WOODBURN - The city council struck out against youthful lawbreakers this week, passing a reckless driving law and demanding enforcement of the curfew ordinance.

The reckless driving ordinance aimed against "squirrel driving" in the city, carries a fine ranging from \$15 to \$250 for violators. The council also instructed police to arrest anyone under 17 years of age on city streets, parks or public places between 9:30 p.m. and sunrise unless accompanied by parents or when on emergency business. The ordinance also makes parents of offending youths liable and provides fines up to \$10.

### **Grain Prices** Score Rise

CHICAGO, Oct. 6-(AP)-A boost in the government wheat buying bid, coupled with wet weather throughout the mid-west, caused a run-up in grains on the board of trade today.

All sections of the market participated in the advance. Wheat closed %-1% higher, corn was %-% higher, oats were unchanged to % higher, rye was 21/2-31/4 higher, soybeans were 11/4 to 2 cents higher and lard was 5 to 12 cents a hundred pounds higher. Chief factor in wheat was an advance of 1/2 cent a bushel by the local CCC office for cash grain. It offered 11 cents over the December future for No. 2 soft red and No. 2 hard winter wheat delivered at Philadelphia.
