Dance Law
Change Asked
At Silverton

SILVERTON — Harry Wesley, representing the Glenn Woody orchestra, Salem, this week asked city officials for permission to operate dances here under a recently revoked law which permitted pass-outs from the dances.

He objected to the division of the ordinance which prohibits "pass-outs" from Silverton dances and also to the raise of dance licenses from \$5 to \$10, which is now being charged.

The ordinance now in effect, and the one to which Wesley objected, was passed after several months of petition — presenting by residents in the neighborhood of the army where the dances were held. Complaints at that time, the old petitions show, were of the "noise all night long" as well as "litters of bottles strewn on lawns, porches and parkings" following each dance.

Mayor C. H. Weiby has asked George Wiesner and Errol Ross, local councilmen, to work out with City Manager Robert Borland a possible solution satisfactory both to the dance orchestras and the residents of the area.

Mrs. Edward Holloway

ALBANY — Mrs. Edward Holloway, 67, Albany route 1, died in Emmanuel hospital in Portland Saturday. Mrs. Holloway fell at her home recently, breaking her hip. She was taken to Portland for treatment. Death came from a blood clot resulting from the break. Funeral services were held from the Fisher Funeral Home in Albany Wednesday.

Gladys Shaw was born at Yacovina, July 8, 1882, a daughter of Charles and Grace Royce Shaw. She moved with her parents when a small child to Newport where she lived for six weeks before coming to Albany where she has since made her home. Her mother came to Oregon by ox train when she was only three years of age. The grandmother died on the way and the little girl was reared in the home of an aunt, Mrs. Stord Froman, another Oregon pioneer. Her father, Charles Shaw, operated a hardware store in Newport and was also a shoe cobbler by trade. Shaw also served as a state representative.

In Albany on September 25, 1907, Gladys Shaw was married to Edward Holloway, who survives. Also surviving are two children, Mrs. Iretha Lansing of Albany, and Royce Holloway, of route 1 Albany; and two grandchildren, Arnold R. Holloway and Shawlene Ellen Holloway, both of Albany.

Mrs. Holloway was a member of Grand Prairie Grange for 60 years; a member of the Episcopal church and of the HDW club.
