screen windows that will enable you to fit them into frames that are not perfectly shaped What turns this trick is a

series of flanges on the outside of the frames. which are used to give the necessary tight fit when the in-

stallation is made. Once these combination windows are in, switching from one season to another is a small chore indeed. The lower screen sash is removed, and the storm window is slipped into its place. The upper sash is a storm sash that stays permanently in place. This is the voice of exper-
