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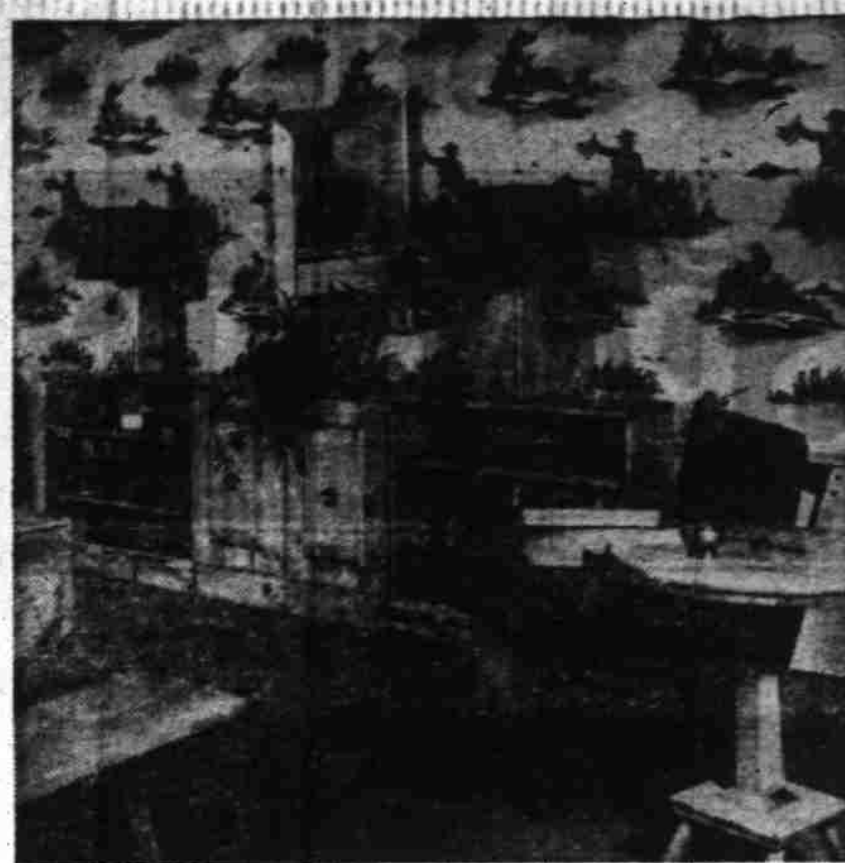
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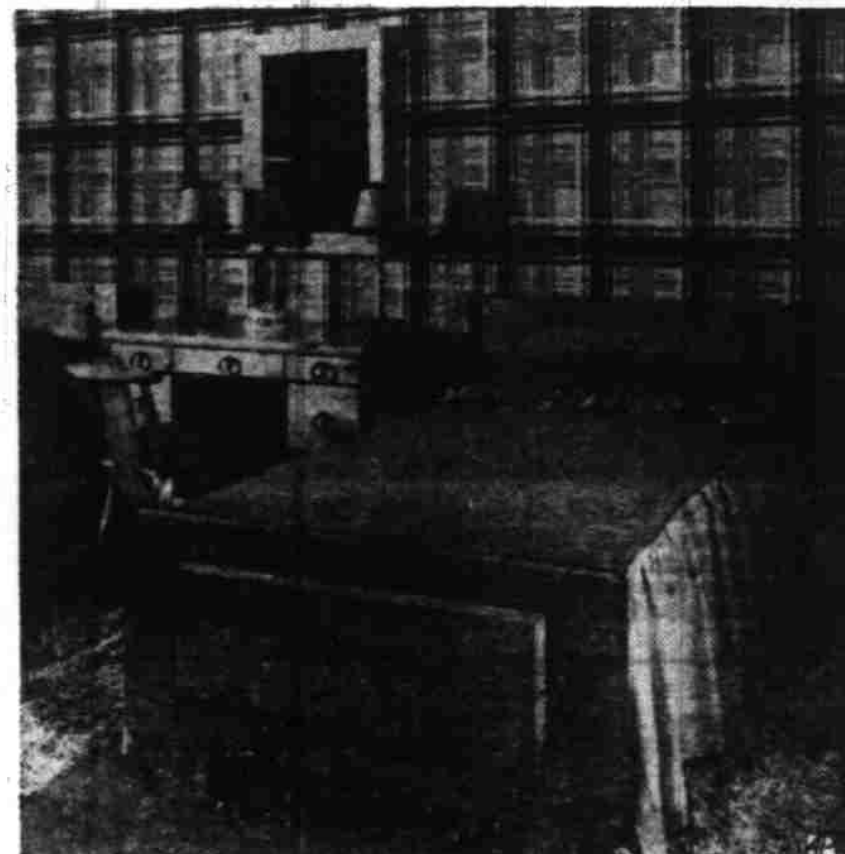
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Something for the boys... Another example of today's gay wallpaper is this smart hunting motif in shades of bright green and brown. Lampshade and chair covers are green.

Business Suit May Be Changed Into Dinner Dress For Evening

So you're faced with the problem of dressing for business—plus a big date for dinner or perhaps a first night, with no chance of touching home base between the two events.

If you are even an amateur seamstress there are several good solutions to this problem, provided you think ahead when you choose that new suit. Then do a bit of clever home sewing. The idea is to take advantage of two new fashion ideas—the vogue for short evening and dinner dresses, and the bodice tops of rich fabrics.

If you choose a dressmaker-type suit of a soft surface fabric, such as one of the beautiful woollens or a broadcloth, you'll

have a skirt that can be teamed with ever so many separate tops of the glamour fabrics for evening wear. The skirt of such a suit is pretty likely to follow the straight and narrow path of current fashion, probably with one or two slits in the hemline. All well and good for your purpose.

Select your bodice top design to do the most in the way of flattery—the cuffed top is prettier and more flattering than the plain, for example. Make your tops strapless or with sleeves, according to your preference. Use rich fabrics—such as one of the many-colored metallic cloths, lace, satin or velvet. For the business day wear the jacket... for the big date, remove the jacket and you have a magnificent costume!

Make up several of these tops—each one requires a very small yardage, depending on whether it's strapless or with sleeves.
