy commission "could not be proved."

The draft strongly defends the AEC's record of security of its vital secrets.

Circulated in confidence to committee members, the proposed report was backed up indirectly by a statement of Chairman McMahon (D-Conn.) McMahon told reporters the AEC and its chairman, David E. Lillenthal, are "not guilty."

Hickenlooper challenged both the report and the chairman. He said he had not studied the report but if it said his charge could not be proved, "that is an attempt at whitewash and the facts won't sustain it." He added the investigation is not ended as far as he is concerned.

Senator Knowland (D-Calif.) immediately questioned the right of the committee staff — working under McMahon's direction — to draft a report on the committee's lengthy inquiry into Hickenlooper's charges "without any prior consultation or discussion with the committee members."

McMahon replied that it was put into print to make it more convenient for committee members to read, and "not with any idea of finalizing it or putting it beyond your criticism." He said it embodied his ideas and those of the vice chairman, Rep. Durham (D-NC) on "what should be said on the basis of the evidence."

Senator Russell (D-Ga.), another committee member, said he doubts the time has arrived yet for any report. He indicated he might vote against issuing one now.

McMahon explained he made his statement that the AEC was "not guilty" as an individual and not as committee chairman.

State Produces Most of Meat It Consumes

Oregon does not produce as much meat as it consumes. This statement was made Friday by the Oregon agricultural outlook committee.

Not only does Oregon not produce as much meat as it consumes, but the same holds true for the seven western states combined. There is a large deficit of hogs, so pork must be shipped from the Midwest. The output of cattle and calves in Oregon exceeds by a little the amount consumed, but there is a large shortage in California. Washington does not produce enough.

Last year, the three coast states had almost 10 per cent of the nation's consumers but produced only 6.4 per cent of the cattle and calves. The seven most western states were more nearly self-sufficient as they had around 11 per cent of the population and produced 10 per cent of the beef and veal.

On hogs, Oregon was very short. Most Oregon farmers do not like to compete with pork products shipped in from areas with low feed costs like the Midwest. They prefer to keep other kinds of livestock. As a result, they produce less than one per cent of the United States output of hogs. Again the Pacific coast states, with nearly 10 per cent of the people, produced only 1 1/4 per cent of the hogs. The seven western states produced only 2.1 per cent of the total.

And yet, the national outlook service reported this week that hog prices are likely to go on down. If prices are supported this fall, advice is to pick best weights, markets and days to sell, for the USDA will only try to maintain a monthly average farm price. The 90 per cent of parity will not be guaranteed. While good hog men will still make money, heavy hogs will be hard hit as fat piles up.

Wheat Comes To Life Late in Grain Market

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Soybeans and lard forged upward under strong demand on the board of trade today. Grains did not do much until the final half hour when wheat suddenly came to life and rolled up for gains extending to more than a cent.

Other gains were not able to score worthwhile advances. Wheat ended 1/4-1 1/2 higher, corn was unchanged to 1/4 lower, oats were 1/4 lower to 1/4 higher, rye was unchanged to 1/4 higher, soybeans were 2 1/2-3 1/4 higher and lard was 38 to 47 cents a hundred pounds higher.

The late upturn in wheat was led by the July contract, which made the widest gains.

The commodity credit corporation announced it bought 900,000 bushels of wheat at Portland, Oregon, yesterday, largest purchase anywhere this week.

Right-Wing Greek Soldiers Are Now 'Red-Blooded'

ATHENS.—(INS)—Some of the Greek Army soldiers wounded in the recent operations against the communist rebels' Grammos stronghold will have communist blood pumped into them to restore their health.

One-hundred fifty communists, imprisoned in an Aegean Sea penitentiary island for anti-state activities, have spontaneously offered to donate their blood to wounded soldiers, "to atone for the harm done by the rebels."

"Shame!" exclaimed an indignant right-wing Athenian newspaper in an editorial commenting on the news. "Our wounded require unpolluted Greek blood, not the blood of criminals!"

Stock Market Steers Down Narrow Road

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The stock market steered down a narrow price road today.

With the steel strike deadline only hours away, and with steel negotiators still split, trading was characterized by a high degree of caution.

Cautious, nevertheless, was flavored strongly with a lingering hope—based on nothing tangible—that a strike will be averted or that it will be short-lived.

Closing prices showed an almost even mixture of gains and losses, most of them under a point.

Turnover the 1,000-share mark for the 15th straight session, although commonwealth and southern accounted for 121,900 shares out of total volume of 1,100,000. This compared with 1,380,000 Thursday.

The associated press average of 60 stocks dipped .1 of one point to 63.8. All three major groups—industrials, rails and utilities—showed minor losses.
