

Michigan Voted Tops, 1st AP Poll

Irish Second, Sooners Third

Tulane 4th, Gophers 5th, Tar Heels 6th

NEW YORK, Oct. 4 (AP)—Michigan, Notre Dame and Oklahoma ran 1-2-3 today in the season's first Associated Press poll to pick the top ten college football teams from coast to coast.

For Michigan and Notre Dame, their position were the same they held in the final poll at the close of the 1948 season. Oklahoma wound up as the No. 5 team last year.

Fourth place in the new lineup was captured by Tulane, while Minnesota landed in the No. 5 spot. Neither of them was in the top ten when the 1948 campaign came to a close.

North Carolina, third last year, started off as the No. 6 club this time, followed in order by Army, Southern California, Southern Methodist and California. Only Southern Cal in that group failed to make the grade last year.

Eighty sports writers and broadcasters participated in the first 1949 poll. Thirty-four of them placed Michigan at the top of their ballots.

All of the top ten are undefeated, having played only two or three games this season. Only 18 other teams were mentioned in the balloting, and some of them already have been beaten.

The experts apparently felt that Michigan's showing to date overshadowed those of the other leaders, although it has come closer to defeat than any other team in the group except Southern Methodist. The Big Ten champions barely beat Michigan State, 7-3, in their opener before dropping Stanford, 27-7, to run their victory string to 25 games dating back to 1946.

Notre Dame, unbeaten in its last 29 games although tied twice, has a 49-6 conquest of Indiana and a 27-7 triumph over Washington to show for its 1949 efforts. Oklahoma boosted its winning streak to 12 games with one-sided victories over Boston College and Texas A. and M. Tulane, also picking up where it left off last year when it won nine straight, has turned back two good Southeastern conference clubs.

As a matter of comparison, the top ten lined up like this at the end of the 1948 season: Michigan, Notre Dame, North Carolina, California, Oklahoma, Army, Northwestern, Georgia, Oregon and Southern Methodist.

With six of the first 12 teams in the new rankings involved in games with each other this week, the list may be in for a wholesale shakeup on the next vote. Michigan and Army meet at Ann Arbor, Oklahoma takes on the No. 12 team, Texas at Dallas, and Southern California will be host to Ohio State, ranked 11th.

The celebration was twofold—first to cheer the Dodgers for winning the pennant, and secondly to give them a rousing sendoff into the World Series opening with the New York Yankees tomorrow.

A hundred thousand Brooklynites lined Flatbush avenue and Fulton street to yell themselves hoarse during a mammoth motorized parade for the Dodger players. Fifteen hundred police were on hand. But the fans were orderly and there were no arrests.

There was dancing in the streets to 25 Brooklyn bands, guaranteed to be the world's loudest, if not the most musical. The Yankees were hanged in effigy from a Brooklyn lamppost.

"I ain't talkin'," said the Yankee catcher, Larry (Yogi) Berra, referring to the speediest Dodger, Jackie Robinson, "but he just ain't gonna go no place. I know somethin', that's all."

Thus professional attention was focused on two very debatable points: Can Dodger pitching stand up under Yankee power hitting? Will Jackie Robinson and his base stealing team-mates drive Berra to distraction?

On paper the teams appear rather even, although the betting odds favor the Yankees 9 to 5. The Dodgers hit 270 for the season, the Yankees 267. Each won 87 games.

Probably the biggest impediment of the world series is Joe DiMaggio, baseball's strong, silent man who gets \$90,000 a year.

Underweight from a battle with a virus infection, kept on the bench half the season by a bone spur on his heel, DiMaggio will try to give another of those great competitive efforts of his to rise above the limitations of his own physical weakness.

The game starts at 1:00 p.m. (10 a.m. PST).

Yanks, Bosox Eye Nat Star

NEW YORK, Oct. 4 (AP)—The first of the trade rumors in the lobby of the hotel housing the world series headquarters had the New York Yankees and the Boston Red Sox in a front office battle for Rae Scarborough, Washington pitcher.

It was Scarborough who defeated Boston in a crucial game last week. A year ago he defeated Boston and sent the American league pennant race into an unprecedented playoff involving the Red Sox and Cleveland. This year he won 13, lost 11.
