Night Classes Roll Shows 400

Final first-week classes of Salem night-school attracted 187 more students Wednesday night.

Total enrollment now stands at about 400 in the adult education program of Salem public schools, according to George D. Porter, director.

Largest Wednesday night classes were in practical nursing, which attracted 45, and tailoring, which drew 34. Porter said both classes would be divided into two sections.

Sixty-four students were enrolled in college-level classes Wednesday night.

In response to complaints that paper and garbage were being strewn along the dump entrance, County Commissioner Roy Rice investigated. He reported Wednesday that he had seen "very little" evidence of scattered debris.

PORTLAND, Oct. 5—(AP)—Portland's crowded bridges across the Willamette river are going to be still worse for the next two months. The steel bridge will be closed for 60 days starting next Monday to enable completion of the new ramps being built into the bridge.

POLIO TOTAL REPORTED

PORTLAND, Oct. 5—(AP)—Seventeen cases of polio were reported in Oregon last week, the state board of health said today. Five of them were from Portland, and four from Marion county.

PORTLAND, Oct. 5—(AP)—The \$14,000,000 Dorena dam on the Row river will be formally dedicated Oct. 23, with ceremonies at the reservoir six miles east of Cottage Grove.

Interior Bill On Western Projects Ready

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5—(AP)—A \$584,096,797 interior department money bill containing more than \$100,000,000 for Pacific Northwest projects was ready today for delivery to the house and senate.

A conference committee agreed upon the total as a compromise between the \$595,262,257 voted by the senate and \$536,461,908 voted by the house. The bill proposes the biggest yearly outlay for the interior department in history.

The largest item in the compromise is \$354,014,510 for the reclamation bureau. Most of these funds are earmarked for some half-dozen major projects. Columbia basin development would receive the biggest amount—\$68,000,000.

The bill also sets aside \$30,284,500 for the Bonneville power administration.

The conference committee report is expected to be acted upon by the house and senate this week. The money is for the fiscal year beginning last July 1. Since the bill has been delayed, the department has been operating under stop-gap resolutions passed by congress.

In general, the committee accepted increases in funds for reclamation projects over that allowed by the house.

The \$68,000,000 for the Columbia basin compared with the budget figure of \$71,500,000, the house total of \$59,075,000 and the senate's \$70,034,390.

The total agreed on for Deschutes, Ore., projects was \$1,313,750.

The Yakima Roza division is allotted \$387,833. The original budget figure was \$449,955; the house voted \$362,462 and the senate \$412,205.

The Klamath projects in Oregon and California is listed for \$803,640, the exact figure voted by the senate after the house had voted for \$850,000.

FHA to Probe Housing Need In City Area

A survey to determine Salem's need for more apartments in the \$75-\$85 rent brackets has been ordered by the federal housing authority in Washington, D. C.

Gene Conger, housing market analyst of the FHA, will conduct the survey which may determine whether a Portland contractor, Robert Coates, will receive FHA sanction to build three new apartment houses in Salem.

The chamber of commerce, Senators Guy Gordon and Wayne Morse and Representative Walter Norblad all are backing Coates to construct a total of 80 units to be located in south Salem, the Capitol shopping center and the Hollywood district.

Police Cycles Get Two-Way Radio

A new motorcycle with two-way radio was in use by the Salem police department Wednesday.

The Harley-Davidson cycle is one of two which will replace the machines used by traffic patrolmen. The other will be placed in service later this week.

Formerly policemen operating cycles made hourly checks with the department by phone. Now they can communicate with patrol cars as well as the police radio room while operating the machines.

Kaiser Agrees To Steelworker Contract Term

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 5—(AP)—Henry Kaiser tonight agreed to contract demands of the striking CIO United Steelworkers, and the government told John L. Lewis and coal operators to come in and talk peace.

Kaiser Steel Corporation of Fontana, Calif., signed an agreement to give four cents per man-hour for insurance and six cents an hour for pensions paid completely by the company.

That's exactly what a presidential fact finding board recommended. Failure of big steel — U. S. Steel corporation — and the other basic producers to accept the formula caused Philip Murray to call out the nation's steelworkers.

Kaiser's Fontana plant employing 3,500 has not been on strike. But CIO and Steelworker Chief Murray proudly announced Kaiser's acceptance of the union's demands. The Kaiser contract expires October 15.

Parolee Captured After Abduction Of Portland Man

PORTLAND, Oct. 5—(AP)—An 18-year-old reform school parolee was held tonight in the gunpoint abduction of a Portland insurance executive who was shoved from his car at Eola, three miles west of Salem.

State police captured the youth in Brushland near southeast Kellogg park after he wrecked the stolen car on highway 99-E near state police headquarters at Milwaukie.

Officer said the youth admitted he had been released two weeks ago from a federal correction institution at Littleton, Colo. He was identified as Gordon S. Beck, formerly of Mobile, Ala.

At his home here, R. M. Dooley, president of Dooley & Co., was reluctant to talk. Police said he had a bullet wound in an overcoat sleeve. This occurred when Beck's .32-caliber revolver discharged

accidentally while en route to Salem.

Police told this story: Beck had bummed around Portland after arriving a few days ago. He obtained the revolver at the Meier & Frank department store where he had hid under a bed Tuesday, stole the gun and broke out sometime last night. He accosted Dooley at the latter's garage at home, forcing him to drive to Salem early today.

Earth to Blackout Moon on Thursday

NEW YORK, Oct. 5—(AP)—The moon goes into another blackout tomorrow night — and spotters can see the show from almost any part of North America where skies are clear.

Officials of Hayden Planetarium said the eclipse — a total one that will black out the moon completely — will start at 6:30 p.m. (PST) and last until 7:33 p.m. (PST).

It is the second time this year that the earth has stood momentarily between the full moon and the sun.

NATIONALISTS WITHDRAW CANTON, Oct. 5—(AP)—Private reports today said Chinese nationalist troops have withdrawn from Kungong, keystone of Canton's outer defenses 125 miles north of this capital.
